"LIFE by LT, 1931 NY (Scribner's Sons) (Foreword is signed 1929, Prinkipo) (7)

p.180: "The partial victory of the Oct. strike had for me a tremendous THEORETICAL as well as pol. importance. It was NOT the opp. of the liberal bourgeoisie, NOT THE ELEMENTAL RISING OF THE PEASANTRY or the terrorist acts of the intelligentsia, but the strike of the workers that for the 1st time brought Tsarism to its knees. The rev. leadership of the prol. revealed itself as an incontrovertible fact. I felt that the theory of the PER.REV. had withstood its 1st test successfully." *Reform* *Influence*

p.185: "No great work is possible without intuition—that is, without that SUBconscious sense which, altho it may be developed & enriched by theoretical & practical work, must be INGRAINED in the very nature of the individual. NEITHER THE education NOR practical ROUTINE can replace the pol. insight which can replace the political INSIGHT which enables one to apprehend a situation, weigh it as a whole, foresee the future. The gift takes on decisive imp. at a time of abrupt changes & breaks—the conditions of rev. The events of 1905 revealed in me, I believe, this rev. intuition & enabled me to rely on its assured support in my later life. I must add here that the errors which I have committed, however imp. they may have been.....always referred to questions that were not fundamental or strategic, but dealt rather with such derivative matters as ~~the organization~~ policy."

p.186 Just as 1905 was dress rehearsal for 1917 his-ly, so they were in his personal life & he was so at home in 1917 because "they were merely a continuation & dev. of the rev. activity which had been interrupted by the arrest of the St.Petersburg Sov. on 12/3/1905."

p.222: Q himself in 1909 in RL's Pol. magazine: "Local cratinism is the curse of the peasant movements. It was on the CIRCUMSCRIBED POL. INTELLIGENCE OF THE PEASANT who while in his village plundered his landlord in order to seize his land, but then, decked out in a soldier's coat, shot down the wks., that the 1st wave of the Rev. (1905) broke. The events of that rev. may be regarded as a series of ruthless obj.-lessons by means of which HIS IS HAMMERING INTO THE HEAD OF THE PEASANT THE CONSCIOUSNESS OF THE REV. which connect his local demand for land with the central problem of the state power."

p.224: "I was still hoping that the new rev. would force the Mass.—as had that of 1905—to follow a rev. path. But I underestimated the imp. of preparatory ideological selection & pol. case-hardening. In questions of the inner dev. of the party I was guilty of a sort of social-rev. fatalism. This was a mistaken stand, but it was vastly superior that of but. fatalism, devoid of ideas, which distinguishes the maj. of my present-day critics. in the camp of the CI." *Rev.*

p.227 LT speaks of "A sense of the tragedy of history... I know that the war has been declared & it has already begun, but I have not yet learned to believe in it." *Rev.*
