Prepare Against Social Revolution

On January 6, 1919, two hundred thousand armed workers massed in the streets of Berlin and demanded that the capitalists be expropriated, that power pass into the hands of the Working class, that security, bread and peace be assured to the toiling masses. At the head of these workers stood Karl Liebknecht, fearless dynamic leader of the Spartakusbund, and with him, Rosa Luxemburg, brlliant theorist of the Communist Movement.

Lenin, Liebknecht, Luxemburg

A few days later, on January 19th, the capitalist government headed by the "Socialists" Noske and Schiedeman deliberately murdered Liebknecht and Luxemburg, having first put down the revolt of the workers.

Five years later, in January, Vladimir Lenin, heroic leader and guiding genius of the victorious Russian Revolution, died as the result of illness.

After the death of these three great revolutionaries the labor movement entered a new epoch. Social-democracy revived. Under the defeatist leadership of Stalin the Comintern eventually became an open instrument of counter-revolution. The world workingclass suffered defeat upon defeat, Germany, Italy, Bulgaria, China, England, Spain, etc. World Imperialism, again in need of markets, is plunged up to its neck in the workers' blood.

NOOSE AROUND THE SOVIETS As a result we find the Anglo-American robber barons making a deal with Turkey. Whether Turkey enters the war or not-it is too early to state-she has certainly promised Uncle Sam and John Bull the use of the Dardanelles and of air bases in Turkey. The Dardanelles can be a dagger pointed directly at the Soviet Union. Control of them by the allies will immeasurably strengthen their hand against the Soviets. The Allies, too, made sure that Russia will not tarry too long in Persia. The "innocent" agreement with the puppet Shah of Iraq to "protect its independence" is aimed primarily at expelling the Red Army from a spot where it is well entrenched.

No doubt Stalinism takes advantage of these things; but the main trend of Allied-Russian diplomacy is one in which Stalin promises and gives one weapon after another to the Allies in their counter-revolutionary fight against the proletariat (as for instance, support of Badoglio, or the 3 power committee in London to maintain the status quo), while the Allies continue to encircle the Soviet Union. They will use Stalinism as long as it is necessary-depending on the depth and scope of the Revolution-and then dump him like used dishwater.

THE CAIRO AGREEMENT

The Allies condemned the "ill gotten gains by violence" of Japan in the last half century. They promised to return to China (the Chiang-Kai-Shek part of it) those territories like Manchuria which Japan has stolen. But America and Britain completely "forgot" that the "ill-gotten" gains of Japan in the last war were won with the assent of the fighting on the same side with the U. S. and Britain. Unity, Solidarity, and the Class Struggle

The following words, uttered by Liebknecht on November 19th,

1917, are a reply to all advocates of unity with the Capitalist Class:-"Solidarity! Who can long and work for it more than we? Unity, which makes the proletariat strong in order to fulfill its historic

mission! But not every "Unity" makes for strength. Unity between fire

and water quenches the fire and vapourises water; unity between a hamb and a wolf delivers the lamb a prey to the wolf; unity between the proletariat and the ruling class sacrifices the proletariat; unity with traitors spells defeat.

Only similarly directed forces are strengthened by union. Forces striving against each other are enchained or paralized.

To unify similarly directed forces, that is our endeavor. To hitch together differently directed forces, that means to prevent and to misdirect the radically explosive forces in society; this is the endeavour of the present day apostles of unity, as it was the endeavour of the priests of union during the war.

S. and Britain "promise" to "help" China rebuild these territories-which means that a new and much bigger China will become a new and much bigger puppet colony of the Allies-with America getting the lion's share. (Incidentally, the war between America and Britain-the economic and political war-as to how to gobble up China will flare up constantly.)

The Chinese premier is merely a puppet in the masters game of imperialism. He was called to Cairo like an office boy, he was TOLD what was what, and left as he came, with Gen. Stillwell as his overseer.

Yes, the insipid words of the Cairo and Teheran communiques about friendship and love between the powers is a lie from beginning to end. The struggles between the so-called allies continue to come to light more and more as time goes on, witness, for instance, the Franco-British fight over Lebanon. Particularly is this true of the relations between the Imperialist Allies and the Soviet Union.

ican Fascists, however, is being closely cultivated, while proletarian revolutionists and rank and file militants, are ordered to go to jail.

There is a strong possibility before these words reach print the Trotskyists will start serving their sentence. The Revolutionary Workers League, ever since our inception, has considered the Trotskyist organization a centrist group, moving to the right, but that does not prevent us, in this moment of capitalist offensive, from solidarizing ourselves 100 per cent with the framed-up and persecuted Trotskyist comrades.

#### TO NO AVAIL

One interesting "legal" question nas been proved 100 per cent by the Supreme Court decision. In the course of the Minneapolis trial, the Trotskyists compromised themselves no end in an attempt to show that they did nothing 'illegal." They denied that they were for the overthrow of capitalism. They beat their breasts solemnly and said they merely predicted the overthrow of capital-"The defendants," Albert ply predicted the violence of the reactionary minority." Cannon and Goldman swore that they had 'never advocated the idea of insubordination in the Army," and that "the claim that we prefer the enemy, the imperialist enemy of the U.S., to defeat our government is absolutely false.'

FREEDOM FROM WANT AND FROM FEAR IN INDIA

In Calcutta 200 to 300 Indians are being picked up daily and sent to the newly established refugee centers. But the majority of Indians prefer the risk of starvation to camp life. Over 60,000 have fled the city since the new relief program began.

At last the British have found the real reason why famine relief can not be effective in India. Superstition and ignorance among the Indian population keep them from entering the camps set up to shelter and feed them. Stories to the effect that the British and their allies want to trap the natives, collect 100,000 Hindus and 100,000 Moslem 'and sacrifice them to the goddess of victory," circulate among them

The Indians have a really fantastic imagination. Never have the British "sacrificed Indians to the goddess of victory!" Yet, what else is the significance of the famine in India but the sacrifice of the Indian population to the imperialist "goddess of Victory."

#### FREEDOM OF PRESS IN ITALY

Italy is going to have freedom of press, extended to all (!) elements of Italian public opinion! That, at least is what was announced by allied headquarters on Nov. 21, after over 3 months of AMG rule. Democracy is outdoing itself.

The only restrictions will be on questions of military security and those resulting from the shortage of newsprint, the distribution of which is under the supervision of the Allies. These two restrictions in themselves are a whole program of control of the press.

PALESTINE-"DIVIDE AND RULE"

10 Jewish newspapers in Palestine were suspended for publishing an uncensored report, of a search of the village of Ramat Hakovesh, which differed from the official report.

A group of Polish Jewish soldiers, fleeing from the intensely anti-semitic Polish Army, had taken refuge in Remat Hakovesh. The village was subjected to a house to house search for arms-by Polish soldiers. The male inhabitants were rounded up inside a barber wire enclosure. One civilian was killed and 8 others injured. The official British version states that there was a training camp for a unit of an illegal armed organization, and that illegal arms were concealed in the settlement. It denies violent action.

The British-setting Pole against Jew, Jew against Arab-know the meaning of the formula 'divide and rule.' And British imperialism is well experienced in crushing the population of the colonies.

NO FREEDOMS FOR BRITISH MINERS

Gwilvm Llovd George, British Fuel Minister, reported that from July 3 to November 13, 421 unauthorized strikes in the coal mines were reported to his ministry. The British coal miners demand that the government take over control of the mines and grant them a wage increase to \$24 a week for pit workers and \$22 for surface workers. They are striking for better working conditions and opposing another lengthening of the work week.

The papers here reported that wage increases were expected, but that the government would not go far to meet the miners demands. Promises are going to be made for the post war period to trick the miners into giving up their demands for now.

But the English miners are not so easy to trick. So, Ernest Bevin, minister of Labor, announced that Britain will start drafting men for the coal mines. They will draft men over 25 exempted from military service for physical reasons. Undoubtedly the sanitary condition in coal mines and the good sound exercise will improve their physical condition.

Strike by men drafted into the coal mines will be considered equal to desertion and punished accordingly!

Thus the British bourgeoisie and their "Labor Leutenants" close their grip firmer around the working class in fear of its rising independent class action.

He "envisioned a world in which nations will get along like good and self-respecting friends ready to crack down jointly on the criminal element, if necessary." (AP report).

The readiness to use force will be the foundation of peace, says the Secretary of State.

But on November 10th, Secretary of the Navy Knox warns us "against the illusion that this was likely to be the last war."

Mr. Knox's program is aptly summarized by news commentator Dorothy Thompson (November 17) ..."to have permanent universal military training, the world's largest air force and fleet and be sure that we don't end the war too soon. We are to knock out Germany and Japan, once, and for all, leaving only the United Nations as power factors on earth. We are to make sure that the following peace 'will last for a long time.' But we must warn against the illusion that it will endure."

We have their word then.

Both agree that the United States government, banded together with other governments of the same class, will have to remain well-armed against its enemies. Both realize that what they stand for can be maintained only by open force. Both insist upon a new American militarism—a better whip in their hands.

Yet these two cabinet members, leading spokesmen for American capitalism, disagree only on a minor point. One says "Peace with bayonets!", the other "War with bayonets." In their plans, however, the life in store for us is plain: "armed security," policing of "criminal nations" and "criminal elements" (could that mean workers movements?) permanent military training. It means the burgen of a tremendous modern militarism placed upon the shoulders of the great masses of American people as their reward for "Victory."

And what also of the momentous promises of "humanitarianism" of the government for whom these two men speak? With no less than our Senators prating that America must receive her "proper share" of trade and demanding a "more equitable sharing of the British petroleum reserves in the Persian Gulf," the glorious future is apparent. The world financiers, sailing on this war's sea of blood into their ports of "Victory," will launch their ships of trade even more avariciously. And while they battle, their huge profits—and the terrible price of militarism to protect them—shall be sweated from the backs of the world workers and oppressed. Labor Fakers (it used to be Dan Tobin, now its Lewis) who are in opposition to the Roosevelt government. This reformist approach by the Trotskyists is a very clear indication of what these gentlemen would be willing to do with their "principles" when and if a third capitalist (Labor) Party were organized. If they are willing to cover up for John L. Lewis now before they get married to him in the Labor Party committees, what will they do when the marriage is consumated?

### **Embarrassing Moments**

Wm. Z. Foster, chairman of the Stalinist Party which now supports "our Commander-in-Chief, Roosevelt" with burning passion, wrote the following in September 1932:

"As Assistant Secretary of the Navy under the Democratic President Wilson from 1913 to 1920 Roosevelt was himself responsible for the butchery of Haitian Negroes by U. S. Marines. At least 3,250 Haitians were killed in 5 years in this Wall Street rape, according to even the most conservative estimates. Under Roosevelt this invasion was made to protect investments of the National City Bank which later used this opportunity to seize \$500,000 of the Haitians' government money.

"In 1920 Roosevelt boasted that he had himself written the Haitian constitution under which martial law by marines was placed above the native courts... And when the Haitians rebelled the Haitian Assembly was forcibly dissolved upon cabled instructions from Roosevelt in the Navy department."

This quotation is from "The Words and Deeds of Franklin D. Roosevelt," by Foster.

The Trotskyists today are staunch advocates of a Labor Party. This is what Trotsky himself said about it on June 11, 1932:

"I have reread the thesis of the second conference of the American League (Trotskyists) concerning the question of the American Labor Party. I find it excellent in every part and I subscribe to it with both hands... (The document referred to condemned the Stalinists for supporting a Labor Party.)

"...that eventuality (of the establishment of a Labor Party), which appears to me to be very problematical, does not constitute an aim for which the Communist must strive and on which one must concentrate the attention of the proletarian vanguard....

"A long period of confusion in the Comintern led many people to forget a very simple but absolutely irrevocable principle: That a Marxist, a proletarian Revolutionist, cannot present himself before the working class with two banners. He cannot say at a workers meeting: I have a ticket for a first class party and another cheaper ticket for backward workers. If I am a communist I must fight for the Communist (Marxist) Party."

#### Winston Churchill in 1927:

"I could not help being charmed like so many other people have been, by Sig. Mussolini's gentle simple bearing and by his calm, detached poise, in spite of so many burdens and dangers. Secondly, anyone could see that he thought of nothing but the lasting good, as he understood it, of the Italian people, and that no lesser interest was of the slightest consequence to him. If I had been an Italian I should have been wholeheartedly with you from start to finish in your triumphant struggle against the bestial appetites and passion of Leninism... Italy has shown that there is a way of fighting the subversive forces which can rally the masses of the people properly led, to value and wish to defend the honor and stability of civilized society. She has provided the necessary antidote to the Russian poison. Hereafter no great nation will be unprovided with an ultimate means of protection against the cancerous growth of Bolshevism."

the war was or is a war against Fascism. Already history has refuted this lie of the imperialists. The case of Sir Oswald Mosley is not an isolated one by any means but it shows clearly that the British ruling class has no fears for the menace of Fascism. It is the workers who recognize this beast for what it is: the last prop of a parasitic system, the beneficiaries of which will defend nothing except their own profits and privileges.

In the Mosley instance the Labor Party has proved its "worth" to Labor. It is Mr. Herbert Morrison, big shot in the British Labor Party no less, who united with those who fear a possible victory of Labor far more than the military victory of Hitler, to bring about the release of one of Europe's leading Fascists.

The American worker can ill afford to sit back with a sigh. The anti-social and anti-labor elements which compose the leading ranks of American Finance Capitalism are only too willing to try Fascism "at home" as well as abroad, when the masses can no longer be fooled by the "democratic" illusions.

And that day must come when the American worker discovers that "democracy" without bread or "liberty" without a roof over one's head is indeed no more than a hollow mockery. The abolition of Capitalism is the first question on the agenda of the proletariat!

### **Starvation Amidst Plenty**

The Indian revolution is not dead. Amid the death drums of the imperialist war thousands die of starvation, millions remain undernourished. The oppressed are condemned to die while their masters continue to insure that death. The Indian masses will awaken to the tasks that they have before them.

In Bengal, one hundred thousand persons are dying of starvation each week, over 1,000,000 live on one meal a day. The same holds true for Bihar and Orissa. In Calcutta the death rate is three times above normal. food and clothing prices have risen as high as 400 to 500 per cent, medical goods, 1,600 per cent. Four thousand beggars roam the streets. According to the former Director General of the Indian Medical Service. Sir John Megan, two-thirds of the Indian people are, undernourished. Such is the state of a country which the Allied imperialists have forced into the war. The Indian masses (except its army of over two million men) do not die in the front line trenches as the soldier does amid flying bullets. They die in the "peace" of their hovels and slums for want of food, clothing, and decent shelter.

Despite these facts, no less an authority than the former Viceroy of India, Lord Halifax, boasts of the fact that India's wheat production is as large as Canada's, its production of rice is second only to China, it is the greatest producer of cane sugar, its cotton production ranks second only to the United States, it grows one-half of all the peanuts in the world and grows all of its jute. India's steel mills are the largest in the British Commonwealth: Its industrial productivity and capacity has been expanding at an accelerated rate, but all this has been squandered for the needs of the imperialist war.

The sixty-five million proletarians together with the many more peasants cannot continue in such a condition much longer. If the slogans of Bread, Peace, and Land are not realized, if all the imperialists are not driven out of India, it can only mean the continued mass, legal murder of the Indian masses.

The Indian proletariat, together with their allies, the peasantry must build their independent class instruments of struggle against all imperialism and they must ally themselves, with the world proletariat for a Soviet India. The Indian masses will successfully free themselves from their bondage with the aid of the European, Asiatic and American proletariat. The story of India, then, will become a giant beacon in the liberation of humanity as a whole.

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### **Centrists Support Lewis**

Both Trotsky groups have shamefully capitulated to the arch traitor and sell-out artist in the Labor movement, John L. Lewis.

The November 13th issue of the Cannon paper has a big to-do about the miners' "victory." "The Miners have won!" The November 15th Schachtman paper states: "Miners' Victory shows the Way."

Not a word of criticism in either paper for John L. who has perpetrated one of the oustanding sell-outs of his long career of outstanding sell-outs!

The two Trotsky groups hide from the workers the fact that this was a major victory for the bourgeois state, that they were able to force the miners—who displayed such heroic militancy and such firm unity in 4 big national strikes — the bourgeois state was able to force the miners back to work with a WAGE CUT! (See December F. W. for figures.)

The only difference between the present agreement and the old is that the miners are given an extra hour work each day and Saturday work because there is a shortage of coal. A little simple arithmetic will show anyone that the hourly rate has been reduced from \$1 per hour in the old contract to 88c per hour now, if you include Portal pay!

Typical of segregation so markked in the south is the whole set up at St. Phillip's. The "Nordic superiority" of the white ruling class does not prevent them from seizing upon all the soft jobs at "hospital." The executive this staff is entirely white, the doctors and surgeons are white. But when it comes to the real hard work, such as that of nurses, attendants, et cetera, this is given to Negroes, at wages a little over half of those paid to white workers doing the same kind of work in other hospitals. Negro doctors and surgeons are not allowed on the staff, even though their own patients may be in the hospital. COMMITTEE REFUSED
