

NAGY IS SEEN BACK IN HUNGARIAN PARTY

Former Premier Imre Nagy, the "Malenkov of Hungary," has been readmitted to the Hungarian Workers (Communist) party, the Yugoslav Communist organ Borba reports.

The Borba account indicates that Mr. Nagy was readmitted without having been forced to recant his views. Earlier this month the new first secretary of the Workers party, Erno Gero, declared that Mr. Nagy would be readmitted only if he accepted the party policy.

Mr. Nagy was ousted as Premier in April, 1955, after almost two years during which he had tried to recast Hungarian economic development so as to give highest priority to raising the standard of living. His dismissal came two months after former Soviet Premier Georgi M. Malenkov's resignation and the subsequent Soviet shift from Malenkov's pro-consumer line to top priority for heavy industry.

Reports circulating in Vienna last August 18 told of Mr. Nagy's readmission having been announced secretly to high Hungarian Communist leaders. The Borba article is regarded as confirmation of these reports because the Yugoslav Communists are in a favorable position to follow Hungarian developments.
