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Showdown In Asia Near For

U.S.-Japan

RICHES AMERICA UNRELENTING FOR AS!A

The new crisis in the Far East brings nearer the day of full American participation in the second imperialist world war. The Pacific situation cannot be met by American finance capital in the same way that the European and African conflict are: by serving as supply agency for Britain. The simple fact is that Britain is in no position, either from a military and naval, or from an economic standpoint, to wage effective war in the Pacific. Moreover revolt in India aims like an arrow at the heart of the Empire, and direct involvement in the war will accelerate the revolutionization of India's masses a thousandfold.

What are the factors militating for and against speedy war in Eastern Asia? 1) Japan's golden opportunity to extend her control

over the priceless Dutch E. Indies, war is Britain's vacillation. Eiththe Malay peninsula, Burma and India — which would also have the advantage of cutting the Chinese life-line. 2) England's weak position and Germany's growing need for a full-force blow at the Empire. 3) America's chance once and for all to establish her own hegemony in the Pacific and ultimately over all of Asia. These are the basic roots of the war threat. Needless to state, there are dozens of other conditions related to or growing out of these basic imperialist rivalries, also creating the basis for a conflict. But the conjuncture of these three factors is what makes the war unavoidable.

OPPOSITION TO WAR NOW

On the opposite side, chief factor in delaying this phase of the er she must make undreamed of concessions to Japan or she must watch her possessions fall to Uncle Sam. American imperialism shows no disposition to pull British chestnuts out of the fire unless she pulls them out in her own interest. One of the chief bones of contention between Britain and the U.S. has been the Singapore naval and air base. America wants this key in her own hands, and Britain is slowly being forced into a position where she must relinquish it.

A minor source of opposition to this war arises from those American capitalist groups whose inter-

ests parallel those of the Japanese Mitsui and Mitsubishi houses.- It must be born in mind that well over half of America's export trade with southern and eastern Asia (including the Philippin-

es) is with Japan. On the other hand America imports far more from the tiny colony of British Malaya than from Japan. And Japanese gold keeps flowing in an endless stream into Uncle Sam's coffers. Over six million dollars in Japanese gold entered the United States in January of this year.

But it is inconceivable that American capitalism will allow its golden opportunity to pass for the sake of these small profits. Eastern and southern Asia constitute one of the world's greatest store houses of raw materials for modern industry: an untold wealth of ore and oil reserves, agricultural products, seaports, etc.

Under these circumstances America moves full speed ahead to control of the Orient.

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Latest Stalin Deal with Hitler **Encircles Soviets Further**

The latest German "bloodless" victories in practically taking over the whole Balkans indicate that there is another deal, or at least the consummation of an old "deal." between the German imperialists and Stalinism. It is unthinkable that Germany could force Bulgaria and Jugoslavia to the Axis without the passive or active aid of the Soviets. And it is equally unthinkable that Stalinism made this move without getting something substantial in return.

What did Stalinism get? Obviously it could be only one of several things:

a-Concessions in Afganistan and to push into India or to increase its influence in Persia.

b-A free hand to take over the rest of Finland.

c-A free hand to control the Dardanelles or other parts of the Balkans.

d-Concessions from Japanese imperialism in Asia.

Not having access to the files of the imperialists and Stalinism we can only guess at which of these was made part of the deal. Most likely Stalinism and the Soviets did not get a free hand to take the rest of Finland. Ever since the Russo-Finnish war, German imperialism has taken the place formerly held by Britain, of subsidizing Finland and equipping her for an attack against the Soviet Union. The German plunderers understand today as they understood yesterday that Finland is the "key to Russia" - to use the words of an old German general. So that German technicians have been busy rearming Finland and help-

ing build a new line of fortifications against the Soviet Union .

STALINISM "GAINS" - THE WORKERS LOSE

Stalinism thus probably got the right to take either the Dardanelles or Afganistan - or possibly both.

The significance of this deal is far-reaching indeed. The outstanding part of it, however, is that the Soviet Union is again weakened RELATIVELY to Germany. At each stage of this game "deals" German imperialism of takes the lion's share and gives Stalinism secondary or minor concessions, preparing all the time for the inevitable conflict that will follow between the Soviet Union and Germany.

The scheme of Germany is to en-

In the midst of a swelling tide of strikes in the war industries. one of the most important events in the labor movement in recent years will take place with the convening of the national conference between the United Mine Workers of America and the soft coal operators in New York on March 11. All the members of the national government are fearful of the consequences of a national coal strike, especially in this period of furious war production. The demands of the miners are not yet clear.

But the needs of the workers are for:

1-a 25 or 30 hour week with no reduction in pay. This would take care of the hundred of thousands of unemployed miners who have been thrown out of the industry

Waller Appeal Goes to Court Join the Fight to Save Waller

In the paper of a small organization whose members are now busy acting as errand boys for the Socialist-leadership of the Workers Defense League, a number of lies and slanders are again repeated against the Revolutionary Workers League and the Richmond Waller Defense Committee which has received our support.

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We regret that we have to again utilize space to answer this group of professional slanderers.

Slander number one states that the Workers Defense League is now a sole organization which has jurisdiction in the Waller Case, the case of the Negro sharecropper framed in Virginia for the murder of his landlord and who was saved through the efforts of the R.W.L. months before the WDL enterd the case. The facts are as follows:

a-NO organization has power of attorney in the Waller case. Attorney Thos. H. Stone, originally employed by the RWL to represent Waller at his trial last year, still has that power of attorney. All lawyers who participate, participate with his permission.

b-Not only the Richmond Waller Defense Committee --- the first organization to defend Waller and the Workers Defense League. but other local and even national groups now exist that are fighting this case (or are in the process of formation).

ASKED FOR UNITED FRONT

Slander number two speaks of the fact that the RWL refused to permit the WDL to handle the case because we wanted to set up a dual defense organization. This is an outright and conscious lie. RWL originally proposed to the WDL that they organize a Waller Committee in which all political and labor organizations could be represented; that the RWL would take its place in such a committee with minority voice commensurate with its size. This offer was rejected by the WDL. They insisted that we withdraw completely from the case and that no political organizations be involved. Under the circumstances we were to defend Waller ALONE period of three most crucial months in the case.

Meanwhile activity in a number of cities have netted small gains in publicity and finances for the freedom of Waller. Affairs in Chicago, Washington, Philadelphia, New York and elsewhere have brought in funds for the case. In Chicago, despite the attempts of the local leadership of the paper Workers Defense League to exclude the Chicago Waller Derense Committee, a united front protest meeting with various trade unions has been organized for March 12th.

New Deal Southern Liberal Hopes to White-wash Va. Court in Waller Case

RICHMOND, Feb. 18- An Editorial appeared in the Richmond TIMES-DISPATCH on Feb. 16th, written by a leading southern New Deal liberal, Virginius Dabney, on the Waller Case. Among many mistatements the editorial says, "When Waller got the Chair at Chatham, he was represented by something called the American Revolutionary Workers Defense League of Chicago. That alone was almost enough to ruin his chances for getting an objective

How A Labor Party Fights ' War

One of the arguments used to win the American workers to support of the war is that the British Labor Party is supporting it. And to workers who recognize the need for workers' rule, liberals and Social Democrats point to the "socialistic" speeches of Ernest Bevin and other Labor Party spokesmen in the British Government.

What are the facts?

While Bevin, Morrison, Citrine & Co. talk of instituting "socialism", Prime Minister Winston Churchill call s on the German and Italian people to overthrow Hitler and Mussolini WITHOUT calling for the overthrow of the Nazi and Fascist regimes (and of course he is silent on the capitalist system which breeds fascism.) Bevin is the key factor cancelling all workers rights, increasing hours, etc., within Britain.

The British Government treats political refugees from Germany, Austria, Italy, etc. in the manner of any reactionary capitalist government, like enemies. They are put in concentration camps.

CAPITALISTS HAVE NO CRITICISM

Wendell Willkie, open agent of J. P. Morgan & Co., after a brief visit to England to find out about the British Labor Party (among other things), comes back without a word of criticism - altho in the 1940 election campaign he accused Roosevelt of undermining capitalism.

Without going any further, these well known FACTS, not theories, should prove that the British Labor Party, like all "labor" and "farmer-labor" parties, although resting on trade union support, is a party for support of the profiit system and of capitalist war.

To workers who oppose the war but support the Stalinist "Communist" Party or Trotskyist parties (either group), these facts should prove conclusively that those leaders who call for the building of a Labor Party in this country are, despite radical phrases to the contrary, objectively are SUPPORTERS OF THE WAR. Expose the labor fakers who support the capitalist bloodbath!

hearing. This group of ultra-radical professional agitators is no longer handling the Waller Defense, and the current approach is much more conservative." They inform their readers that Atty., Finnerty is handling the case for the Workers Defense League.

First, there is no such organization as the American Revolutionary Workers Defense League of Chicago. They are possibly refering to the Revolutionary Workers League of the United States, that did not handle the case, but was founder of the case and the most active participant in the Richmond Waller Defense Committee which did handle the case. Second, they state that the Workers Defense and Finnerty are now handling the case. This is also false. Attorney Stone is the counsel in charge with Finnerty as an associate along with several other Nerro Attornevs. The Richmond Waller Defense Committee remains as active legally and in the class strucgle defense of Waller today as it did at the first trial.

WDL "MORE CONSERVATIVE"

Third, the editorial says the "ultra-radical professional agitators" (read, class struggle policy) no longer handle the case — while a "more conservative" (read class collaboration) policy is in charge of the case. At least the New Deal liberals recognize in the Workers Defense League, (which has the active support of the Socialists, Cannonites, Shachtmanites, Stalinites and the leaders of the NAACP) - their friends and class collaborationists.

Fourth, and probably most important, this editorial written by someone very friendly with Pauli Murray, WDL representative who has had many conversations with again is very insulting to Waller and insinuates that he was not only milter but that he shot his landlord in the back in a cowardly fashion.

WORK GOING ON

The RWL and the Richmond and affiliated committees are still working on the line. As the date for Waller's execution - pending a reprieve, which will probably be issued - draws near on March 15. the Richmond Committee has again asked the Workers Defense League to help organize a coordinating committee to coordinate the work of ALL the groups now busy defending Waller. The WDL has not yet committed itself definitely on this point.

The British capitalist profits rise, labor's living standards fall, the colonial millions suffer increasing oppression. The British Indian leaders are all in jail.

Bill Green, to whom the very idea of Socialism is "un-Ameriaan", parades Sir Walter Citrine of

General Krivitsky, former Soviet agent, leader of the raids on the revolutionists in Spain, who later repudiated his master Stalin, was shot to death in a Washington hotel. Some local authorities, the Stalinists and others say it was suicide. Stalin's enemies say it was another Stalinist murder. Indications are that it was indirectly a Stalinist murder. But for us, strange as it may seem to some liberals, the whole affair is of no interest to the working class.

To place Krivitsky's death in the same category as Trotsky's murder, the Zinoviev, Bukharin trials, etc., would be false. Trotsky and the others, even though not Marxists, were revolutionists; while Krivitsky left Stalin only to move over to the exploiters, became a stoolpigeon for the Dies Committee, worked with Kerensky and American Imperialism. We do not concern ourselves with the death of such person.

For the murder of such persons as Nin, Wolff, Trotsky, and several of his family, we have an entirely different position. For these crimes Stalinism will have to answer to the working class. The murder of the stoolpigeon Krivitsky by the OGPU is none of our affair.

WHY THE NLRA WAS PASSED

William Knudsen, director of the Office of Production Management of the government and former General Motors President, gives the working class an excellent lesson in why "pro-labor" laws are passed, in his testimony on Feb. 19 before the House Judiciary Committee.

When a Congressman remarked that "The CIO strikes", Knudsen pointed out, "When you put the is running your plants today by virtue of the sitdown National Labor Relations Act on the books you settled our question (of sitdown strikes)". The NLRA, according to Knudsen "started another era of industry in America".

In other words the Labor Relations Board and its election system which the reformists and centrists hail as a blessing to labor, was merely a small sop by the capitalist government given while taking the most effective strike weapon used in American labor history.

The phoney election system and all its month and year delays was introduced by the capitalists so that the workers' reformist leadership would only give up the sitdown which was winning one demand after another.

The Greeks had a word for this: "Beware of the gods who bear gifts." Only independent labor action — including the effective sitdown and slowdown strikes — can bring any results for labor.

LOVESTONE LIQUIDATES

The Lovestone Group, which lately called itself the Independent Labor League has formally liquidated. It started out in 1928 as the right wing communist group, in bloc with Stalinism, the centre, against the Marxist left Opposition. It ended up by moving through centrism to open reformism in policy until its conference a few months ago adopted the policy of Lovestones' support to American and British Imperialism against "Fascism".

The Lovestone group formally dissolved to enable their forces to work within the "democratic" imperialist camp, as their London Buro brothers are doing in England and other parts of the world.

The Stalinites call Lovestone a counter-revolutionist and try to white-wash themselves. But their policy, since the days of the expulsion of the Left Opposition from the Comintern has been of the same brand. First the Stalinists supported the democratic front "bourgeois-democratic" imperialists against the Fascist imperialists and with the Hitler-Stalin Pact are now stooges of German imperialism in the worldwide game of imperialist war. The only difference between Lovestone and Browder is that while Browder supported at one time or the other both camps of the imperialists, Lovestone "only" supported the "democratic" camp of the imperialists. It is heads and tails of the same coin.

FERMENT IN AUTO INDUSTRY

On February 11th, a very significant ruling was made by Dr. George W. Taylor, the Labor umpire for General Motors and the Automobile Workers. The ruling sustained the right of a company to dismiss workers in so-called "unauthorized" strikes.

Ever since the growth of the United Auto Workers, both the burocrats and the companies have been trying to keep in check the militant spirit of the men which settles grievances by mass action at the point of production. In issues of the Fighting Worker, dated all the way back to 1937, we pointed out the dangers of the burocrats being able to check these so-called "unauthorized" strikes. Now, with the aid of a so-called impartial umpire,- a vicious device which favors class-collaboration in the companies -----Mssrs. Thomas, Frankensteen & Company are moving full speed ahead to squelch the energy of the masses. The auto workers must renew their fight for complete local autonomy, for the right to initiate action by the rank and file. Only in this way can they further the gains made by the strikes in 1936 and 1937.

their robber moves and thus demoralizes sincere workers opposed to the war.

The various ultra-lefts and liberals take great comfort from these events. They point to them as "confirmation" that the Soviet Union is "red imperialism" on the march. Our good friends, however, again as in the past, forget history. An isolated state, victorious in a revolution, must either march forward or retrogress. The failure of Russian revolution to spread to other nations has caused the successive deterioration of the property relations and social relations within Russia. The form of the state has even taken on a violently oppressive character. But this is nothing new in history. Anyone who has studied the French Revolution of 1789 has noted similar things which took place at that time.

The bourgeois revolution, which set out to abolish slavery, for a period re-legalized it and enforced it in San Domingo, richest colony of France of that period. The revolution which was to free the serfs and re-distribute land, revoked the seizure of the land by the serfs. And so on and so forth,

A revolution is not an immaculate conception, pure and of the whole cloth. It is a process. The October 1917 revolution of Russia expropriated the capitalists and took the first DECISIVE step to-

ward eliminating exploitation of man by man. After 23 years, without a victory elsewhere, the revolution under Stalinism has gone backward. And precisely because of the non-Marxian policy of Stalinism, and the Soviet weak position — its isolation, its weak economy, etc. — the Soviet Union is placed in a position where Stalinism, in order to keep

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circle the Soviet Union, from the tip of the Arctic down to the Black Sea. To accomplish this without exposing itself to a war on two fronts Germany gives Russia a few square miles of territory in Finland, while she takes for herself WITH STALINISM'S PERMIS-SION AND BLESSING, the rest of Finland (now a virtual protectorate). Russia gets one part of Poland, Germany gets the key industrial centers. Russia gets the small Baltic nations, German imperialism gets Norway and Sweden. Russia gets Bessarabia. Hitler gets all of Rumania, Yogoslavia, and Bulgaria. Stalinism - play-

ing pure power-politics of the imperialists gets a little; German imperialism gets the bulk of the booty and is inmeasurably strengthened in relation to its next enemy, the Soviet Union.

Furthermore the deals not only weaken the Soviet Union in relation to the various imperialist powers, but they weaken the Soviet Union FROM WITHIN as well. The strengthening of the imperialists makes the Soviet war preparations more feverish. The purely capitalist politics of Stalinism is meeting with such passive resistance within Russia that stern measures are being taken to liquidate further the October Revolution. The work week has been lengthened. Workers are prohibited from leaving their jobs. The burocracy becomes even more vicious — if that is possible.

STALIN'S NEW BLOW AT REVOLUTION

With hunger facing western Europe, with discontent raging in Germany as well (see INTERNA-TIONAL NEWS, March, 1941 for uncensored detail) this would be an excellent oportunity for a Marxian leadership to undermine not only German Imperialism, which has dozens of armed divisions facing the Soviet borders, but the rest of the capitalist world. Instead, the Stalinist policy acts as a prop to the Axis powers; it gives them renewed life; it supports in power, must use repressive and brutal measures and must play purely capitalist (and subservient) politics.

But the basic feature of the revolution still remain. Despite the New deal with Germany, here for the first time is a state which has made the first great step toward liberation from the chaos of the conitalist market — now wor'dwide in score. Here is a state with a planned economy based on increased production of USEFUL commodities (despite Stalinism). These basic factors the Marxists and workers everywhere will defend with their last drop of blood. FXPOSE THE DEAL WITH

torrent of vicious chauvinistic propaganda against Japan. Hitler's "undemocratic" theory of Aryan race supremacy is countered by Hull's "democratic" theory of a "yellow peril". Naval officers testify before Congress for the fortification of Guam. It will be recalled that this proposal of Roosevelt's was twice defeated in the past. There is every reason to expect that it will carry this time.

The British and Dutch colonies are being moved into America's sphere step by step. Australian and Netherlands East Indian ministers confer with Roosevelt on a joint program against Japan. In the Philippines enormous re-enforcements to the army are being made under the draft law.

Meanwhile America prepares for war by first carefully waging "peace". Economic sanctions against Japan become more stringent daily. It is now virtually impossible for Japan to receive oil or gasoline from the United States. Add to this the ban on steel scrap exports, on machine tool exports, and others now in effect or pending. It becomes clear to all but knaves and fools that America is making giant strides forward in the Orient. Thus a new sector of the world is being swept into the cauldron of imperialist war. The second International stands idly by and the Third International contends itself with licking Stalin's boots. Meanwhile hundreds of millions of workers thruout the world seek for the way out. Only the New (4th) Communist International can fulfil this mission. Only the overthrow of the colonial and semicolonial regimes and the liberation of the colonial peoples, combined with a proletarian revolution in the west can end this ever-spreading slaughter.

Coal Miners Hold Key to Strike Wave

Main Danger Is Lewis Leadership Which Gave Up 26 Demands In 1939

in recent years as a result of the new loading machine devices and other technical improvements.

2-A minimum yearly wage in order to offset the effect of layoffs and the stagger system.

3-Demand for more safety devices in the mines to stop accidents.

Coal mining is one of the three or four most hazardous jobs in the country. Last year, for instance, there were 1420 accidents in the mines, 342 more than the year before. In the state of West Virginia, for instance, of 500 mines all but 10% meet the minimum requirements of the state department of mines.

HAZARDOUS OCCUPATION

Furthermore not only are the mines unsafe but the miners homes in most mine towns are equally death-traps. In W. Pittston recently for instance 3 full blocks of homes and buildings caved in as a result of the careless method used by the Sullivan Trail Coal

Company.

The struggle of the miners for better conditions and a minimum yearly pay is one of the most important events on labor's agenda. A victory for 338,000 miners in soft coal and the many more dozen thousands in hard coal would undoubtedly result in similar improvements elsewhere.

Unfortunately, however, the leadership of the miners still remains in the hands of America's outstanding labor burocrat, John L. Lewis. The miners still remember that in 1939 Lewis gave up 26 of the miners demands for better pay, better working conditions, etc. in return for a promise by the mine owners of a "union" shop, which would help Lewis continue collecting his dues while excluding the rival AFL organization, the Progressive Miners of America.

NO FAITH IN LEWIS

The mine workers have been saddled to Lewis' burocratic setup for 20 years. In that period ARIST MOVES OF AMERICAN he has broken many a strike and IMPERIALISM!

thrown out thousands of militants. He has divided the ranks of the miners by signing contracts with the soft coal operators that end a month or so before the contract with the hard coal men.

The struggle against the mine owners will never be won so long as the miners keep Lewis at the helm. They must organize now into progressive groups to wean the membership away from this gangster-ridden burocracy and to re-establish a democratic union on a militant policy. The struggle against the boss includes the strugle against the capitalist agents in labor's ranks.
