SAMUEL KELLY FREED!

WELCOME BACK TO CLASS STRUGGLE

Worker ranks of the militant working class a leader who has been sorely missed for the past year and a half. Samuel Kelly, a Negro Worker, who was sent illegally to the Virginia State Penitentiary at Richmond on July 8, 1943, (while his appeal was still pending on a trumped-up charge of larceny) is being released from that institution on January 11, and will come back to take his place once come back to take his place once more in the fighting ranks of the workers. The Labor Defense Con-gress, the Samuel Kelly Defense Committee, and other groups which have fought for Kelly's release, are making plans to welcome him back Kelly's Background

Kelly, up to the age of fifty, never had a charge of any sort lodged against him. For many years he was in the vanguard of the class struggle in Richmond, Virginia, and was well known through the South for his activities on behalf of the workers, regardless of race. This of course won him the enmity of the bourgeoisie, but in spite of several attempts, it was impossible for them to find any ground on which to arrest him.

The Frame-Up

In March, 1942, however, the Rich mond police found their chance. B. Lapkin, a former employer of Kel-ly's, who bore him a personal grudge, cooperated in framing Kelly on a false charge of the set of several hundred dollars' worth of clothing from Lapkin's store. As a result of perjured testimony, Kelly was convicted.

With this issue, the Fighting convicted, he had not in the begin-lorker welcomes back into the ning made any appeal to the workning made any appeal to the work-ers for support, but after the conviction, he asked the Labor Defense Congress to take up the fight, which was done. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court of Virginia, and finally to the Supreme Court of the United States. While the lat-ter appeal was still pending, Judge Ingram of Richmond, committed the unprecendented injustice of refusing to renew Kelly's bail bond, although Kelly was prepared with a proper bondsman to give such bail. Judge Ingram instead remanded him to the penitentiary. Subsequently the Su-preme Court upheld the conviction.

The Fight for Freedom

Kelly's friends, however, never eased the fight for his release and vindication. Though offered a parole or conditional pardon, Kelly steadfastly refused, (despite the fact that his health was failing under penitentiary conditions) and insisted on nothing less than complete vindication and freedom to fight once more the battles of the workers as he had always done. Even in the penitentiary, Kelly continued to carry on the fight, organizing his tier of cells into a club, and delivering ectures on economic and social con-

ditions to his fellow-prisoners. Ready for his release with renewed plans for carrying on the class struggle, Samuel will be again, as in the past, in the forefront of every fight for the rights of the workers and minority groups. Lenin Liebknecht Luxemburg

Twenty-six years ago Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg, leaders of the German Revolution, were murdered by the German social democracy. Five years later came the death of V. I. Lenin. These three leaders of the revolutionary proletariat will long be remembered for their fearless struggles against the capitalist class.

Liebknecht's slogan, "The main enemy is in our own country" is the cry of the proletariat today all over the earth. Capitalism is outmoded, decayed. It can no longer even attempt to solve the contra-dictions that it has brought into this society. would like to gain a foothold in Southeastern Europe that can threaten the Turkish Dardanelles, and thus create another buffer between the imperialists and the degenerated Workers State. The State Depart-ment is quietly working along, be-cause Wall Street and Stalin are both agreed on keeping British in-fluence in the Balkans at a low point.

The Struggle in the Streets

The working class in Greece rose up a month after British occupation, in an effort to get bread and land and peace. The same guerrilla forces which paved the way — as good Al-lied men — for the Allied re-conquest of Greece, have now become a major danger to the plans of Al-lied imperialism. They believed the demagogy about the right of self-determination and a "quart of milk for each inhabitant of the earth." They learned to use a gun in the underground and they are now using those guns to get what they were mised.

Unfortunately, however, the Greek Revolution starts with all the confusion and lack of clarity that all Revolutions have to begin with. The struggle in the streets of Athens today is actually a STRUGGLE FOR STATE POWER — not just for the change of one bourgeois government for another. The needs of the masses can be satisfied ONLY if the GREEK CAPITALIST STATE IS SMASHED AND A WORKERS COUNCIL GOVERNMENT (DICTATORSHIP OF THE PROLETARIAT) IS SET UP IN ITS PLACE.

Compromise Means Defeat

But to the Greek masses that fundamen⁴ lesson is not yet clear. Stalinism has been able to place itself at the head of this Revolution — with its demagogy and reformist slo-gans — IN ORDER TO BEHEAD THE REVOLUTION. It has permitted the masses to take to the road of Armed Insurrection for the nar-row and absolutely hopeless purpose row and absolutely hopeless purpose of establishing Bourgcois Democracy in Greece. But Greek capitalism, and its British master, can no longer grant democratic reforms to the Greek proletariat. If they permit a "ilberal" government and a "ilberal regency" to exist for any length of time, it will only be in order to fur-ther neutralize the masses and to re-group the open Fascist forces for a final attack against the working final attack against the working class

If the Greek workers make any compromise with British and Allied imperialism they will be treated to a vicious blood-bath. The very attempt by Stalinism to compromise with the British General Scobie shows that Stalinism and Britain despite secondary differences stand on the same CLASS PROGRAM — MAINTENANCE OF WORLD CAP-ITALISM.

The Road to Power

The fate of the Greek Revolution is indissolubly linked with the Revolution in the rest of Europe, par-ticularly in Germany and Britain. ticularly in Germany and Britain. To achieve victory the Greek pro-letariat must find a way to adopt the program of Lenin and the Bolshe-viks:

1-No faith in Bourgeois Democracy. Reject all compromises which aim at setting up "liberal" or "semiliberal" regimes or regencies, or con-stituent assemblies. No post-war plebiscites — settle the matter now!

2 — Continue the struggle till the proletariat actually seizes STATE power and smashes all the instru-ments of the bourgeois state.

4 — Build a New Revolutionary Marxian Party in Greece — a sec-tion of the new Fourth Communist International. Without such a Party the masses will be easy bail for the Stalinists, Socialists, and other miseaders of the working class. The Greek Revolution can not succeed unless it is given the guiding leader-ship of a Marxian Party — that is a sine qua non of the Greek Revo-lution!

5 --- Extend the Revolution to the rest of Europe and Asia.

BRITISH GROUPS TALK FUSION

The Leninist League of Great Britain has entered into negotiations with the Communist Workers Group with the object of fusion. The Leninist League is the British affiliate of the I. C. c. and has been politically and industrially active for some years. The Communist Workers Group is a new group and comprises mainly ex members of the British Communist Party who have endeavored to lay the basis for a new Revolutionary Party in the left wing of Commonwealth. This they have recognized as inadequate; and attracted by the literature of the International Contact Commission, in particular the 14 Points, have approached the Leninist League for discussions. The discussions center around the application of the 14 Points to Britain. Collaboration in joint publication of literature has been agreed to and carried out.

"INDEPENDENCE" - To **Exploit** Philippines

"MacArthur is marching back to pense of the so-called "independent" Bataan." The crushed pride of countries like China. American imperialism is being salv-ed. The U.S.A. is "liberating" the Key to Independence Filipinos after three years of Japan-ese enslavement. Thousands of ese enslavement. Thousands of American and Filipino boys are being slaughtered for the sake of a few square miles on Leyte, Mindoro, and number of other islands in the Philippines. The real significance of this new invasion is not to be found in the boss class pre-

Purpose of Liberation

If liberation were the mission of the American troops — then why did American imperialism wage open war for fourteen years with the Fil-ipino independence movement? And pino independence movement? And why an added quarter century of concealed war against independence? Why was the decision to grant the Philippines independence so care-fully ringed with restrictions as to nullify all benefits to the people of the Philippines and give all the benefits to a competitive group of sugar capitalists in the United States? And what concrete pledges have now been nade to the workers and peasants? Absolutely none.

American imperialism is in an embarrassing spot: it dare not lie too flagrantly about its aims. On the other hand it dare not tell the truth other hand it dare not tell the truth — that in needs the Philippines as a base for moving in on all of East Asia and the South and Mid-Pacific. It dare not tell the masses in the Philippines, in China and India that its real interest in driving out Jap-anese imperialism is only to bring back American imperialism, to ex-tend it at the exponse of its hig rival. British imperialism, and at the ex-

The key to the real independence of the Philippines lies not in bour-geois-national "autonomy," which merely serves as a screen for behind the scenes imperialist control (who will supply the military and naval guarantees of "independence" if not the American imperialists?); but in the unity of the workers and peasants in a struggle for the oust-ing of all imperialists, in the estab-lishment of a Workers' Council Government, the seizure of all the means of production and their operation for instead of profit.

Meanwhile it is indeed significant that no armed force of insurgents has risen within the Philippines to 'aid" the Americans in the fight. There is nothing similar to the FFI, the ELAS, etc. The Filipinos are almost entirely apathetic to the "liberating" mission of MacArthur. They are not concerned with choosing between American and Japanese imperialisms.

But neither are they yet prepared for the next step, which implies a clear understanding, not only of their dissatisfaction with America as well as Japanese imperialism, but also of the correct political and ecalso of the correct political and ec-onomic road to the defent of imper-ialism in open struggle. This is a many-sided struggle, involving the cooperation of the masses in the im-perialist homeland of America as well as those in the Philippines. While the Filippines are fighting for their independence, the American workers must hack their struggle to uet free of the immerialist octoous ands based on those factories (rlus British imperialism, and at the ex- get free of the imperialist octopus.

WORKERS OF THE WORLD

NO COMMUNISTIC CAPITALISTS IN FRANCE

A gesture, which under the circumstance seems rather amusing was made by the French industrialist Renault. The government having taken over his automobile works, he gave them to his workers in his testament, This may sound like a futile act of protest against government seizure, Yet it demonstrates very clearly the difference between the seizure of any word of industry hy the canitalist state and stens toward seizure. part of industry by the capitalist state and steps toward socialism.

On the other hand a whole fuss is raised about the nationalization of the coal mines being a step towards socialism. But as soon as the new mining laws became known the National Federation of Mine Workers protested because the workers were given a purely nominal representaprotected because the workers were given a purely nominal representa-tion. They have 8 out of the 24 members of the consultative managerial committee. The consumers are represented by delegates of the railroad companies and big business. Big business runs the show, and the workers are given a few indecisive representatives in the hope they will be fooled into accepting this set-up. The bourgeois propagandists in all countries may rest easy, the French capitalist state will not let the workers take over any industries. That will be the task of the French Socialist State,

OILING THE RAILS IN THE U.S.S.R.

The trial and conviction of a factory agent for bribery by the Supreme Court of the U.S.S.R. is a good illustration of the influence of Stalinist burocracy in the land where the Soviets used to be.

I. Popov had given 2 liters of cooking oil to a train dispatcher in re-turn for expediting the delivery of two tanckcars of oil for distribution among the workers of his factory. He testified that he had acted not in his own but in the interest of his factory, that delivery of supplies was so slow that without giving bribes you could not get anything on time.

KEEPING HOLLAND PURE

The "liberation" of Holland by Allied armies bears all the earmarks of conquest. Not only do the American army authorities try to stop con-tact between their soldiers and civil population for fear that the spirit of revolt which is developing all over Europe will contaminate them, but the Dutch themselves warn their girls against associating with the conquering soldiers. Posters pasted anonymously on some buildings threaten haircutting and other reprisals for Dutch gnls caught keeping company with Americans.

SICILY PREPARES FOR THE IMPORTANT BATTLES

There definitely is no enthusiasm for participating in the Allied robbers war among the people of Sicily. Students are demonstrating against the conscription of students of 19 to 22 into the Italian army. Eleven demonstrators were wounded at Catania recently when police fired into the demonstration. Public gatherings have been banned thruout Sicily.

At Palermo the "Committee For National Liberation" asked the dem-onstrating students to "emulate north Italy patriots who are continuing to make a great contribution to the partisan war

In this respect the statement by a high Rome official is very enlightening. This official reports that a number of Italian partisan fighters in German occupied territory are drawing the conclusions from the experience of their Greek comrades. They are breaking up their units and burying their arms so as to be prepared for the really important battle which will be fought after the Germans are driven out of the country; in other words for civil war.

General Azzi of the Italian Army wrote an article suggesting that the arry become national rather than yoyal, that the cost of allegiance to the King be eliminated and that the relations between officers and men be "democratized." For his recognition of the impending class revolts with-in the army as well as among the civilians General Azzi has been relieved of his post of command in the Lazio-Umbria-Abruzzi district.

GERMANY STILL SIMMERS

Despite the double censorship (German and American) news of riots in Germany trickles through every so often. From Switzerland the "Schaffhouse Arbeiter Zeitung" reports that 30 civilians were hanged in Cologne following a demonstration in which 6 high ranking Nazis were lynched. From Sweden it was reported that "riots" in Berlin following heavy air raids were suppressed immediately. The finme of revolt which burned high a few months ago is not dead and the possibility of its engulfing all of Germany and eventually Europe is a constant threat to German and Allied rulers alike.

Eisenhower reveals a bit more of the real allied aims. Eisenhower told the German workers that they would be allowed to have trade unions but strikes will be forbidden.

He knows that a union without a weapon, without the means to en-force its demands, is harmless to the capitalists. The allies have quite a bit of experience in undermining the militancy of the workers by imposing upon them a class collaborationis teadership.... And the workers are learning the high cost of such collaboration.

Appearing two months ago in the magazine "New Yorker," it has been reprinted since then in New York, San Francisco, and Washington, D. C. papers. An expression of the Europe-infested radicalization now sweeping the Atlantic seaboard, the editorial is a militant manifesto of the middleclass.

Summarized, it reads --- We (the middle class) publicly "damn" you (the capitalist class) for raping society. You have dragged it down to a "disaster" from which it might never again "crawl back to life." Society demands the prognever again "crawl back to life." Society demands the prog-ress of science, you pervert science to butcher millions of youth. Down with insane wars! Society needs the leader-ship of "the young and the dreamers," you lecture us on the virtues of the "middle-aged and the practical." Down with sterile capitalist leadership! Society desperately needs world unity, instead, "you (the good capitalists) plan to police the bad." Down with a world economic prison! Fellow-members of the middle class! Out of the bowels of degenerate capitalism will come a new class and a new society "of magnificent proportions and undreamed of de-sign." We, the middle-class will be the sign in the sign in the sign is the sign of the sign is the sign of the sign sign." We, the middle-class, will build it. Prepare! eralists of the world, unite!"

In the ears of a shop-keeper, this mouse's squeak sounds like a lion's roar. While capitalists neither pity nor fear the protests of the frustrated middle-class, the working class sympathizes with the problems of its oppressed ally ever, class-conscious workers must carefully avoid such highly subjective unscientific thinking.

The middle class has illusions about itself. It is not a new class, but an old one; not a growing class, but a dying one; not progressive but reactionary. In the transition from

feudalism to capitalism, the middle class played a progressive Out of its handicraft womb the embryo capitalist class porn. Nurtured and schooled in a middle-class envirole was born. was born. Nurtured and schooled in a middle-class envi-ronment, the capitalist class eventually built the productive plant of the world. Since the turn of the century however, capitalism has been dying. It no longer builds, but destroys, To continue the progress of humanity a new society, so-cialism, must be built. A new class must build it. This new class is not the aged grandmother of capitalism, the middle-class.

The grave-digger of capitalism is destined to be the working class. The most productive and progressive section of society, the working class, is armed for its historic task by capitalism itself. As capitalist concentration of industry

increases, the size and strength of the working class increases, Revolution, the locomotive of history, cannot drive for-ward without power to turn its wheels. This power must ward without power to turn its wheels. This power must come from the working class. The middle-class our po-tential ally, must be prevented from dissipating its steam into utopianism. This steam can be used to drive the wheels harder. A wreck of the approaching European revolution can be prevented only if the working class leads the struggie against capitalism by placing a Marxist party at the throttle.

Only Workers Can Afford Unity

Riots in Sicily. Crisis in Italian government. 20,000 demonstrate in Britain. Strikes in Belgium. Anti-DeGaulle demonstrations in France. Such is the "unity" of the Allied imperialist world. For a while Britain and America could indulge in fan-

ciful talk about bringing freedom from want to the masses of Europe. At that time there was no immediate perspective of occupying Italy, Belgium, France or Greece. The workers in these Nazi occupied countries were repeatedly instructed In these that occupied countries were repeatedly instructed by the Allies not to rise against the yoke of the Nazis until so instructed by the Allies themselves. The masses stirred restlessly awaiting their "liberation". In desperation they took the initiative and rose against their oppressors. It was precisely at this time, of popular uprisings, that the Allies found it necessary to occupy these lands — in order to keep the masses in check.

The Allies have taken the major share of Italy. The question as to who was to have control of this unfortunate and was evidently settled in one of the many conferences held during the war. Britain was "given" Italy. (Only British approved heads of the government are allowed to take their posts.) But such "agreements" amongst the im-perialists are worthless pieces of paper. America may have consented to making Italy (and Greece) a British sphere of influence in exchange for American domination of France, Belgium and Holland; but America is attempting and will continue to attempt to cut Britan out from under with her economic might. America will work quietly and behind the scenes to place a pro-Wall Street government at the helm. Each crisis will be utilized for that advantage

After a year in Rome the masses are still hungry, still After a year in nome the masses are suit hungry, suit destitute. The government reflects this condition and a crisis develops. And, where necessary, a crisis can be propelled by withholding of food, etc. Thereupon the United States attempts to put its political foot in the door with its conomic agencies: it attempts to foist its good puppet Sforza to the premiership of Italy. Britain rebels at this and Church-ill calls Sforza many unfriendly names in parliament.

The same thing is repeated, with minor variations, rela-tive to DeGaulle, Giraud, the Polish government-in-exile and others.

The imperialist world is NOT BEING UNIFIED. On the contrary it is cracking wide open. On the one hand, by its ruthless exploitation of conquered lands and by its adherence to a semi-fascist policý, the Allies are making it possible for the masses to clearly see the class differences in all occupied countries, ALLIED CAPITALISM (LKE AXIS CAPITAL-ISM) IS CREATING ITS OWN GRAVEDIGGER: THE PRO-LETARIAN REVOLUTION.

On the other hand, the divisions amongst the great powers themselves are coming directly into the open — so sharp is the antagonism between them. The Soviet Union recogeo sharn nizes one Polish government -- Great Britain recognizes another – America pretends to be neutral while jockeying for influence in both committees. Despite any "paper agreement" with the Allied Imperialists the Stalinist burocracy will find itself caught in the contradictions of mass pressure versus imperialist pressure — of Soviet economy versus capitalist economy.

Great Britain and the United States have already shown their incompatability in the Air Conferences; discussion over bases; control of Argentina; disposition of Africa; and the future status of recognized British colonies.

Under the cloak of the war emergency American strength builds its fortresses inside these colonies with its shipment of food and material, while at the same time American armed forces are stationed there. This situation finds Great Britain increasingly divorced politically and economically from its Incleasingly unviced pointering and economically from its life-lines — its colonies. This struggle between Great Britain and the United States for control of the markets of the world contains the seeds of the next Imperialist War. There can be no lasting unity among the egoitalists, the

very nature of its competitive system prohibits this both na-tionally and internationally. The only class that can afford unity is the proletariat — they have nothing to lose but their chains.

The choice before us is either proletarian revolution or imperialist war and Fascism,

Only the proletarian revolution can end the war and de-feat Fascism. Workers — Unite!

ATLANTIC CHARTER -

"Amazing" things are happening in the imperialist war - the imperialists are showing their true colors. The Atlantic Charter which promised "no aggrandizement, territorial or otherwise" and "no territorial changes that do not accord with the freely expressed wishes of the peoples con-cerned," was only an INFORMAL memorandum, says Mr. Roosevelt. Nobody signed it - it was just written to waste newsprint.

This stuff in the third point about respecting "the right of all peoples to choose the form of government under which they will live, and . . . sovereign rights and self-government restored to those who have been forcibly deprived of them' - that was just a pious wish according to the President. Nothing binding about the business.

Somebody in the back row may want to know "then what the hell are we fighting for?" Not a bad question, either. The FIGHTING WORKER has been careful througheither. out the five years of war to point out that the Allies, as well as the Axis, are fighting for markets, spheres of influence,

The capitalist state must use workers to shoot workers. This is the fatal weakness of all capitalist counter-revolu-tionary plans. When insurrectionary workers move into the

capitalist lie. History underwrites parasitic classes with no

streets, the machinery of the state is geared into motion in three successive shifts. First, the brutal poorly-armed police battle the workers. Later, the mechanized counter-revolutionary national guard takes over. If both fail, the heavilyequipped standing army rolls in.

Police and national guards cannot unaided smash a mass insurrection. Heroic masses of determined workers quickly overwhelm police (their arms are small) and soon neutralize mational militia (meir numbers are tew). However, no insurrection can finally succeed without the destruction of the national army. Since unarmed workers are no match for any well-equipped army, the door to state power can no longer be forced open, it must now be unlocked. The key is fraternization. The aim of fraternization in an insurrection is to split

the army along class seams. Success depends on soldier morale. Willingness (morale) of soldiers (drafted workers) morace, willingness (morace) of soliders (dratted workers) to obey their officers (middle class stooges of the bosses) is always low in capitalist armies. Officers must use severe repressions to prop up morale. Consequently, solidiers (doubly oppressed workers) are the most unstable section of the working class. A modern army is more vulnerable to insurrection than any other oppressed section of society. Insurrectionary workers, schooled in the tactics of Lenin, would not hesitate to fraternize. This tactic dooms an av-erage army. An army hit by the social concussion of a workers' insurrection will, like the highly unstable chemical

ammunition it carries, explode with devastating effect. Class-conscious workers! The future of humanity is in your fists. Historical progress demands the extension of the October Baudding United States and the extension of World Working Class Revolution — is approaching. the Prepare for it!

Oppressed workers of the world! Your main enemy is the capitalist system. This system (butcher system today, hunger system tomorrow) puts its property rights before your right to life. det etober bond sales were 695 milis, but redemptions were 400 milns. In October 1943 bond sales re $2^{1}\chi$ times as much, and only million dollars worth of bonds re cashed in. In the first seven ys of November, 1944, sales of nds amounted to 110 million dola, but 109 million dollars worth re cashed in — making a net sale bonds throughout the nation of ly one million dollars for the first pek im November.

Treasury officials are worried out the redemption of bonds and k of making it far more difficult realize cash for them.

Somehow or other — and despite I the advertising — American orkers lack faith in these bonds. hey remember all the campaigns ter the first world war. appealing people to burn their liberty bonds. has already started in some plants pw! They know of the various inationary moves of European and merican governments since the rst war and they are afraid that pese bonds will have only a small ortion of the purchasing power fiter the war that they had before he war.

It is significant that in a number primits introughout the technicy, workers have cut down on their ond purchases when they had a prievance against the Company. Intinctively the worker realizes the inship between employer and the tate — although he is not able to put it in words.

Bond sales to individuals have been a sore disappointment to the freasury Department throughout. Daly the swollen reserves of the inpurance companies, banks, and big isorporations have really made the bond campaigns a "success." This fact is a barometer of the uneasiness of the working class, its crumbling laith in bourgeois institutions, and its lack of real support of the imperialist war.

CAPITULATION TO SAFETY

PART II THE ECONOMIC ROOTS OF WAR

What is the background of this present war? If you know the past and present of any phenomenon, it is not difficult to predict its future. Before the "military" war there was a gigantic trade and political war between all nations.

war between all nations. Italy imposed a quota upon the products of all competitors. America signed trade treaties with various nations giving them "favored nation" treatment, giving one nation a break and excluding others. Tariffs shot up skyhigh. The Germans introduced a complicated barter system and its "aski" murk. Japan subsidized its shipping and other industries and was able to make constant inroads on the trade of other nations. It also introduced economic sanctions for the "outsiders" in Manchuria and on the Japanese mainland. Britain devalued the pound and strengthened her Empire system at the Ottawa conference, where the nations of the British Empire took steps to exclude the commerce of other nations particularly of the U. S.

In every nook and eranny of the Earth, Standard Oil fought British Dutch Shell for the oil markets. The struggle took on not only diplomatic and economic but even bloody military forms. Many a political revolution has been fomented in the great struggle for oil. Aluminum, steel, banking and other trusts fought each other all over the globe. Uncle Sam following the first war slowly excluded Great Britain from the Latin American markets. In the thirties the Japanese and Germans were finally able – with government subsidies – to penetrate a little into those markets. Whereupon Mr. Rooseveit introduced his "good neighbor" policy and the trade treaties with Latin America, whereby the American government made loans and gave other subsidies to South America to keep the Western Hemisphere a Closed Shop for the colossus of the North.

Britain used its fin and rubber monopolies in the Far East as a weapon over everyone's head. It forced the prices up and kept artificial quotas. Germany fought this monopoly by attempting to develop synthetic products. America found itself in the position where it not only had a surplus of trade in finished products and in agricultural products, but also had surplus capital which it needed to export abroad. Under the "New Deal" the American capitalists decided to surrifice agriculture exports and to introduce a gint subsidy campaign in the forms of loans to foreign powers, to keep American trade going.

THE LIST IS INEXHAUSTIBLE

Competition is the heart of capitalism. The competitive arean becomes ever bigger and bigger, but the competition grows with it — and grows sharper and bloodier. But competition is itself only an effect of something deeper — the mode of production. And competition under capitalism is only one of the expressions of the basic capitalist contradiction: SOCIALIZED PRODUCTION AND PRIVATE APPROPRIATION.

PRODUCTION FOR PROFIT

Capitalism is based on wage labo, and commodity production production for a market, and for a profit. No wheel of industry, under the present system, turns unless the boss can make a profit out of production. People may be starving, may be without clothing or shelter, but that does not influence the capitalist production process. Commodities are produced only for a profit. The quest for markets to sell those commodities is a constant problem before capitalism, since the masses of proletarians throughout the world are paid only sufficient wages to cover mere subsistence needs. The surplus over and above that is appropriated by the capitalist. Unless capitalism can find markets or spheres of investment for the surplus, it suffers crises and depressions — and, of course, it eventually must go to war to DIVIDE the market that is left, utcal markets in other words from its fellow capitalist powers.

steal markets, in other words, from its fellow capitalist powers. All this isn't new. It was stated by Karl Marx and Frederick Engels in the famous "Communits Manifesto" way back in 1848, and it was stated with scientific precision. But the capitalist war makers MUST keep this truth from the working class. They must build the the that capitalism is a healthy organism, that the only reasons we have wars is because we have "bad men" like Hitler (or the Kaiser), or we have "bad men" like the Bolshevits, or "bad men" like the "Jewish Capitalist Plutorats of England and America," or the "bad men" of the Hirohito dynasty. They must hide from us the fact that it isn't bad MEN, but a BAD DECAYING SYSTEM which causes wars. If you took all of the "bad men" in the world and drowned them we would still have imperialist wars; those wars are INEVITABLE so long as you have capitalism.

CAPITALISM'S CRISES

Just take a glance at these brilliant words of the Communist Manifesto (written 96 years ago) and see if they don't tell the story of Capitalist contradiction better than all the lying "economists" that capitalism has ever passed off on a gullible public:

"The bourgeoisie cannot exist without constantly revolutionizing the instruments of production . . . The need of a constantly expanding market for its products chases the bourgeoisie over the whole surface of the globe . . . It is enough to mention the commercial crises that by their periodical return put on its trial, each time more threateningly, the existence of the entire bourgeois society. In these crises a great part not only of the existing products, but also of the previously created productive forces, are periodically destroyed. (Remember "plowing under" and killing pigs in the 39's?) In these crises there breaks out an epidemic that, in all earlier epochs, would have seemed an absurdity — the epidemic of

over-production. Society suddenly finds itself put back into a state of momentary barbarism; it appears as if a famine, a universal war of devastation had cut off the supply of every means of subsistence; industry and commerce seem to be destroyed; and why? Because there is too much civilization, too much means of subsistence, too much commerce. The productive forces at the disposal of society no longer tend to further the development of the conditions of bourgeois property; on the contrary, they have become too powerful for these conditions, by which they are fettered, and so soon as they overcome these fetters, they bring disorder into the whole of bourgeois society, endanger the existence of bourgeois property. The conditions of bourgeois society are too narrow to comprise the wealth created by them. And how does the bourgeoisie get over these crises? On the one hand by enforced destruction of a mass of productive forces; on the other, by the conquest of new markets, and by the more thorough exploitation of the old ones. That is to say, by paving the way for more extensive and more destructive crises, and by diminishing the means whereby crises are prevented."

CAUSE AND RESULT

Crises and wars are caused not by "bad men," not by "sun spots," not by a lack of printed money. They are caused by OVER-PRODUC-TION. And over-production is an illness from which capitalism can not recover. In order to exist, in order to meet competition, capitalism must build bigger and bigger plants, bigger and bigger monopolies. It must force the small man out of business and later the small monopoly. All industry becomes subordinate to the big banks. The liquid surpluses of capital mount to threatening proportions — 20 billion dollars in gold in the Kentucky vaults, the biggest corporation reserves in history. Capitalism drowns in its own liquidity. It has OVER-PRODUCED — and not only overproduced commodities, but it has "overproduced" capital which is begging for investment clscwhere.

The anarchy of capitalism, the profit motive, the INDIVIDUAL rather than SOCIAL appropriation, forces the capitalist mations to constantly war with each other to gain markets for their surpluses.

The Second World Imperialist War (on the part of all nations except the Soviet Union), is just such a war. It is a war for markels, spheres of investment. The first shot may have been fired by Germany or Japan, but the CAUSES of the war lie rooted in something much deeper — Capitalism itself. And the guilt for the war does not rest necessarily with the nations who fired first, but with the rotten, moribund system which uses war to gain markets and spheres of influence.

Germany went to war to gain control of Europe, as a prelude to the fertile markets of the Near East and Asia. Unable to continue competing by "ordinary" means, i.e. economic and trade means, because of the superiority of the American production machine and the long ill-effects of Versailles, Germany took first to the war for conquest. America, with its enormous wealth and productive machine, cotld sit back and wait longer till becoming embroiled in the war. But the waiting was only a tactic. American Imperialism knew it was going into the war, as far Jack as 1920 in fact — when the M Pay plans were first formulated. American Imperialism needed new markets and spheres of fulfuence as much as Germany — far more, in fact, because America has far more liquid capital for investment. But America, with its proletarian to yet as "hard-up" or as close to Revolution, could afford to temporize, to wait till Germany, Britain and France exhausted themselves, (parenthetically we might say that "alies" in modern imperialist war, are not "friends," but nations whom our Wall Street master TEMPORARILY fears least).

TWO KINDS OF ATTACK - MILITARY AND ECONOMIC

That nation which goes to war first is not necessarily the aggressor. On the contrary it is only the economic aggressions of American imperialism and the tight-fisted control of the Empire by British imperialism which forced the other less fortunate powers in the first instance to take counter measures, diplomatic, political and eventually military. The economic crises brought on by the fact that the "have-not" powers were unable to find markets for their surplus goods and capital, confronted them with the imminent threat of proletarian Revolution. The only temporary solution to their problems rests therefore in stretching out for military control of "new" markets — markets stolen from other imperialists.

"For example, when Japan and Italy reduce the cost of production so as to undersell Germany, England, France and the United States on the world markets, these countries are forced to reduce their cost of production (further lower the standard of living) to undersell Japan and Italy. This vicious circle continues until the workers and farmers of these countries, pressed to the wall, prepare for revolution, for the overthrow of their exploiters.

"But how do the exploiters and their paid agents prepare to meet this situation? They will not give up their "right to exploit" and its golden power. Why should they, when they can use workers to fight and shed blood for them? They try to stave off the revolution in two ways: either by the establishment of an open fascist dictatorship, as for example in Germany with Hitler, or by colonial conquest (the Japanese invasion of China or the Italian invasion of Ethiopia).

"Within each country 'free' competition gives way to competition between syndicates and trusts, in other words to finance capitalism. Monopolies extend competition within the nation to competition between nations. In the language of economics, the productive forces have long ago outstripped the national boundaries. Capitalism has created the world market to which all countries are subordinated. And no matter how hard the different nations try to pull their productive forces back within national boundaries, it can't be done. 'Organized' capitalism is a contradiction and a fake. The way out of this contradiction is not to retrace our steps, not to go backwards, but rather to eliminate the causes of this contradiction, to eliminate capitalism iself, to overthrow it, to establish a socialist mode of production which once and for all abolishes exploitation of man by man."
