My dear Sara:

I didn't answer the question concerning Comrade Hansen because I had the impression that it is necessary to wait for the agreement of Hansen himself. The recommendation you and Comrade Cannon rade seem to me absolutely adequate, and I would be glad if Comrade Hansen comes here as early as possible.

After your departure a great catastrophe happened here in the house. By Russian collaborator Rita is going to be married, and that with extraordinary speed, the 15th of this month. She already abandoned her work. You knew that I was returning to work on my "Lenin" book, which means that the Russian collaborator becomes my most important collaborator for a long period of time. Comrade Rae is willing to do this work. She is now hard at work on her Russian stenography and, as far as I can judge by the first attempts, with evident success. Nevertheless, there are two obstacles: a) for the next months Rae's Russian language will not be perfect; b) she is far too precious for me as an English stenographer. That's why it seems to me absolutely necessary to try to find in the States a Russian typist, not necessarily a stenographer at all. There will be more than sufficient work for both and Rae would during this time have the possibility to perfect her Russian. Do you believe there is any hope for finding a Russian typist in Yew York?

I received the letter of comrade Louis. I will answer it in the near future.

Thank you very much for your readiness to come here to help me. It is not necessary. For the current needs I have the collaboration of Rae also in Russian and at the same time we hope to have a permanent collaborator. Jan is now on a trip to Durango where a Russian typist is living. e are waiting for a cable from him as to how it all turned out. (In principle she agree; the cuestion is only if she is skilful).

I confess I am a bit disquieted not to have received news about the German book. Eleanor Clark assured me that Korton would do more for the book than Doubleday Doran because: (a)he is a less known editor and looks for sensational publications; (b)he is more "radical". The material conditions proposed by Morton are 15%, from which 10% are for the author and 5% for the illustrator. But I didn't give any definite ansver. Norton was obliged to accept or rejective ithin two weeks from receipt of manuscript. I have telephone him or Eleanor Clark or both in order to get an irmediate answer. If you believe that the conditions from Doubled ay Doran could be more advantageous, then manuscript to Doubleday Doran.

Dear Corrade Cara:

The situation with the Emssian collaborator is not resolved. Jan telephoned us after his very long and very tiring trip that the proposed typist is totally not fit for the job. hat is to be done?

I received the cable signed Cannon sher about the "professional English stenographer and Russian translator", with the remark, "Russian typing imporfect". I am in doubt. Then we discussed the ratter here, I had hita as my Russian collaborator and at the same time I dreamed of a permanent English collaborator who knew, more or less, Russian for my current needs. At the moment this work is done very well by Rae. But I lack a good Russian collaborator-typist. If she knows no other Lagrange but knows well the Russian language and typing, because my work on the Lemin book would use her full time. But the collaborator proposed by you and Commade Cannon types Russian "imperfectly". That can be done? Can you examine her? Bo you believe that a good Inglish typist can, in a short time, perfect her Russian typing? Rac answers these questions negatively. It would be a terrible blow for me to invite here from Chicago a collaborator and then first establish the fact that the invitation was a mistake. I don't know what to do.

I received from Commades Shachtan and Cannon the proposition to write an article for the NAN INTERNATIONAL on the 20th anniversary of the October Tevolution. I would do it willingly but it's impossible for me in the present situation. I can't dictate an article of such an important character in any other language than Russian. Rao's Russian is sufficient for a letter or short article but not for an article of such size. This is one more reason to find for me a mussian collaborator.

Dear Cormade Barah,

It is necessary to explain precisely my present situation towards my English and Russian collaborators.

As I told and wrote you the arrival of Rac in a critical moment was of inestimable help to me, not only for my English but also for my Russian correspondence. Though it would be hardly possible for me to write my book on Lenin with Rac, I can dictate to her not only Russian letters but also short articles. For my English correspondence I now have the collaboration of Corrade Ransen. We began our work yesterday and it goes all right. But the Russian question remains open. Some weeks ago Corrade Rao told me that Abern is very maxious to have her collaboration in the management of the New International. You know that the New International is very mear to my heart. I know at the same time from experience how important it is for the success of common work to have mutual confidence and porsonal friendship. In spite of this I opposed the departure of Rac. (She did not insist at all: you know her spirit of complete devotion to party work and her murn personal readiness to help me in every respect.) But I repeat the question of a Russian typist remains open. Rac accomplished miracles in studying Russian, and she is very gifted as a stonographer oven in Russian. But the difficulty arises from the fact that she was not educated in the Russian language from her childhood. She can understand enough in order to translate from the Russian to the English; but she has not, and I believe it is impossible in a couple of months to win, the necessary assurance in the subtleties of a foreign language which is necessary for a stenographer or typist. Until a Russian typist comes, Rae's collaboration is absolutely necessary for me.

But I ask myself if it would be reasonable and even permissible to have her at the same time as a Bussian typist (when and if she comes), given the fact that Mansen will remain here, as I hope, for an indefinite time. You wrote me that the tentative Bussian typict is only a sympathizer. This signifies that her departure from the states will not in any way prejudice party work. With Hansen and with has the situation is very different. For purely personal reasons (and egoistic in point of view) I should be glad to retain has here as long as possible, but from the point of view of elementary party interest it would be impermissible lummry. My conclusion is that has should remain here until we find a Bussian typist and until we win the assurance through experience that she is suitable for her work; then and only then has can return at the disposition of the party.

I am not writing officially to the committee because a letter in such circumstances rarely enough is self-explanatory,

but you my dear Sarah know all the conditions of my life and work and you can not only transmit the letter to the committee but also give to them all the necessary explanations.

Dear Rac,

I am writing to you (at the siggestion of LD) in connection with the forthcoming conference. As you know, L.Sedoff, usually represented the Russian section and the Bulletin at all conferences. Without him the Russian section, though grown much larger with the addition of new forces, etc. feels terribly bereaved. It lacks a representative known to other sections; what is more, sections or leaders who carry on a fight against the international leadership certainly will dispute a mandate given in the name of the Russian section to a comparitively unknown person. But be it as may, the Russian section and the Bulletin MUST be represented at the conference. In order to help our comrades in France to speak in the name of a section and not just a group of emigres it is advisable that comrades who group themselves around the Bulletin (though they may belong to the section of the country in which they live) also consider themselves part of the Russian section and urge individually (since we never met collectively nor constituted ourselves officially as the Russian section) upon the Russian comrades in France that they see to it that a representative be delegated to the folincoming conference. I have written a letter in this sense, you will havetor write a similar letter. You can write to the Bulletin (until yo are given a better address) in a double envelope, the inside envelope mark for Lela (on second thought you might have for address, though whether it is still used I do not know - so the Bulletin is a better bet).

Now on the Bulletin. Hope you will be able to make something better d it than I from Jersey. I found out that individual subscame in very very slowly. Nost subscame frome New York and the people feel that they can buy the Bulletin so why subscribe? Especially sime it does not come in regularly. But what can be developed, is sales at meetings, etc. And for this an energetic person is meded who lives in New York. With you there I am almost sure the sales will jump. Also be on the neck of our bookstores that they pay up their indebtedness. Please, also follow up one more matter (consult my sister on it). Several months ago I sent to the Bulletin \$10.00 by money order. This money was never received. I made an inquiry at the Post Office. But have hear d nothing since. Find out whether Jack heard something, if not, let him find out at the post orrice in the town we used to live what has happened to this inquiry (Mira must have the receipt).

The mail is being collected. So au revoir. LD as you know is busy on the cook. Everybody sends regards to you, including our Mexican "entourage". Best regardst to your very best man.

Dear Rae,

We just received loads of material from Vanzler (hade not had a chance to look it over thoroughly, just glanzed at it). I see from your letter to Joe that you misuderstood the request to check the references to Trot sky, Zinoviev Kamenev, Stalin in the alphabethical list (alfavitnyi ukazatel) at the back of each of the volumes of Lenin's works. We do not mean references to Trotsky etc. in Lenin's works, only references in the alphabethical notes. What is more, just take the first edition, read through the references, then compare it with a later edition (after Lenin's death) and IF YOU FIND GROSS CHANGES AND OMMISSIONS (only in this case) copy what is said in the first work edition and the changes in the later editions. This should not entail much work.

Please tell Vanzler (or give him this part of my letter) what there was no mistake on our part in asking whether Stalin was elected to the Central Committee at the London congress. No, surely, we knew that he was not elected, but we needed authentic proofs (excerptsfrom minutes, etc.) we also wanted to know who was elected, etc. etc. This data is now furnished in the material sent to you...

As to the speed with which material should be dispatched. In is now finishing the chapters on Stalin's early life (the Caucasus, the seminary, work in Batum, Baku, Tiflis, up to say 1903) all data pertaining to this period should be in his hands as shon as possible. Other material is not so urgent. Jesu, it sure is lucky that you can help in this indispensible work!

I notice your reference to looking for a job. You cannot be serious... You promised to be back in six months (frantic efforts are being made to find a "permanent" Russian "collaborator" in Gzeckoslovskia, but if it does not materialize?...) of this period one and half months have already passed. Can you be thinking of taking a job for four months or so?

Nothing new (at least "specially new") here. Dictation is proceeding daily, some data have to be found here (only as the last resort we write to New York and Paris -- and you know how meager the materials at our disposal are here!), etc. etc. Almost all the work now proceeds along "the Russian front".

From various sources we here that the situation in New York is somewhat disheartening. And New York is the life-giving center. But then each turn is accompanied by a period of disorganization, indecision (only when will the turn actually be made?) -

Dear Sara:

Sorry to be later when your letter re the letter to the Russian Bulletin arrived here, I was in Washington. Since it was my opinion that a letter would have more weight if a few signatures were attached to it rather than just my own, I waited till I returned to MY where I consulted the Russian speaking comrades who all agreed with me. JPC also approved the English dreft of my letter. So enclosed is copy of the collective Russian letter sent to the Russian Bulletin. I hope it meets with LD's approval.

This Monday I'm calling a meeting of all Russian speaking corrades and close sympathizers with a view to forming a "Friends of the Russian Bulletin" club. I've already visited sympathizers who favored the idea. We'll probably start with a "vecherinka" and a short lecture soon, though we might decide not to start it till the Fall; it's up to the other comrades to decide this Monday.

One of the questions in your letter to Com. Wright regarding the Bolshevik Center that was organized at the end of the London Congress was answered in advance in those notes. I had sent in on Stalin's article on that congress. I thought the fact interesting so that I had copied it; Lenin's name is the only one mentioned and I know of no other source that would mention the names of the others who composed the Bolshevik caucus.

Other material will be sent in as soon as we gather it.
Remember me to the OM and the rest of the household.

Dear Sara:

Usick called when I was out to say that issues of Pravda 1919-1936, dealing with anniversary articles on the founding of the Red Army were needed immediatelyin Coyoscan. I did not see the letter so I do not know whether I can take any liberties, such as copying out only important passages, etc. etc. The truth is that each anniversary issue has many more than one leading article on the Red Army. For ex., the yr. 1922: I am enclosing 12 pages of articles by Toteky, Smirnov, Papernikov, Ventsov, all appearing on Feb. 23rd. These do not include all the articles in that issue on Pravda. Those listed below I do not intend to copy unless I hear that you wish them. And even those listed do not include greetings to Red Army, poems, etc. You can use your imagination to see how much work would be involved in getting all the articles through 1936 if I am to work alone (and I am the only Russian typist I know) and if you wish the work within 8-10 days. Though I have taken off a week from work to do this, still I doubt whether I'll come anywhere near the goal unless I know the purpose and thus am given freedom in copying. Please let me know immediately. In the meantime I will, of course, continue the work. I begun with yr. 1922 because the first year, 1919, I'm sending you a photostat copy tomorrow; the issue from 1920 is missing, and 1922 UN) had no article. In cases where there is no anniversary articles, I wonder whether trying to find one in a corresponding issue of Izvestiya would be as good.

In addition to these articles, you will also find enclosed an article by Makharadze, that Usick asked me to send; and one on (and by) Enykidze. The reason I'me sending the latter is that I recalled that when the "Old Man" wrote article on Yenukidze he stated that it is likely that Yenukidze had dropped out of the movement during the period of reaction; this does not tally with the autobiographical sketch and if the article is not yet published ID will no doubt be interested in this information.

Have not yet located the Bulletins that Natalia needs to complete her set for binding but am trying to; will let you know later whether there is or is not any possibility of securing them.

Yes, I did note the horrible mistake I had made in the circular letter on the Bulletin and immediately sent out a correction. Am glad to report that I am optimistic on handling 120 copies for the simple reason that I have already sold 90 copies, and we've run short of issues weeks ago; I could have easily handled 30 more, and don't forget this is summer and thus no meetings at which to sell them. Two new news-stands handle the Eulletin now and advertising did the remaining trick to turn the tide toward more sales.

Am back to normal, more or less; that is, there is another crisis created in California in my mother having found out, and my sister is about to give birth to a baby, so it may be likely that I'll need to head that way. But, of course, to send in requests for work; I can do the work almost anywhere. Of course, if I have any spare moments I also try to find some work that I believe may be useful to LD's present work.

What's new in Coyoacan? And you?

Dear Sara:

Enclosed you will find leading articles in "Pravda" for the years 1924, 1925, 19261 Please note that in the year 1925 the leading articles actually appear on the 22nd instead of 23rd of February (in the latter issue there is only an Order, and an account of plenum in which the speeches of Frunze and Uglanov are reported but not printed as given). ZIn the issue of Feb. 22, however, there is an article by Podvoisky, in which, for the first time, there is mention of Stalin, and not mere mention but in the company of Lenin. In the 1926 issue Vorcshilov appears with an article in which he, in passing, so-to-speak, pays homage to the "unforgettable leader Frunze". This is the first time that I have noted such mention to be made of Red Army leaders in articles. There was such mention of Trotsky but only in greetings. It is for this reason that I copied the greetings to Comrade Trotsky appearing in 1924. The reason that for that year I also copied the announcement of his health the whole announcement, by the way, was printed in black type) is both because it's both a month after the death of Lenin, and there is an interesting refutation of Duranty's "theory" of LD's absence from the funeral of Lenin.
