May Day Manifesto

To the Workers and Oppressed Masses of the World:

May Day 1940 — the day of international solidarity — finds the proletariat of the world destroying itself on the battlefield of Europe in the interests of finance capital.

The world scene this May Day is one of unparalleled murder and banditry. On every hand we behold the foul fruit of capitalism in its full ripeness and rotten decay — imperialist war, plunder of small nations, ruthless inroads on the living standards of the working class, unprecedented starvation for the unemployed, brutal subjection for the colonial peoples. The new imperialist world war for the redivision of the world and its markets is gaining momentum daily. More and more nations are being drawn fully into the bloodbath: yesterday France, Great Britain and Germany, Soviet Russia and Finland; today Norway; tomorrow the whole world from pole to pole will be drawn into the conflict. Millions of the finest youth of every nation are being used as cannonfodder to create profits for the greedy Morgans, Deterdings, Krupps, Schneiders and their like.

In this black hour of reaction, when every vestige of working class rights gained by years of tireless struggle, is being erased by the lust for profits, it is necessary that we speak out clearly and firmly on the ONLY ROAD TO PEACE AND FREEDOM. The International Contact Commission for the New Communist (4th) International summons the proletariat of the whole world, regardless of all divisions of race, color, language, creed or anything else,

8th Plenum Maps Plans for Growth

The eighth plenum of the Central Committee of the R.W.L. was held over the week-end of April 20-21st. Comrades from many sections of the country deliberated over such questions as International Developments, the Russian Question. Towards Mass work, the election campaign, organization and the preparations for the 4th Convention of the R. W. L.

Conscious of the war preparations of the American capitalists, the plenum spent almost half of its time on the Organization question, developing ways and means of consolidating the organization and rooting it deeper into the class struggle.

Following the plenum a three and a half month pre-convention discussion is being organized. Documents of the Central Committee and the Political Committee will be placed in the hands of the comrades within a month. Discussion articles will be published.

What Next in Europe's Slaughter?

Germany's invasion of the Scandinavian countries, the landing of troops on Norwegian shores, brings the imperialist war to a new stage, brings it one step closer to the "total war".

Despite the wishes of England and Germany to keep the war at its low military level — the so-called "peaceful" war — until all the other big powers, especially the United States, could be involved, the theatre of war has been broadened.

In order to break out of the blockade established by England and to find an area which could be used as a stronger base for direct attack on the British Isles, Germany has beaten England to the punch and invaded Norway. Both countries are equally guilty of involving Norway.

For England, its "aid" to Norway is not at all "in the interests of small nations". During the Soviet-Finnish war Britain tried to do precisely the same thing: use the excuse of "defending" Finland to invade Scandinavia and create this new arena of war. Germany's invasion now serves the same purpose.

Another, and perhaps more important aspect, of why the war has spread to Norway, is the attempt by the belligerents to speed up the war and involve the main neutrals, Italy, the Balkans, the United States, Japan. The first phase of the present world war, i.e. the European, is rapidly spreading to involve the entire world.

Italy, at the present time is moving closer to the German camp. Fleet maneuvers of the Italians in the Mediterranean, the practically general mobilization, plus the proposed meeting of the German and Italian military staffs, is indicative of the impending spread of the war to the Balkans.

The small Balkan states are experiencing a bad case of jitters. German and British pressure for Rumanian oil and wheat is creating deep internal stress in that small country, as well as the surrounding states.

But whether directly involved in the military conflict

REVOLT GROUP STALLS UNITY TALKS

April 22 — Negotiations for unity between the Revolt Group and the RWL have unfortunately been greatly delayed. After agreeing on the agenda and actually beginning discussions on the first point, the Revolt Central Committee in effect temporarily withdrew its Negotiation Committee and engaged in an exchange of statements with the League.

The original agenda agreed to at our first session unanimously was as follows:

A — Political

1 — Defense of the Soviet Union and the Right of Self-Determination.

2 — Road to the Communist (4th) International, with sub-points on the reform of centrism, independent class activity vs. mergers, and orientation.

3 — Trotskyism

4 — Character of the Program

5 — Constitution, with subpoint: Democratic Centralism

6 — Leadership

7 — Press

8 — Class struggle problems, with subpoints on trade union, unemployed, labor defense, and Workers Control of Production.

B — Formulation Differences

C — Organization Points

1 — Central Committee

2 — Constitution

3 — Press

4 — Tasks

5 — Convention and steps towards unification.

FLURRY OF STATEMENTS

At the second session the RWL was handed a long statement and asked to give a written answer. The statement asked the RWL whether it considered that the Revolt Group had accepted the 14 Points of the International Contact Commission, and whether we agreed not to discuss the actual events of the expulsion of the Revolt comrades 2 years ago.

The League replied that since both groups had by motion accepted the 14 Points and had unanimously agreed to list OTHER differences, it remains to be seen whether the other differences are secondary or whether they vitiate the fundamental agreement. On the other point we repeated that we agreed long before not to bring up the concrete events of the Revolt split, but would only take up the political content of these past issues.

Although this statement was only verbal the Revolt Negotiation Committee accepted it and agreed to continue discussions on the Russian question. It was agreed that this statement should be put in writing and appear in the minutes of the 2nd session. Following this the session began a discussion on point 1 in the agenda: the defense of the Soviet Union and the right of self-determination.

Eight motions were presented by the RWL. Motions 1, 2, 3, 4, and 7 were accepted by Revolt.

Motions 5, 6, and 8 were tabled until they could consider them further. (The motions will be published later.) The next session was scheduled for April 12th.

Five minutes before the 3rd session was to begin the Revolt comrades called and informed the RWL that its Central Committee had instructed it to call off the session until our written statement could be studied. The session was postponed to April 16. On this date again we were given a statement by the Revolt Central Committee stating that it considered our answer, which their Negotiation Committee had accepted, unclear; that they were again calling off this session until we could answer the statement.

WANT TO JUNK AGENDA

The Statement also pointed out that since both groups accepted the 14 Points they should proceed immediately to writing a program and a constitution. In other words the Revolt Group asked that we drop the whole agenda agreed to, the discussion already begun, on the very important dispute on Russia and proceed to write a program. It must be pointed out that the 2 groups have already agreed to formulate a joint declaration of principles after the discussions are concluded. The Revolt proposal thus asks that the rest of the political agenda be junked.

The RWL has sent a reply to the Revolt comrades pointing these things out and informing the Revolt Group that we are unwilling to give up the political discussion, that we wish to go through with the agenda as agreed to.

What is behind the 2 postponements of Negotiations and the flurry of statements by the Revolt group the League is at a loss to understand. Tom Stamm, the National Secretary of the group is not in Chicago, their center, and this of course complicates discussions.

The RWL will continue as sincerely as possible to try to achieve a positive conclusion for the negotiations, to try to arrive at a rounded Marxian program.

CAPITULATES TO FASCISTS

John Hamilton of the Boston unit of the Revolutionary Workers League has been expelled from the organization for capitulation to the class enemy. Hamilton, a recent youthful recruit into the RWL from the Trotsky organization has disavowed Communism because "it is totalitarian" and states that he is "joining the fascists".

A LETTER ON SAMPLE COPIES

Comrade Editor,

Recently I received a "sample copy" of the Trotskyite Socialist Appeal. It was the March 16 copy and the first I had seen for some time.

On page 1 was an article by Goldman whooping it up for the Wagner Act, in which we were informed that it "does aid workers in their efforts to organize" and that the act was "won" by the workers as a "major concession" from the Roosevelt regime.

Of course the fact that the Labor Act has been used over and over as a strike-breaking device is concealed. Furthermore, that the act IS NOT a concession to the workers, but is part of the tendency towards the increasing intrusion of the capitalist state into employer-employee relations — that is, into the class struggle as the agent of the employers — so characteristic of decay capitalism, is also left out. Basically the Labor Act is a move toward the reactionary fascist concept that there must be "unity" between the classes.

It is a poor "Marxist" that doesn't realize this.

ONE LEADS TO THE OTHER

Furthermore, the Trotskyites are caught in a contradiction, because on page 4 of the same issue they have an article protesting (rightly so) the interference of the FBI into a New York strike situation. In other words the Trotskyites on page 1 say to the capitalist government — speaking of the NLRB — "come on in, the water is fine!" but on page 4 they say to the same capitalist government (FBI), "Keep your snouts out of our Unions"; not "understanding" of course that the door for the entry of the FBI is the NLRB.

On page 3 of this same issue we are told by the same Goldman that it is "permissible" to support "democratic" capitalism "against" fascism, but that such support must be limited to material aid and definitely — oh very definitely! — must not include political support.

The scribe does not explain what is the difference between the policy of outright support of a capitalist regime which shoots workers, and that of merely paying for the powder and lead with which such a "democratic" program is carried out. We

A Survey of Laid-Off WPA Workers

While the capitalist Congress appropriates Billions for "defense" (that is for the protection and extension of the interests of American imperialism) more than a million workers have lost such pitiful incomes as they had as a result of the layoffs which began last July 1st for all workers on WPA 18 months or more.

A recent survey brings to light the fact that despite the business "pick-up" due to the European war, 87% of these workers had not found private employment at the beginning of the winter. With 13 million unemployed this is not surprising. In fact it is surprising that the 13% found jobs.

How are these workers living? In none of the 23 cities covered in the survey was the average income as much as \$14 a week. In 10 of the 23 it was less than \$5 a week. 32% were without any public support except the rotten vegetables and wormy flour given out by the Surplus Commodities.

The following letter is quoted from the report:

"The first month was not so bad. I held back the rent and used the last pay check on groceries etc. The second month I could not pay my rent, used up my credit for groceries and had to borrow from my friends. This last month I have been forced to the wall . . . I have been forced to break up my home, give up my children, and sell the furniture."

The same capitalist government which condemns these workers to a level of social degradation below that of beasts cheerfully hands back to the capitalists millions of dollars in subsidies to Big Business.

This same capitalist government which has less care for human beings than it has for dogs (who are protected by the humane laws) will unblushingly demand that these workers and their sons become cannon fodder in the coming war for "democracy" — that is the for the "democratic" right to starve in the midst of plenty and the "democratic" right to die for Wall Street profits.

The smashing of this capitalist starvation and murder machine is the first and foremost task of the American workers — the ENEMY IS AT HOME!

suggest to the editors of the Appeal that they turn over a whole page, or better yet, an entire issue to Goldman for the "elucidation" of this question. He will probably need it for any intelligent and class conscious worker will reject such trumpery.

Truly a "sample copy" of Trotskyist confusionism! The RWL is a much smaller group than the SWP, but I am glad to belong to a group that takes a

sound Marxist position on the key questions of the class struggle and for which I do not have to blush in defending it before workers. In politics of the working class today it is **quality** that counts, not **quantity**. Only a political program of scientific and revolutionary realism can win the masses for the proletarian overthrow of capitalist society.

or not, the "neutral" imperialists are becoming more and more involved in its material aspects every minute — and that brings the "total war", the spread of the war, much closer.

A COFFIN FOR CAPITALISM

Japan threatens to take the Dutch East Indies if Holland becomes embroiled in the bloodbath. America is trying to take Greenland under its wing, and persistent cries by small Latin American countries that Britain give up its possessions in the Western Hemisphere indicate that Uncle Sam is aiming another dart at its main antagonist, Britain.

The Imperialist bloodbath and its surrounding struggles becomes more brutal and filthy each day. The fear of proletarian revolution and the fear of being exhausted economically before America, Italy, and Japan enter the carnage, makes the Allies and Germany try to restrain the tempo of slaughter.

But economic realities are stronger than their wishes. In a most literal sense the capitalists of Britain, France, Germany and the rest are being forced to dig their own graves, to undermine whatever stability still remains in the capitalist system.

The cost of war is many times what it was in the last world war. And capitalism today can afford it much less than yesterday. So right from the outset the burden is passed onto the shoulders of the working class far more than ever in history — longer hours (60 to 72), higher prices (sometimes even double and triple), a much lower standard of living, direct taxes on wages (as high as 40% on overtime wages), forced savings, and other measures are creating untold misery amongst the masses.

That misery will not take long in making itself felt. Working class and colonial revolts are inevitable in the next period. Capitalism is in a vicious circle. And with each step for greater conquest, with each spread of the war, another nail is being hammered into the capitalist coffin.

TROTSKY'S POLITICAL SINS HATCH NEW SPLITS

The Trotskyites in America are in the process of a major split. In Europe their sections have been almost completely liquidated, so that the American Party was the prop of their organization. But now the fruits of opportunism are being reaped here too.

Five years ago the RWL split from the American Trotsky organization on the question of the "French Turn" and other principled points. We opposed the liquidation of the Workers Party into the Socialists. Messrs. Cannon and Shachtman at that time were operating on the get-rich-quick policy of trying to capture the Socialists by liquidating their own party. The RWL predicted at the time that this policy would not only lead to the acceptance by the Trotskyites of many opportunist planks, to the general shift of their centrist program to the right, but that in the present period they wouldn't even have any organization gains to show for their opportunism.

Events have confirmed what we stated 100%. After entering the S. P. and then being expelled the Trotskyites went more and more to the right. They began supporting a move for a third capitalist party, the Labor Party; they came out for all sorts of parliamentary quack-schemes, in-

cluding "Ham and Eggs", Townsendism, the Wage-Hour bill, etc.; they took on more and more of a social-pacifist war position — support of the Ludlow pacifist amendment, among other things.

The Trotsky gentlemen, however, never tired of pointing to their "big" Party and their "capture" of the Socialist Youth Leagues. Now the political sins are paying their dividends. The opportunism of the official group has paved the way for a more flagrant right wing section and the present split of Shachtman, Abern, and Burnham with about 50% of the youth and adults. These "revolutionary" gentlemen are opposed to the Defense of the Soviet Union when it attacks "small capitalist" nations.

So that the official Trotskyites — when the smoke is all over will be down to about the size of the old Communist League of America; one-third the size of the Workers Party at its outset; but worse than that its program and cadres will be far to the right of the Marxist CLA.

The lessons of the Trotsky adventure should be fruitful to all those who are for "quick" unity, for "unity on minimum programs", for concessions in principle in order to gain a few new members.

In the present period especially political clarity is of decisive importance. We repeat with Lenin: better ten people on a rounded Marxian program, than ten thousand on a centrist hodge-podge.

LEGAL LYNCHING

Several members of the metropolitan police force of Atlanta, Georgia have been charged with the brutal torture with hot irons of a fifteen year old Negro boy. On the heels of this chance expose of the medieval methods used by the police force to obtain confessions, ten members of the Ku Klux Klan, two of who are deputy sheriffs, were indicted by the Fulton County Grand Jury of Georgia as members of a band of night-riding floggers who had terrorized the Atlanta area for a year.

Those accused, of course, represent only a few of those who compose the "secret lynchings" that have murdered black and white workers throughout the South. A white Southerner recently wrote a pamphlet dealing with secret lynchings in the South. It shows that not only is the Negro lynched by a howling public mob of sadistic men, women and children, but very often by a select few in the dead of the night.

HOW ABOUT LEGAL LYNCHING?

All this throws some light on the Anti-Lynch bill now before Congress. In the first place this bill has an anti-labor clause in it, which if passed, will tend to prohibit mass picketing and workers defense squads. But secondly the bill nowhere provides punishment for the police who legally shoot and torture large numbers of innocent Negro (and white) workers each year with impunity.

Furthermore it makes no provisions for the secret lynchings by such labor-hating outfits as the K. K. K. in collusion with the police and the business men of the South.

Howard Kester, president of the Sharecroppers Union, stated at a meeting in Chicago that in those areas where black and white workers have been organized in the same union there has been no lynchings.

The unity of black and white workers has proven to be a thousand times more effective in stopping lynching than any anti-lynch bill. Only through this unity in unions, political parties, strikes, demonstrations, and other militant activity — and not by any fake bills in Congress — can lynching be wiped out completely.

UNCLE SAM'S STAKE IN THE WAR

The Dies Committee deserves star billing this fortnight. They have been in conflict with everyone from Browder to Roosevelt. Like the Christian Front trial with the FBI stooge Healy, the Pelley case also brought out a Miss Waring who was working for Uncle Sam all the time. The British movie director Alfred Hitchcock would have done a more artistic job of it.

Mr. Dies doesn't seem as clear as Mr. Hitchcock about plot and camera angles. While investigating un-American activities it would not be bad to investigate the raid on Communist Party headquarters in Philadelphia, and the hustling of the seized records out of the state. Judge Welsh of Philadelphia issued a warrant to arrest the officers who performed the raid, on the grounds of "conspiracy to violate the Bill of Rights and the Civil Liberties Statutes."

Later Federal Judge Letts released Frankfeld and O'Dea, the Communist Party members who had been jailed by the Dies Committee on contempt charges, because their constitutional rights had been violated.

SPEECHES ARE ILLEGAL

New York: Governor Lehman signed the McLaughlin bill to permit children in the public schools to be absent for religious observance and education... 27,000 employes of New York City's rapid transit systems will be finger-printed and their records checked...

10,000 persons who assembled at the Eternal Light in Madison Square for a peace rally on Army Day saw 13 men arrested for holding exercises without a license. The men placed a wreath and one of them said "I dedicate this wreath to all American seamen who lost their lives in the last war. I hope their sacrifice will teach us a lesson." Placing the wreath was not illegal but the speech was...

Sixteen of the fifty-three persons arrested for picketing the French Consulate on behalf of Spanish loyalist prisoners in France, have been sentenced to the work-house. They were not given extra time for wearing out the shoes of the horses the police rode at them.

The Board of Higher Education after reconsideration ousted Bertrand Russell from his teaching post at New York University. To clinch the argument, Mayor La Guardia quietly cut the position out of the budget. Now if Russell wins in the courts it will be a moral victory only.

OVERSEAS DEMOCRACY

From two other democratic countries: France has decreed that advocating communism is treason punishable by death... The London Police prevented between 2,000 and 3,000 demonstrators from marching on the French Embassy to deliver a resolution protesting the arrest of 44 French Communist deputies... And in Northern Rhodesia British troops killed ten African natives and wounded twenty others who were striking in the copper mines.

Best note of the week: The Polish government in exile seems to have changed its attitude toward the Jews, at least for the moment. An official delegates' council of all Polish Jews meets in Angers, war capital of Poland, and keeps in touch with the Polish government there "on the basis of friendly Polish-Jewish cooperation." Which reminds us of a mediaeval saw "When the devil was ill, the devil a monk would be. When the devil was well, the devil a monk was he."

lightly ignored by the Indian textile-worker, slaving for starvation wages so that Manchester can maintain its textile dominance.

Lying French Imperialism, also prattles about "democracy", while millions of French workers are working 60 to 72 hours a week, are being deprived of every single workers right fought for and gained in the last 150 years; while millions of colonials in Indo-China, Morocco, and Equatorial Africa are being starved and slaughtered in the interests of the French Capitalists.

German Imperialism, like its British and French kin, shouts of "living-space" and the right of self-determination, while it destroys one small nation after another, while it throws hundreds of thousands of workers into concentration camps to be slowly starved or murdered in the dead of night. And what is true of German, French and British Imperialism is just as equally true of American, Japanese and Italian Imperialism.

The world crisis of capitalism has reached unheard-of proportions. The desperation of capitalism leads it to untold actions of barbarism, to the most brazen blood-bath of all history.

The neutral nations and the small nations merely play the part of puppets in the hands of one or the other of the great imperialist powers. The Balkans, the Scandinavian countries, Belgium, the Netherlands, Spain, all find themselves subordinated to the interests of the groups of finance capitalists, fighting for world domination.

DOMINATION OF THE EARTH

The question at dispute — for which millions of innocent boys are to lay down their lives — is who shall dominate the world markets, reap the profits from the robbery of the colonial masses and the workers everywhere. The main antagonists in the dispute are British and American Imperialism. The main loot lies in Asia; the present war is only a first step in the direction of the plunder of Asia, where Japanese Imperialism has already consolidated a temporary foothold. Every nation — even those not yet directly involved in the military struggles — is already involved in the war; especially the strongest of the so-called neutrals, American Imperialism.

The United States, like a vulture, hovers over the battle-fields, waiting for the opportune moment to swoop down and throw her weight and wealth into the struggle wherever it offers the most advantage. Every day brings the war plans of the United States capitalists nearer to fruition; every day finds the American working class more tightly shackled to the chariot of militarism.

The capitalists everywhere want to be victorious in this war so they can continue to



oppress the millions of unfortunate wage slaves in the world today. The workers of the world must everywhere work for the defeat of their "own" capitalists and their armed forces in this war, must continue the class struggle until the imperialist war is turned into a civil war.

DEFEND THE SOVIET UNION

The working class has no interests in defending any capitalist nation. It is interested in defending only the one Workers State in the Soviet Union, where capitalist property relations have been destroyed and the property relations of a Workers Society established. And it must defend that state despite the domination of the Stalinist bureaucracy, the parasitic caste which has tightly grasped the reins of the Soviet State and is steering its course back towards capitalist restoration. Only in a political revolution against Stalinism can the Soviet masses protect their October and extend it to the rest of the world. **DEFEND THE SOVIET UNION DESPITE AND AGAINST STALINISM!**

FOR THE PROLETARIAN REVOLUTION

The Second World War, like the first has its traitors and renegades in the ranks of the proletariat. The whole Second International stands today on the side of Anglo-French Imperialism. The Third International, born in the struggle against social-patriotism in the last War, has itself succumbed to patriotism on the side of the German Imperialists, the bandits on the other side of the fence.

The centrist London Buro and the centrist Trotskyites, both wings, stand on the platform of social-pacifism, of deceiving the proletariat with impossible dreams of peace without civil war.

Against these forces the International Contact Commission raises its voice to again reaffirm the lessons of the first World War.

Today, on historic May Day, celebrated as international labor's day of struggle, the I.C.C. sends its call to all the workers, all the toiling peasants, all the colonial masses of the world:
