

SOVIET EX-AIDE FREED

U. S. Editor Tells of Yiddish Writers' Rehabilitation

MOSCOW, Aug. 18 (UP)—A New York Jewish newspaperman said today that Solomon A. Lozovsky, former Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister, had been rehabilitated along with a number of Yiddish writers arrested during the Stalin era. Dr. Chaim Shoskes, editor of the Yiddish

language Day-Jewish Journal, said that Mr. Lozovsky, the Soviet Government's chief spokesman during World War II, was arrested in 1949 on trumped up charges of plotting against Stalin. He disappeared mysteriously along with a group of Yiddish writers, Dr. Shoskes said.

The New York journalist, who has been in the Soviet Union for twelve days, said he had learned that all the victims now have been rehabilitated and "proper amends" made to their families.
