Will Herberg, inventor of the term "black chauvinism," who once wrote a thesis on the Negro question in which he characterized the American Negroes as "Reserves of reaction" answered consistent with his subtle, white chauvinism: "This Congress is a danger, a menace! calls a Congress with a good paper program we should support it? I say, let us agree to go to Chicago and kill this Congress, to make possible a good one later on."

Jack Altman's proposal in the beginning of his remarks to go through with the Congress but to jointly cooperate in holding the organization open for widening the labor base in the continuation work of the Congress, was frowned upon. He was forced to withdraw his proposal when he found himself out of step with the other Socialist Party members present.
