No class in history has ever seized power overnight. The struggles

of the oppressed classes of the past, against the rulers of the time, usually spread over a few centuries.

The working class, too, has a history of ups and downs, peaks and valleys, in an ever-continuing contest to liberate humanity from the enslavements of capitalism. In that history - which includes the Paris Commune, the Revolution 1905, Easter Sunday, and a few dozen revolutions since then — November 7, 1917 is a beacon light. For the first time in history the working class was able to seize state power, was able to out of war. (One hundred and two expropriate the greedy capitalists and nobility of Russia. Under the leadership of the Bolsheviks the first great step toward a Socialist society are testimony to the fact that it was was taken 27 years ago this month.

But that high point was followed by valleys of despair and defeat. Instead of continuing the process of liberating humanity from the wars, unemployment and depressions of capitalism, the Third International succumbed to the nationalistic virus of Stalinism. Without a Marxian leadership one section of the proletariat after another met defeat - Germany, 1919, 1920, 1921, 1923 and finally 1933; Bulgaria, Hungary, Latvia, Estonia, China, Britain, Austria, Spain. Out of this welter of defeat Capitalism was able to reorganize. It instituted Fascism in its weaker links and shamelessly prepared for the new war of plunder

The failure to extend the October Revolution from 1917 to date has cost us, the proletariat, at least 100 million lives. Many, many more will be added to this frightful toll, unless a new Revolutionary Marxian Party (a Fourth Communist International) is built, that will expose the agencies of capitalism, that will give guidance to the masses and assure victory.

Yes, the proletariat, as a relatively young F ogressive force in Society, has faltered. Its first Workers State has degenerated. It has suffered dozens of defeats. But history is on its side; capitalism is creating within its womb every day more Revolutionary upsurges. November 7th, 1917 may appear to some as an historical accident, something that will never recur.

But to us Marxists November 7th was just a foretaste, just an appetizer. More and bigger Novembers 7ths are on the agenda of history The proletariat must begin by building its own Party and sidestepping the traps of bourgeois democracy, as well as the bayonets of Fascism -- and victory is assured.

On this historic 27th anniversary of October, in this fifth year of the most treacherous crime in all history, the Second World War, the Revolutionary Workers League sends its greetings to all Marxists all over the world, in the Allied as well as the Axis countries:

FRANCE TORN BY CLASS STRIFE

Even before the echo of these words has died out on the capitalist controlled news wires, the road is being broken toward a new betrayal of the French working class. In fact, these very words, issued by the "liberators" themselves, are a vicious part of this betrayal. For, the French masses indeed have not been liberated, nor have they yet freed themselves. They have merely exchanged one group of rulers for an-The Lavals may be other. gone, but the capitalists and their open agents remain - some as cabinet members of the new De Gaulle government. The political dynamics of this regime are now following re-

markably the same patterns as those before the fall of France in 1940. OLD TAR IN NEW BARRELS

Paris is liberated! France is free! the outright hirelings of the big capitalists like Rene Mayer (House of Rothschild confident), Henri Frenay, and Massigli (Ambassador to London) - all members of the present De Gaullist government!

"SAVED AMERICA FROM REVOLUTION"

WHAT has Roosevelt done? In his own words: he saved America from Revolution. He granted a few reforms when the working class was striking by the hundreds of thousands and was organizing dozens of militant demonstrations. But he granted those things ONLY to get the working class prepared for WAR, only to be able to regiment the population for the greatest mass murder in history, and only - in the last analysis - to take it all away again.

What has been the result of 12 years of the "New" Deal? Regimentation of the worst sort-a hundred and fifty steps that bring America closer to Fascism: price control, wage control, job control, control of the workers movements by the draft card and War Manpower Commission and other measures, outlawing of the right to strike for all practical purposes, further limitation of free speech and assembly, and other reactionary measures put through under the thin excuse of war emergency." Real wages have been lowered and unemployment is

Starvation for the Belgians, French, Italians, is no more palatable under an Anglo-American bayonet than under a Nazi bayonet. This is only the beginning. The working class is learning in life in letters of blood - that "democracy" and fascism are capitalist brothers. When the lesson is digested they will move forward to the establishment of a Workers' Council Government, the only force that can or will smash Fascism.

Dewey, of course, just sits back and tries to capitalize on the genuine discontent of the masses. He brings up phoney charges of "Communism;" he lashes at the New Deal's failure to bring real security; he criticizes Roosevelt for the millions of unemployed during the depression - and he promises nothing but glittering, cheap and fraudulent generalities.

SHIFT TO RIGHT

If anything is obvious from this campaign it is that the capitalists in this country are going to use MORE dictatorial and more terroristic measures against the working class AF-TER elections - REGARDLESS OF WHO GETS IN. That shift to the right is quite evident. The Democratic Party dumped its left-wing liberal Wallace as Vice-Presidential candidate, as a concession to the right wing anti-labor wing from the South. The Republicans are using the familiar eye-wash about "Communism" to cover their own reactionary policies. The support given to Dewey by people like Bricker, the Chicago Tribune, Dulles, and

some semi-Fascists, indicates that the "barefoot boy" from Michigan has a familiar speaking acquaintance with the right wing of American

capitalism.

Whatever happens, whoever wins, the next administration will be more of a government by decree than this one. All of the palaver in this campaign can not hide the fact that there is no essential difference between Dewey and Roosevelt. Both are for the present blood-bath; both are for the present pre-fascist regimentation (Dewey's criticisms are very puny and minor, if you read them carefully); both are for the continuation of capitalism.

THE "COMMUNIST" BUGABOO

Dewey knows, of course, that neither Roosevelt or Earl Browder, or Sidney Hilman are Communists. Dewey knows the difference between Communism and Stalinism or the PAC. But he uses this red scare because he knows that thousands of Americans have been miseducated to believe that Stalinism and Communism are the same, and that Communism means regimentation. This smoke-screen will serve Dewey, as it has served all right wing bourgeois politicians, as the necessary camouflage for future raids and imprisonments of genuine working class militants and revolutionists; and a frenzied governmental control of labor.

Mr. Churchill is merely trying to keep his foot in the door. He is insisting — evidently with some success — that Greece remain in the British orbit of influence, that the Red Army keep out. A British army is already reported to have landed in Greece and, together with the guerrilla forces, taken Athens. Mr. Churchill is demanding too that his stooges be permitted in the Polish government. This too has the same basic motif. So long as the Red Army is unattacked, Mikolaczyk masters within the Polish govern-

But would the same men who served often as active leaders in the "resistance" against the German occupation betray France again? In answering this question, let it be first noted that the primary job of most of these "leaders" was to get control of the resistance movement to harness it to the old French ruling class. 14

These "leaders" include the Stalinist "communists" like Tillon and Billoux now in the De Gaulle cabbinet (Sept. 25). They take orders from the Moscow regime which now offers the world working class a ew era of prosperity under capitalism." Included too, are social patriots like Jeanneney, former president of the French Senate, now a member of the De Gaulle cabinet: (He symbolizes its "legal continuity" to the pre-war French Republic!) or

In reply to the workers' demands De Gaulle promises a percentage increase in wages recommended by a regional board. But inflation has already taken this away in advance. In response to the workers' insistant demand for nationalization of industry, workers in the mining district of Lille heard these words from De Gaulle:

"The collective people - that is the state - must take over the direction of the great sources of comnon wealth .

And to back up his promise he has seized the Renault automobile factories, declared the coal mines of the Pas de Calais and Nord departments nationalized, and has announced that fifty major plants would be controlled by the government.

"Another world war is in the making . . . The capitalists are preparing to fight it out for markets and colonies . . . It will bring only unimaginable misery . . . Bill Green and John L. Lewis are preparing the workers to fight in the coming war."

Confirmation:

The war came and the grab for markets is now on full force. The CIO and AFL have been the main forces within the Labor movement tying the working class to the war chariot.

FIGHTING WORKER August 1936, Page 1 -

"The Socialists and Stalinists present the (present Spanish Civil War) as a struggle between Fascism and democracy. This is just 100% false. The issue now is Communism or Fascism. That has been the issue ever since the monarchy was overthrown in 1931 . . . If the rights win, a reactionary dictatorship will be set up . . . Most probably it will be a dictatorship after the Austrian model."

Confirmation:

"Democracy" - both in Spain and all over the world preferred Fascism to a Workers Council Spain. They capitulated and sold out to the Fascists at every turn. The political form in Spain is similar in many respects to the Austrian model (Dolfuss).

THE U.A.W. HISTORY OF

(In three parts - Part two)

The success of the sitdowns in GM and Chrysler in 1936-37 set off a wave of similar strikes that extended even to the girls in the dime stores. "Flying Squadrons" of militants from organized plants went out almost daily for several months to help out where the pickets or sit-downers were few. Without them the growth of the UAW would have been much slower, for the police preserved "law and order" by attacking the strikers where they had the power. (In spite of the Wagner Act.) Where the police were outnumbered they behaved like gentlemen. The side with the biggest army makes the law.

Everywhere the plants were organized by a small number of militants, seldom 10% of the employes. Many plants were organized entirely from the outside. For example, at the Briggs Meldrum St. plant in union activity in Dec. 1936. They started a picket line and put a pail at the gates for contributions for strike relief. Workers going thru the line threw coins in the pail, and spoke encouragingly to the picketsand went to work. After about a week of this the International recruited militants from several organized shops to close up the plant. their union halls from midnight on to go out to the picket line at 6 in the morning. Thousands of outside workers put on a picket line that kept the Briggs workers out, fought the cops, and kept the plant closed. Next day Briggs signed with the union.

MUST CONTROL WORKERS

Any strike that started in those days was automatically authorized. With the exception of Homer Martin the same people were International officers then and now. But what a difference! Then they were fighting for dues and the power to sell the workers in bunches. They were fighting their way into the lower ranks of the ruling class. Now that they have arrived they can only stay there by fighting their own members, for unless they can control the workers they are of no use to the rulers, and will no longer be recognized. If that happens, R. J. Thomas and Co. face a fate worse than death; they will have to go back to work.

In 1936 and 1937 the union needed organizers by the hundreds to corral the workers. The workers who knew best how to organize were in the radical parties, so it was from them that most of the organizers were hired. About 400 were hired from the Communist (Stalinist) party, perhaps another hundred from the small radical parties. (That of putting on a good act of being pro-

A lot of assorted stool-pigeons also joined and were welcome. The Socialist Party lined up with the Stalinists. Martin fired the C.P. editor and the battle was on. The rank and file and their dues dollars were innocent and ignorant pawns in the game.

Martin was a former preacher; completely and utterly dishonest, and not very bright. Thomas is also a former preacher The militants in the union were his natural enemies and he co-operated with management to keep militants out of bargaining committees, and with reactionaries in the union to keep them out of local office. He used and paid Kluxers, Black Legionaires and plain goons to beat them up.

MUST PROTECT BOSSES

While Martin was involved in the fight for personal power he had to also consider his relation as a union leader to the bosses. Any union leader who believes in capitalism must put the interests of the capitalists first and the workers second. That is the way the system works, profits_ are more important than workers lives or happiness. So it is his job to help management give the workers as little as they can be forced to take; and to stifle the militancy of the workers by deliberately getting them bum contracts and Afternoon shift workers stayed in bringing them under control of "responsible" leaders. Martin did all those things as well as he was able.

ROOSEVELT'S PLAN

Roosevelt helped him by slowing up the pump-priming which was keeping capitalism alive, business slumped and jobs disappeared. FDR knows that workers are less likely to strike when jobs are scarce, unless conditions become intolerable. The fight in the union diverted the workers energies to fighting each other instead of the bosses.

The whole mess was bewildering to the workers, and by midsummer of 1937 the class struggle which had been gaining momentum since 1932 was harnessed and under control. Honest class-conscious leadership in that period could have made the workers organizations strong enough to challenge the rule of the capitalist class, if not to overthrow it. It is a certainty that Roosevelt would not have dared to take America into the war by a planned series of steps that made attack inevitable; he would not have dared to avoid facing the problems at home, unless he had the backing of the union leadership and felt sure they could harness the workers to the war machine.

Anti-Semitism Tool of Boss Class

About a hundred brutal anti-Semetic hoodlums carrying clubs surrounded and, shouting vulgar jeers, attacked a New York synagogue Tuesday evening, September 26. The outnumbered youth of the congregation, defending the older people and themselves, fought back with their fists, and though many were badly hurt, succeeded in repelling the armed hoodlums.

Every non-Jewish worker who has struggled against the oppression of capitalism, sympathizes with the Jewish people in their struggle against persecution. But the class interests of non-Jewish workers as well as the suffering of an oppressed minority is involved. The entire working class must become conscious of the connection between the growing wave of Negro and Jewish persecution and the quietly increasing undertow of anti-unionism.

DIVIDED WE FALL

Capitalist strategy is coordinated. The plan is first to direct the energy of the working class against secondary (color, nationality, etc.) differences to obscure the main (class) difference in society. This is done by setting the gentile worker against the Jewish, the white worker against the black and yellow, the nativeborn worker against the foreignborn. Finally, after the working class is sufficiently divided and weakened, the capitalists strike at their main enemy, the workers' class-struggle organizations. Pogroms are used by the capitalists to prepare for the destruction of the unions, just as a well-placed punch to the jaw of a fighter stuns him, collapses his defense and prepares him for an easy knockout blow, Workers must defeat this capitalist strategy of divide and rule by fighting as one united disciplined class against the capitalists.

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Stalinism Between Two Fires

The Young Communist League organ in Russia recently printed an article which called upon Soviet teachers to be "inspired by the great ideas of Communism." It calls for much more inculcation of the youth with the principles of Marxism and it emphasizes that the Communist Party "fights religious prejudices because it stands for science, while religious prejudices go against science."

Why they should suddenly be so interested in teaching the youth more - not less - Marxian classics at this time, is hard for many people to understand; particularly in view of the recent concessions to religion within Russia proper and to private property in the Balkans.

But politics has its own logic. It is absurd to believe that dictators are free from the pressure of the masses, and that EVERYTHING that happens is just a cold inspiration from the Party circles above. The Soviet Union today is in a critical moment in its history; Stalinism too faces a crisis.

The little story speaks volumes. It indicates that the bourgeois elements within Russia, who have been the main recipients of Stalin's favors for 10 years, are now tiring of just half a loaf and are demanding the whole loaf or nothing - full restoration of private property. Stalinism, which balances itself precariously between the contending forces in Russia can not give such a concession - any more, than Hitler could have conversely accepted Socialist property relations. The burocracy is therefore forced to seek desperatedly for allies elsewhere. Its mass base is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. It is attempting to use the proletariat now as a counter-weight to the whole shebang of engineers, managers, GPU agents, Kolkhoz heads, Party burocrats, writers, etc. who are demanding a place to invest

SPREADS TOO FAR.

"French Gestapo retrained by Himmler as 5th Column" so reads the headline of a dispatch from Berne by Chicago Daily News correspondent Paul Ghali. The substance of the article is that the French Gestapo agent, Joseph Darnand, is training 37,000 Frenchmen in Germany to "tell their fellow countrymen that the present day Soviet Russia represents only a bourgeois deformation of Lenin's original. principles, and that it is high time to return to sound Trotskyist ideology." The Gestapo will even go so far as to organize a "bogus 4th International, amply contaminated by Nazi germs and destined to spoil the Allies' postwar reconstruction of Europe."

By Trotskyists, Ghali is of course referring to Marxian revolutionaries. The bourgeois pen prostitutes refuse to look into the niceties of Revolutionary theory. In addition of course, Ghali is evidently inspired by the Stalinists. This unbelievable bit of rubbish, he claims, comes though "private, but most reliable channels."

Who can those channels be? Obviously only the Allies or the GPU, or both; those forces, in other words, who are opposed to and wish to discredit the proletarian Revolution. Hitler, too, periodically raises the bogeyman of Communism being an agency of the Allies and Stalin.

Mr. Ghali's monstrous charge is merely a preparation for the vast lies that are bound to follow . . . from "reliable channels." The Proletarian Revolution and the organization of a New Fourth Communist International will be pictured as a "plot" by the Nazis. Lenin too was charged with being a German agent; and the Bolshevik Revolution with being a mere putsch by the Kaiser's hirelings. Mr. Ghali is attempting to give an excuse in advance for the Allied and GPU bloodbath of the proletariat in Europe.

Melrose Park, Ill. - Twenty-three hundred workers out of approximately 11,000 were laid off last month at the big Buick factory in this Chicago suburb. Rumor has it that there will be more to follow.

The thing that gripes most of the fellows here is that as far as the International leadership of the United Auto Workers CIO is concerned these lay-offs don't ever happen. No one gives a darn; no one, including most of the local leadership, does a thing about it. Just complete resignation.

One can readily see that if a work er is not secure on his job today in the midst of the war. his chances of maintaining a job after the war are very slim - contrary to all the ballyhoo peddled around by all the labor fakers and their masters about the wonderful opportunities awaiting workers after the war.

In a recent article released by the UAW-CIO it is stated that as a result of the technological develop ment there has been a reduction of 96% in personnel in the building of some bomber parts from 1941 to 1943. In the peak automobile production 500,000 workers were employed. This figure can be cut in at least half the number after the war. The other 250,000 will swell the ranks of the unemployed.

NEED UNITED ACTION

Obviously the workers in Local (here can't fight the growing unemployment alone. The problem is nation-wide. The least that can be expected however is that all the General Motors workers throughout the country unite for some common strike action to gain security, guaryearly wages, protection anteed against lay-offs, a cut in the work week with no loss in pay, and similar measures. This would be one step toward solving a problem that will be solved only under a Workers Council Government - Socialism.

The very thought of strike action, however, is poison to Walter Ret er and the other pie-card artists who control the GM set-up in the UAW. All they talk about is the Kilgore Bill and electing some "good" capitalist stooges to Congress.

Every Buick work instinctively shies away from such a do-nothing program. At the last membership meeting a speaker was introduced to speak on the CIO Political Action Committee. The members immediately began to clear the hall. They realize that windjamming about PAC (or about the other capitalist candidate, Dewey, for that matter), will not bring any gains. The PAC is merely an instrument for taking

ANALYSIS OF 5 YEARS OF THE IMPERIALIST WAR (Continued from October Issue of The Fighting Worker)

PROLETARIAT SUSPICIOUS

These things bother the proletariat. Much more today than four years ago. Even the most gullible are beginning to have doubts, are beginning to remember the lies of the First World War, and are comparing them with the new lies. They have heard Mr. Churchill fondly endorse the Atlantic Charter which supposedly gives the oppressed peoples the right to determine their own destiny. But they have also heard him say that "we have not become the King's ministers to preside over the liquidation of the British Empire." And they have watched anxiously while the leaders of the Indian nationalist movement were thrown into jail because they asked that the Atlantic Charter be enforced; that India be given her national independence. They have heard Mr. Roosevelt endorse the Charter with even greater fervor, while at the same time denying freedom to the colonial people of Porto Rico, whose nationalist leadwere in the good federal prison at Atlanta.

The proletariat has stood by quietly and listened to the frantic howls by the Allied propagandists about the tyranny and famine in central Europe under the Nazis. But they have also learned about the shameless MASS STARVATION of the INDIAN PEOPLE, a British-made famine which claimed at least a million lives. They have heard Mr. Wallace's tearful promises of a quart of milk for every person on earth. But they have also watched dozens of millions of Chinese, Italians, and Africans starve under the shadow of Allied guns. And not so easily forgotten is the starvation and sub-standard rations in Europe, England and America during the 1930's when food was plowed under to keep prices up.

The proletariat has been told of the beastly brutality of the Japanese and German imperialists - much of which is undoubtedly true. But they have also heard the condemnation by the Australian high command of the brutal tactics of American forces which shot down hundreds of defenseless and unarmed Japanese after torpedoing their ships.

HOW THE ALLIES FIGHT FASCISM

The war was supposed to be fought to eliminate religious bigotry, to gain freedom of worship. But Polish Jews in the Polish Army who condemned the anti-Semitism in that army were forthwith court-martialed.

The war was supposed to be fought to eliminate Hitlerism. But Hitler's friends and cronies have been recognized and embraced by the Allied Imperialists. Lord Rennell of Rodd, an old friend of Mussolini and an avowed Fascist sympathizer was put in charge of the Allied Military Government in Sicily. The Fascist King Victor Emanuel of Italy and the butcher of Addis Ababa, Badoglio, for 25 years a loyal fascist, conveniently and suddenly were glorified as anti-Fascists and embraced by the Allies. Darlan, who collaborated with Hitlerite agents in France, just as easily turned to collaboration with the Allies in Algiers a few months later. Such military dictators as King George of Greece, Vargas of Brazil, Batista of Cuba, and innumerable others have not only been tolerated but have been praised and welcomed into the fold of the "United" Nations, to fight for 'Democracy.

PRIVILEGED CLASS EXEMPT

The proletariat has watched these things and pondered and doubted. It wants to know for instance, why the government of the United States has made a present of some 15 billion dollars to the Big Corporations during this war, but was unable only six short years ago to find a measly hundred million dollars for the unemployed on WPA. They want to know why, if this is a war for freedom and equality, the rich have been permitted to make 25 billions in profits last year, three times the sum of 1929 profits. They want to know why, if we are fighting for our very lives and existence, Louis B. Mayer must have a salary of some \$1,300,000; why he couldn't live on the \$25,000 limit and why that limit had to be repealed. They want to know why, if we are fighting a "war to the death," the Chase National - pinnacle of the Rockefeller Empire - still operates Bank even though it helped send industrial diamonds' to Germany DURING this war.

If this is a "war against Fascism," why do the Allies make treaties with Franco, which permit Spanish Fascism to send stronger, his confusion greater, his desire to learn the TRUTH wolfram to Germany? If this is an "all-out" war, why do about this war much more pronounced.

of the Bank of International Settlements in Switzerland together with German, Italian and Japanese Bankers? Why is Anaconda Copper permitted to remain in business even though they practically admitted making thousands of pieces of defective equipment which cost lives of Allied soldiers? Why is Curtiss Wright still permitted to remain in business even though government officials found that hundreds of their planes were raudently put together and are useless? Why are the shipbuilding companies which make "liberty" ships that split in the middle permitted to continue in business? But a poor welder n a large factory who did some defective welding even though the judge admitted there was no question of deliberate sabotage — gets a year in jail and the loss of his livelihood.

TO WORKERS WAR

PRODUCTION FOR PROFITS ONLY

Something else workers want to know: if this is an "allout" war and if after this war there won't be any crises, if we can expect full employment and full production after the war, then why did the Big Banks and Big Corporations refuse to invest their money in new plants? Why did the government have to put up 151/2 billion dollars in new aluminum, magnesium, aircraft, synthetic rubber and other plants? Here's something even more confusing: why did the American capitalists refuse to put their money into such new and promising industries as synthetic rubber (nearly 100% Government built) or aircraft (90% government built)? The United States has more liquid capital than at any time in history — banks, insurance companies and big corporations are loaded with excess money. Yet they REFUSED to invest in their country's FUTURE. Why is the worker being bombared then to buy bonds, to sacrifice for "his" future?

The working class has been reading and listening and wait ing — wondering and doubting about all these things.

FREEDOM MONOPOLIZED BY CAPITALIST CLASS

Why was it all right in America to have a 400% rise in profits but to limit the rise in wages to 15% even though prices have gone up at least 60% to 80%? What is all this talk about freedom" when Negroes are kept in Jim Crow army camps when candidates like Jim Simpson of Alabama are permitted to run in a "free" country on the program of "white supremacy' when Negro voters in Alabama and Texas are still denied the right to vote in primaries even after they have paid their poll taxes and even (sic) after the Supreme Court has just specifical-ly ruled that they have such a right? What is all this kibosh about "no discrimination" when the Negro people are herded in shameful ghettos in Harlem and on Chicago's South Side and in thousands of other communities throughout the country Is there any difference between these ghettos and the ghettos for Jews established by the Nazi murderers? Is there any difference between the Hitler pogroms against the Jews and the Detroit race riots against the Negroes — for which, by the way, not a single one of the real inspirers ever spent a second in jail?

The working class wants to know these things. It wants to know why "inciting to strike" is punishable with a five year jail sentence in Britain, and one year in America for striking in a government-controlled industry? to be fighting for "liberty?" General M Weren't we supposed General Motors, Ford and all the industrialists refused to convert their plants to war production in 1940 and 1941 until they were guaranteed adequate profits and favorable amortization plans. But these "strikers" were never punished. The Big Corporations of America are guaranteed by federal statute at least two years of swollen war profits after the war. But thousands of war veterans of the econd World War are already finding it exceedingly difficult to find jobs and to take care of themselves or their families,

CLASS STRUGGLE IN ARMY

The worker in the army is looking around him too. sees Clark Gable get a captain's commission after only a few short months, while thousands go through hell and can get no further than corporal.
