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Now, the short minded men who called themselves marxist of our era were in totally bereft of marx's own philosophy. thereby not only confusing marx and Engels as one and not only knowing nothing at all about the EN, but seeming to know next to nothing of open, actual history of marx that was the very much part of the movement.
