Hurriedly, as usual: 1) Since I made an extra copy of the Russian chapters for submission to the publisher who had seen none in full, I have it now for you. It is not to be shown to our own people--they have work to do to occupy them--although you may show it to anyone on the outside whom you think it would interest sufficiently to want to be part of the book's <sup>financial</sup> publishing friends. 2) While I'm holding my breath for the publishers to make up their minds, I feel it is wrong for me not to be sounding the outline around at least to ever new sources, but I have no copies as each has maintained the copy for its file. Will you therefore please return to me once again the outline you have? 3) I have received a magnificent letter from Professor E. H. Carr complimenting me on the work and --after he has written 6 scholarly works on one of the periods I deal with, the 1920s--stating modestly that since he is not a philosopher he cannot competently judge how much Lenin reorganized his concepts after Philosophic Notebooks, but I have certainly raised enough doubts for anyone who is serious and interested to have to begin a study of that period all over again.
