To the Mational Committee Communist Party, USA

Bear Comrades:

We are soncerned because of the continuing and despening crisis in the Communist Party. The premises and hopes which were to devalop from the 16th Convention have not come to pass. There has been no proposed in everyowing our isolation from the American scene. Suther the cleavages and contradictions have become wider and shapper while the Party is delly being reduced by further lesses.

It is not our sim at this time to assess all the reasons for this state of affairs. This will now in time.

We are concerned rather with the path ahead for correlves both as gart of the Party and as individuals. We do not come to see any further fragmentation and dispersals of broad groups of Marxist and socialist-minded forces in when there is concentrated two and three docteds of intense devetion, loyalty, offert and experience in the cause of socialism.

In view of the above, we dealers:

- 1. We went to help bring about socialism in the United States.
- 2. To schiove that sim, we wish to study and organize, unking use of the rich experiences of the working class and peoples of all countries, and more especially of those who have sobleved socialism or are careding to it. But we also held this an American Party of Socialism can successfully solve the problems before it only if it thisles and nots independently on the basis of its own good judgment.
- 3. We consider the theories werged out by Mark, Engels, Lenin and more recent leaders as summarkataff the best experiences of the workers and peoples of the world in the struggle for socialism. We further consider that the deepest study of the imerican scene is menired so that the lessons summarized by the teachers of other countries one be creatively and correstly interpreted and applied to the problems of the United States.
- 4. We believe that the main danger is arriving at a correct pro run and policies for an imerican way to scooling a color for a rectiving and over-sharpening degination and scotarinaism which socks to reduce the Party to a shell of those who are "gure" in their isolation, preferring to live by the book and to squay our country through foreign eyes.

So far, we may seem to be easying nothing that was not study in one way or another by the 16th Convertion. But the blunt truth is that the forward-looking decisions of that convention have been haustrung by those in the lookership who giver agreed with them and said so, with an able essist from those whe have followed a path of constitution and compresses with the fermor—all under the slegans of unity and the need to struggle on two fronts.

- 5. Therefore, in the present specific Party situation, we reject as double talk a program of struggle on two fronts. We feel that under this type of program, the Party is being driven to destruction. We feel that the main problems derive in the first place from the deep isolation of our movement from the main strate of the people, and above all the working class and Regree people, as well as from the continuing inshillty of the Party to deal with those problems.
- 6. We further reject the ossept that there are two extremes in our Party i. this time the right and the left en and that what is meeded is "unity a struggle against both "extremes", and studied sveidance of basic issued under the clock of that "unity". This kind of "unity" is a mask for opposition to change and leads back into the camp of degration and destrinairisms. Under this type of program, the majority of the Party which favored basic changes has been forced out.

We feel instead that the issue is more truely between the everwhelming desire for change in our ways (even though there are oversthements and excesses) and the most bitter, unyielding, and determined resistance egainst such change. This is more truly the basic issue in our movement at this time, and nothing must be allowed to cloud it.

7. We are more and more convinced that the convention action of seeking any and all avenues for unity with forces who have left our Party as well an other Marxist and socialist groupings is one of the major means by which an important move forward can be under. We are convinced that the hostility to and battle against this concept is a major reason for the sharp Party orising it being crystal clear now that this proposition is being buried by these who resist any change.

Having thus reached the crossroads, we further declare that we will continue to try to exhaust all possibilities within the Party, recognizing at the same time that we can no longer have any illusions. Possibilities for change appear to grow loss and less with each passing day.

At this lete hour, only a number of sharp and serious steps by the National Committee would be convincing evidence of a decisive change. Among such stops would be included:

- A. A forthright repudiation of the characterization of our convention as revisionist by foreign parties.
- b. An equally forthright rejection of the proposition that the cause of the present Party crisis is revisionism.
- o. Public reaffirmation of the policy of "fighting side by side with all who struggle for Socialism and seeking to cooperate with all socialist-minded Americans to achieve Socialism" (Promble to Party constitution) and working to implement that policy at every point as a major Party task.
- d. An open letter to the comrades who have left our Party which would be frankly self-critical of our slowness in carrying out the convention decisions. Such a letter should express the hope that these people wilk in their own way attempt to evercome the fragmentation of experienced Marxist cadre which has already taken place, and convey the willingness of the Party to assist in this wherever it is accoptable and in whatever form is possible (i.e. study groups, forume, clubs, and er any other avenue in which people can continue to study and work together with or without the participation of present Party members)

- So A frank statement that a regressing is necessary, inclusive of those who have left as well as those who remain in the Party, legalizing discussion along these lines, and expressing the need for finding ways of carrying it out in the near future occupied with the taking of actual stops to do so.
- f. Taking a number of immediate organizational measures that will help manathe Party in the above direction including:
  - Shifting of staff personnel to climinate obstructionists to such observe
  - -- Making the present structure of the Party more flexible so that member ship in the present type of Party club is not necessarily a requiremember for adherence to the erganization
  - --- Moving the national office to Chicago forthwith.
  - Stops to bring into line any Party organization that defice the line of the National Convention.
- g. Opening a discussion of a Party program in an atmosphere of free discuss and with an approach in keeping with the decision of the convention on traced to think through our problems on the basis of the most careful study of the American seems.
- h. Instructing all national sub-committees and bodies of the Party, and most especially the Educational Committee and "Folitical Affairs", to develop policies and enterial supporting and implementing the policies and spirit of the 16th convention.
- Regular and frequent issuance of a real discussion bulletin in which the views of the membership can be expressed.

Only such a series of setions and more along similar lines affords any hope of halting further lesses and disintegration and of realizing whatever possibilities for change still remain in the Party.
