Capitalism arises and develops historically amidst a non-capitalist society. In Meetern Europe it is found at first in a feudal environment from which it in fact sprang — the system of bondage in rural areas and the guild system in the towns — and later, after having swallowed up the feudal system, it exists mainly in an environment of pessants and artisans, that is to say in a system of simple commodity production both in agriculture and trade. European capitalism is further surrounded by wast territories of non-European civilisation ranging over all levels of development, from the printive communist horder of nonad herderen, hunters and gatherers to commodity production by peasants and artisans. This is the setting for the accumulation of capital.

In Europe, force assumed revolutionary forms in the fight against feudalism (this is the ultimate explanation of the bourgeois revolutions in the seventeenth, eighteenth and nineteenth centuries); in the non-European countries, where it fights more primitive social organizations, it assumes the forms of colonial policy.

The women would take turns for household duties; a matriarch, again elected by the family, being in complete charge of the clan's domestic affairs, or else the women taking turns of duty. 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Militarism fulfils a quite definite function in the history of capital, accompanying as it does every historical phase of accumulation. It plays a decisive part in the first stages of European capitalism, in the period of the so-called primitive accumulation, as a means of conquering the New World and the spice-producing countries of India.... Finally militarism is a meanon in the competitive struggle between capitalist countries for areas of non-capitalist civilization.

"Do you know that I wrote the entire 30 galleys in onego in four months -- incredible performance -- and sent it off to the printer without so much as a further glance." (Letter to Hans Diefenbach, 5/32/1937)

In her letter to Zetkin at the end of 1911,/she described as EXECUTIVE a "wholely new and strictly scientific analysis of imperialism and its contradictions" she now described as the "happiest" period in her life. She now also applied that to her answer to the critics, whom she called epigones, and that irrespective of whether they were revolutionaires or reformints. Clearly, what had been a brief introductory note to Accumulation, that the WAYKXX "scientific" work "is at the same time tied to the practical contemporary imperialist politics" and the work itsalf | dated Dec. 1912, carried a sub-title: "a contribution to the economic explanation of imperialism", was now an Anti-Critique, developed final more fully in an eloquent chapter entitled "Imperialism".*
