The biographical note that is of interest is that Lukacs returned to Eudapest April, 1957, from Rumania to which he had buanxy specific scaped when the 1956 revolution failed

On the philosophic side, McInnes is good in his num-mation of Haco: "Marx meant, said Lukacs, that spitit had become thing and things were steeped in spirit, so that history was a fabric of meanings-tecome-forces. This dialectical relation of subject and object was most marked in the case of the profetariat..."
