Hands Off The Italian Revolution Neither Badoglio, Amgot, Nor the Bloc of 5 Parties FOR A SOCIALIST SOVIET ITALY!

Another major act that will end the Imperialist War has begun—the Social Revolution in Italy. The capitalist structure, weakened in every pillar, has cracked in one of its weakest link, Italy. But the chain of events which brings forth the Revolution now in Italy, will soon cross the borders into France, the Balkans, Germany, and eventually the United States, Britain and Asia.

As predicted and as emphasized by the Revolutionary Workers League and the International Contact Commission all these years, the imperialist war and the proletarian Revolution are linked together. One or the other will survive the present cataclysm. Either the proletariat will destroy once and for all the system of class oppression with its wars, its bread lines, its hunger and its misery, and establish Workers Council Republics all over the world; OR Imperialism (both in its Fascist forms and in its Bourgeois forms and in its Bourgeois Democratic forms) will continue to murder off the flower of humanity in incessant and recurring bloodbaths for world market and colonies.

There are no other alternatives!

FIRST IMPORTANT BLOW

The Italian proletariat has delivered a telling blow. After 21 years under the yoke of Fascism, after 21 years of a devastating dictatorship which destroyed their Parties, their Unions, and their democratic rights, the workers of Milan, Turin, Rome, Naples have with one fell blow overthrown the rotten Fascist structure. It remains for them now merely to complete the task, to march forward until every vestige of capitalism is destroyed in Italy and a Soviet Republic set up in its place.

The Italian proletariat has given the lie to all those pessimists and fatalists who doubted that the proletariat would fight once again, who thought that Fascism was "permanent," who long ago lost hope in the cause of the Workers' Revolution. The Italian working class recovered with a resiliency that was truly heartening. One day after the fall of Mussolini workers in Milan demonstrated, according to the press, with slogans of "Long Live Socialism." After twenty years the Milan workers remembered to avenge the Fascist murder of Matteotti, the Socialist deputy. The murderer was given speedy justice by the demonstrators. After twenty-one years without Unions and without Parties, except small underground groups, the workers are beginning to seize the factories again, to organize factory committees, and without a doubt, in the next few days they will organize Workers Councils, if they are not already in existence now.

Is This A People's War?

The Italian Revolution is today only in its first stages but it poses many problems and many possibilities. The working class everywhere must rise up to the defense of the workers of Milan, Turin and Rome. The lessons of the past twenty-six years must be absorbed and utilized so that the workers of Italy do not go down to another defeat, as did the workers of Spain, Germany, China, Britain, Austria and countless other sections of the world working class since 1917.

In a spirit of true international working class solidarity the International Contact Commission, with groups and organizations in Germany ,the United States, Great Britain, Australia and elsewhere, wishes to pose the following problems:

MILITARY DICTATORSHIP

1—The Badoglio government is a reactionary military dictatorship, a capitalist dictatorship just like its predecessor the Mussolini regime. It had the blessings from the outset of the majority wing of the Fascist Grand Council, with whom Badoglio has cooperated for almost two dozen years. The Badoglio government can not bring a lasting peace; it can not establish a stable regime in Italy. It is an imperialist government that stands between a victorious allied army on the one hand and a marching proletariat on the other. Rather than permit the working class to overthrow capitalism, Badoglio like Petain and Laval before him will call upon the imperialist armies of. Great Britain and the United States to aid the Italian capitalists against the Proletarian Revolution.

2—The Badoglio government is merely a stopgap placed in power by the Milan and Rome bankers to check the working class. If it succeeds we can expect a new Fascist government in Italy.

BLOC OF FIVE PARTIES

3—The "block of five parties" in Milan—composed of liberal, Catholic, Socialist and Stalinist parties—is nothing more nor less than the Italian version of the Kerensky government of 1917, or the Scheideman-Independent government of 1918 in Germany, or the People's Fronts in France and Spain in 1936-38. Its only purpose will be to canalyze the proletariat's energy, to tie them securely to the capitalist chariot and to confuse and demoralize the working class so that the bourgeoisie can finish the job of setting up a new Fascist regime, without Mussolini, but with all his principles and some additional brutality. A "democratic" regime in Italy today is **impossible**. With its present economic decay, the loss of the Italian colonies, the ravages and expenses of war, the Italian capi-

talists can grant absolutely no concessions whatsoever to the working masses. If nevertheless "democracy" is established for a few months (or a year) it will mean only that rather than have the proletariat destroy the whole capitalist system, rather than have the workers take over all the productive wealth of the nation and expropriate the capitalists-rather than this the Italian finance capitalists would install a "democratic" regime to still the storm, to demoralize the Revolution until the Italian Kornilov (or Hitler) can be found and prepared to once again smash the Revolutionary Movement. The reformist block of five Parties is a trap a hundred times more dangerous than the openly reactionary Badoglio government. And it will become still more dangerous because the centrists everywhere will undoubtedly give it support (with "criticism"). But there can be no choice in Italy-it must be either Fascism again or Communism. Any attempt at an intermediate regime-at a "democratic" government of the reformists, or a"workers and farmers government" of the centrist Trotskyites and Independent Labor Party-such attemps at intermediate regimes merely undermine the Revolution and pave the way for the restoration of Fascism.

Even if such a liberal government comes to power we will not support it in any way, whether it fights with Germany against the Allies or with the Allies against Germany. We are not defensists until we have a Soviet Socialist Republic.

ROBBER'S PEACE

4-The Allied Imperialists will enforce upon Italy a robber's peace, a "peace" of indemnities, of stolen territory, of class oppression. The Allied Imperialists today as in 1918 (and probably more so) will aid and act as the vanguard of the Italian counter-revolution. As the I.C.C. and the Revolutionary Workers League have long pointed out, the Allies have chosen the moment of social uprising for their "second front." They have indicated that they understand much better than Stalin and the reformists and centrists how closely the Imperialist War and the Revolution are interlinked. Churchill and Roosevelt choose to take care of major problems first-and their major task is the liquidation of the proletarian revolution. The revolutionary workers of Great Britain and the United States condemn in advance the robbers' peace that will be imposed upon Italy. We demand that not a soldier, not a penny be used by the Allies for the counter-revolution in Italy. We demand the evacuation of Sicily, Libya, Tunisia, and all the other occupied lands Continued on Page 3

I was arrested Friday between 10:00 and 10:30 P.M., August 6 Hustings Court on March 15, 1942 as I left the apartment building where à friend of mine resides on Lake Park Avenue. The police- the A and B Clothing store of man, officer MacKeon said he followed me from Ellis Avenue through a connecting alley to Lake Park Avenue. Altho the alley was lit at both ends and I immediately went into the building and rang the bell and came right out again, (as no one was home); that was sufficient evidence to the officer that I was "out for no good" since there had been several alleged complaints of robbery in this neighborhood.

I was not drunk or in any way 'disorderly" and have frequently visited this friend at the same hour and even later as he works on the "swing" shift.

At eleven O'clock or so I was locked up at the Stanton Avenue station with no charges being placed against me. From the time I was arrested until the time I was locked in a cell the arresting officer continually indulged in verbal abuse, accused me of being a pocketbook snatcher, a robber, and that I had probably done something to some poor women. In answer to my denial of these charges I was called a.... liar. I told the officer the only reason he was arresting me was because I was a Negro walking along a "white" neighborhood. He replied:

Harlem Is Hungry For Food & Justice

It will be remembered that Samuel Kelly was convicted in of the larceny of some six hundred dollars worth of clothing from Richmond. It was the contention of the defense at the time that no case had been shown against Kelly, that there was no evidence identifying the clothing found in Mr. Kelly's shop, with clothing alleged to have been taken from the A & B Clothing Store, and that in fact there was no evidence that any clothing had ever been stolen from the A & B Clothing Store.

On this basis the case was taken to the Supreme Court of Appeal of Virginia. On June 8, 1943, the Supreme Court of Virginia affirmed the decision of the lower court. On June 30, the Labor Defense Congress having in the meantime entered the case at the request of Kelly, a petition for rehearing, assigning also constitutional grounds, was filed. In the meantime, while his petition was still pending Kelly has been denied bail and transferred to the penitentiary. It is anticipated that Kelly's attorneys will seek a writ of habeas corpus within the next few days.

NEW YORK POLICE.... HATED COSSACKS

The N.Y. police force is noted for its anti-Negro atitude, confirmed daily by their brutal overbearing actions, insults and oppressive acts without any justification toward the Harlem residents. When the New York papers played up and created a "mugging wave" these cops showed what mettle they were made of. Indiscriminate beatings, arrests and persecutions, even of school children were on the order of the day. Their brutalities continued until the raised ire of every decent white and colored citizen forced them to stop or be responsible for their actions.

Mayor LaGuarda has often posed as the friend of the Negro. He has been pictured by Negro leaders as the "Negro's white hope," his speeches for equality have been long and pious but yet. in spite of this Negroes rioted in N.V. against his police and he himself was booed when he attempted to address a crowd from a Harlem Police Station. There is something very rotten in New York as in every other American city. **NEGATIVE CLASS STRUGGLE**

Negro workers in Harlem, as elsewhere, are enraged over the brutal murders of Negroes in the armed forces. They are angered over the fact that with the government clamoring for workers, Negroes are still kept out of thousands of plants, and where they are hired they get the worst paying jobs.

The riots of Harlem merely express this resentment. Unfortunately without a class struggle leadership the Negroes reacted negatively. Instead of class action they resorted to individual and mob action. But the "riots" were

NEW GROUP FORMED

INCOMMUNICADO WEEK END I lived the next 44¹/₂ hours incommunicado in the bedbug and lice ridden cell block of the Stanton Avenue station. On Saturday night, 24 hours after I was taken into custody I was able to smuggle a message out to friends. When they called the Station the Officer in charge denied I was there but persistent calling and visiting forced the police to admit that I was being held there for "sus-picion of robbery," and the charges against me might include anything "from murder, rape and robbery" to "no charge at all." Roosevelt and Congress

Congress will soon be back in the Capitol to begin anew its struggle with President Roosevelt. To many it will seem self-contradictory that the bourgeois legislative arm should be so violently in opposition to the bourgeois executive branch. Such people jump to the quick conclusion that Congress represents "big business," while Roosevelt represents the "common man."

Nothing could be further from the truth, however. It is a fact that a bloc is being consolidated between certain sections of Wall Street and the small business and farm sectors. The right wing Democratic and Republicans "unity" in Congress represents precisely this class picture. But behind Roosevelt, too, there stands a considerable—although probably an ever decreasing—group of finance capitalists.

The "opposition" group, however, can today talk turkey to the small businessman and farmer because these economic groups are suffering greatly under pressure. In the state of Illinois alone, for instance, 10,000 retail firms have been forced out of business in the last year out of a total of 70,000—one out of seven. These groups are looking for an "out." They are longing for the good old "free competition," for removing "government interference." The anti-Roosevelt block of financiers is capitalizing on this sentiment. By clever demagogy it is lining up the middle classes behind it and constantly narrowing the base of the Roosevelt administration.

There is nothing strange about this at all. Similar things happened in Germany to the Bruening regime and in France to the Blum government. At certain stages in the development of capitalism, finance looks to a reformist (soft) administration, to tame the working class. Roosevelt was just such an agent of Wall Street. Today, however, capitalism can no longer afford the luxury of granting reforms to the working class; it must become hard if it intends to collect back in taxes and through sweat the hundreds of billions going into the war machine.

Unfortunately Mr. Roosevelt still is subject to the same pressure groups he has always been subject to. Even though he moves to the right he must still concede here and there to the labor lightenants of capital (Murray, Green, et al) whom he has been working with all these years. The tempo of Roosevelt's shift to a "harder" method of dealing with the working class is too slow to suit the bigger section of the American capitalists.

They are preparing for a "hard" man—like MacArthur, or Taft, or Dewey, or Jesse Jones. American equivalents of Von Papen or Daladier. Possibly class events may change this resolution of Wall Street. A large wave of strikes, an upsurge amongst the working class, may make it necessary again (for a relatively short period) to introduce a "soft" President. At the moment, however, just the opposite seems to be the perspective.

AMGOT-IRON FIST OF IMPERIALISM

Lord Rennell of Rodd, the head of the Allied Military Government in Occupied Territories for Sicily is a big British Banker, with the usual Oxford degree, and a very close friend of many notorious Fascists. His views have always been considered as quite sympathetic to the Italian regime, particularly since he numbered many friends amongst them.

Now Lord Rennel is in charge of bringing "democracy" to the Sicilians.

Obviously the "Four Freedoms" are easily brushed aside in the face of "economic opportunity." Lord Rennel, together with his American aids, is in Sicily to milk the country dry of its wealth—in the interests of London and, to a lesser extent, Wall Street. We can expect that there will be widespread expropriations of factories and property belonging to real or fancied Fascists and that British and American "guardians" will be found for this booty. We can expect too that the "take" from the occupation currency being circulated by the AMGOT will run into a sizeable sum.

Significantly no workers are represented in this first noble experiment of AMGOT. The thing is too openly imperialist.

AMGOT bears watching. With its petty bribes of food and trinkets it attempts to keep the conquered masses in check; and on the other hand it will despoil the economy of the conquered areas very much as all other imperialists have done in Europe from time immemorial.

AMGOT is the living refutation of the fact that the war is NOT being fought to grant people the "Four Freedoms." AMGOT is a MILITARY DICTATORSHIP. It recognizes no democratic rights or principles, except the "democratic" right of the exploiters and imperialists.

If the Allied imperialists and the German masters again try to intervene against the Revolution as they jointly did in 1917, then the workers everywhere by strikes and demonstrations must intervene on the side of the Italian working class.

DARLAN , AGAIN

5-The Allied Imperialists, like the German Imperialists, do not want and will not support except as a temporary expedient-any "democratic" government in Italy. Unlike the Stalinists, who have learned little or nothing, the Allies understand that "democracy" has outlived its usefulness, that only a military dictatorship can keep things "stable" in the occupied countries. Darlan was no accident. Giraud is a devout sympathizer of "National Socialism" (Naziism), as he himself stated recently in Canada. And Badoglio (or Graziani, or some other reactionary) will undoubtedly be the choice of the Allies to tame and control with force of arms the natural aspiration of the Italian workers for bread and peace. Should the temper of the masses burst all bounds then the Allies may choose either to permit a "democratic" regime temporarily or openly to use Allied force against the proletariat. The American and British workers thus become major pivots in the defense of the Italian Revolution. They must shout "hands off" to their own masters, and they must give aid to the Italian Revolution by attempting to spread the movement to the Allied countries as well. Our main enemy today, as yesterday, is our OWN Imperialist power. The fight against Imperialism at home will be the greatest help we can give to the Italian comrades.

RED ARMY WILL AID WORKERS

6—The role of the Soviet Union and the Red Army will be monumental in the present events. Despite Stalinism and its reactionary position of support of the War, the Stalinists can not and will not support the type of government the Allies wish to impose upon Italy. In order to keep their influence with the working class and in order to maintain some prestige within the Red Army, Stalinism must demand a "liberal" capitalist government. In that it will come into conflict with the Allies. But Stalinism will continue to act as a hangman of Revolution. It will aid imperialism by trying to smash the Italian Revolution.

7-The Red Army soon will face its most historic. test. The Revolution in Italy, and soon in the Balkans and France will vitally affect the Red Army. The first contact of the Workers State in Russia with the Revolutions elsewhere will create sharp repercussions within the Red Army, and cause a crisis for Stalinism. The workers in the Soviet Armed Forces will undoubtedly rise to the immediate defense of the European Revolution and attempt to give armed aid against the counter-revolutions. Unlike the imperialist armies which disintegrate at the first touch of Social Revolution, the Russian Red Army will consolidate. In the process the open bourgeois agents within Russia (including and particularly Stalinism) will show their rotten hands. In league with the oppressed workers of Europe the Red Army and the workers behind the line in Russia will either have to re-establish Soviet Democracy or face the victory of the counter-revolution within Russia as well as elsewhere. 8-The Soviet Union as a whole will soon face another test. World Imperialist Intervention, which was defeated in 1921, will soon rise again. The growing Social Revolution and the role of the Red Army will bring on the day when the Allies will double-cross the Soviet Union (as we have so long predicted) and will march again against the warped Workers' State.

SAME OLD CAPITALISM 9—The Revolution in Italy gives the lie to those "theoreticians" who have discovered in Fascism a "new" form of society. It reaffirms the correctness of our basic theory that Fascism and "democracy" are only two sides of the same coin, capitalism. The same capitalists who placed Mussolini in power in 1922 replaced him in 1943 with the equally capitalist regime of Marshall Badoglio. Now shorn of the Fascist Party and the "Corporations," the Capitalist Italian State continues the same as before to oppress and rob the proletariat. Nothing has changed but the form.

FOR WORKERS COUNCILS

10—The immediate tasks of the Italian proletariat are the establishment of democratic Workers Councils of delegates from the factories and the soldiers barracks; the arming of the working class and the organization of Red Guards; the disarming of the military and civil police; and workers' control of production through the soviets and the factory committees. The total aim of the proletariat of Italy must be absolute and unconditional seizure of power by the only Revolutionary Class in Society, the Working Class; and the destruction of the Bourgeois State in all its forms (Fascist, Badoglio military dictatorship, or liberal "democracy.") Against the Dictatorship of the Bourgeoisie, the Revolutionary Marxists will counterpose the Dictatorship of the Proletariat.

11—The Italian Revolution will enormously speed the Revolution elsewhere, particularly in France, and the Balkans. But it will soon affect all countries. Spain must be watched very closely; the Franco regime will soon be fighting for its life. The Italian Revolution will be felt in Germany, in the United States and in Britain (and in India and China). It will give heart to the workers everywhere, as did the Revolution of 1917. The Revolutionary Marxists everywhere must be equal to their tasks.

BUILD A NEW PARTY

12-And finally-last but by far most importantthe workers of Italy, with the aid of workers elsewhere must immediately establish a new Revolutionary Marxian Party, based on the principles of Marx and Lenin, to give guidance and leadership, to avoid pitfalls and traps of the "democrats" and nationalists. Without such a Party-section of a New Fourth (Communist) International-the Revolution will grow but will be eventually defeated. A new Party is necessary particularly to strugle against the reformist agents of capitalism and their centrist tail. The biggest immediate danger in Italy is not Fascism but Bourgeois Democracy with its demagogy and its snares. All the Revolutions since 1917 have proven that without such a Party victory is impossible. In this history moment the Party is indispensable. LONG LIVE THE PROLETARIAN REVOLUTION IN

ITALY. DOWN WITH IMPERIALISM OF ALL STRIPES AND

The big fight in Congress, looked at realistically, is thus a struggle over methods of controlling the working class. There is no class difference between Roosevelt and Congress, anymore than there is a class difference between bourgeois democracy, bonapartism, and fascism. The only difference is over some important tactics.

The working class should react to this Capitol Tempest with the proverbial position: "A plague on both their houses." **BRANDS**.

REPRINT OF A LETTER

Following are excerpts from a letter by a British "flight-Sergeant" to his Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, as published by the I.L.P. of Great Britain:

"Mr. Churchill — what am I fighting for? I have listened attentively to all your speeches, but realize-probably better than you -that Hitler, and all he represents, menaces the future of mankind and must be destroyed. But I also realize that all you represent must also be destroyed, for just as fascism is a menace to the future of mankind, so is imperialism.

"Capitalism in Germany had to expand, but it could only do so at the expense of Capitalism in Britain and other countries. Hitler wants some of the wealth of the British Empire, and the people who own this wealth naturally do not want to lose it; so they call upon the workers in the name of 'freedom and democracy' to fight in order to help them to retain it.

"WE OWN NOTHING"

"The owners of wealth share the profits among themselves. The workers have no share. But when you are further told that you must refund the 13 cents per hour that you have already drawn -somewhere between eighty and one hundred dollars, depending on the amount of overtime you worked-well, that's just a little too much, to make a perfect understatement.

GOV'T ERRS, CHARWOMEN PAY!

Yet that is exactly what happened to about 80 charwomen, employes of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving here. No one is quite certan how it all happened. No one's fault, of course, "just a little misunderstanding." Certainly not the fault of the women, whoever else was to blame. But the women, and their families, are the ones who will pay. Why should the United States Government be required to pay for its own mistakes—why, oh why?

The United Federal Workers of America, CIO (Treasury Local 11) to which about two thirds of the women belong-has taken up the matter, and has the following plan: 1. To urge the Treasury

This first step has been won, it was announced August 5. The second and most important part of the fight is now to be waged.

The woman who is putting a boy through Howard University on her char-woman's wages, meanwhile also supporting two younger children; the woman who is supporting a daughter eighteen years old, blind since she was four; the widow with six small children. and no other income than her charwoman's wages; and twentyseven others, each with an individual, critical economic problem.

STOP THIS LEGAL ROBBERY

The Union's plan is good, as far as it goes. But the plan does not even begin to go far enough. The bill from Congress should not only relieve the women from repayment, but give them the 13 cent an hour raise which they, in all good faith, believed they had, making it retroactive to the time at which the "overpayment" began. Protest meetings should be call-

ed, and protest telegrams, cards and letters should flood in to Congress.

The Union points out that even private industry, rotten as it is, couldn't get away with this sort of "murder." The women would have an opportunity then at least to sue in open court and present their side of the case. Readers of the Fighting Worker who are familar with the case of Howard Carwile will recall that we have repeatedly pointed out the crass injustice of the doctrine that "The King can do no wrong," and that the government cannot be called to account by its own citizens.
