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Apocial Introduction for Iranian edition of Mark's Humanist Essays by Eays Desaysvakaya, suther of Making and Freedom, Philosophy and Sevolution, and IRAH: UNFOLDERY OF pand CONTRADICTIONS IN REFOLUTION

Received there is nothing more and then ships such addressing a people in an engoing revolution, I feel very honored to have this opportunity to introduce the 1844 Marx Economic-Milesophic Marmouripts which I was the first to transite into Anglish a quarter of a century ego. Indeed, the percent American that forght its ruling class./solidarised with Iranian revolutionaries in that year is even more alive in 1979, is need in this modest publication, where we appear us one, and, together, catch the bistoric link to Manx's humanism which reveals nothing short of a whole new continent of thought. That this was not just "the young Manx", nor only "the mature Harr" but the living haritage for today, is proven, once again, by what has just been discovered, a full century after Manx mode them, Manx's Simplested Motebooked where he return to what he first wrote in 1844, that not only must capitalism be overthrown and its exploitation of the working measure, but a totally new modesty be builting where all imman relations, beginning with a most fundamental Man/Wean relationship.
