Social Revolution Wanes

From July through September the workers and sections of the peasants in Spain threatened to overcome the counter-revolution-ary policy of the Popular Front Government and parties and overthrow capitalism. In that period all imperialist powers, including the United States, watched the situation closely ready to act together to prevent the extension of the October Bolshevik revolution to Spain. Germany and Italy acted openly. France and England had to conceal their counterrevolutionary role to avoid serious struggles with the workers at home. The neutrality formula and committee served them well. The Soviet Union under the leadership of the Stalinists played the game of the imperialists by entering into the neutrality conspiracy.

Inside the ranks of the working class the agents of the imperialists, the Socialists and Stalinists, had the upper hand. When the workers moved in a revolutionary direction they went along at their head in order to be in a position to hold them back from following in the path of the Russian workers of 1917.

WORKERS HARNESSED

During the months of October and November they succeeded in once more harnessing the workers to the capitalist government. volution rose to its highest peak committees which corresponded in part to the Soviets of 1917 in sible split-off by the extreme Russia. These committees assumed governmental functions and began to regulate life, challenging the rule of the boss class. The top committee in this structure was the Anti-Fascist Committee of Fifteen. This contest could end either in the workers setting up the dictatorship of the proletariat or in the bosses re-establishing their dictatorship over the workers. A Bolshevik party would have made the first outcome possible. The absence of a Bolshevik party made the second inevitable. So in the beginning of October the Anti-Fascist Committee was liquidated and the Catalonian Generalidad once more became master of the situation, this time with the help of the "left" representatives of the workers, the anarcho-syndical-

Popular Front Stiffened; FRENCH TROOPS BREAK

Shoot Down Arabs, Moors

The dramatic suicide of the Socialist Minister of the Interior, Salengro, has drawn all eyes to the sharp crisis in France, obscured for a time by the Spanish civil war.

In June the working class in France took the offensive in a series of nation wide strikes. The "working class" parties of Blum and Thorez held the struggle back from rising to a revolutionary level. The impending defeat of the workers in Spain is shifting the situation in favor of the bourgeoisie.

FASCISTS GROWING BOLDER

The Fasscist forces are growing bolder and parade their armed detachments openly before the workers. The new strikes now rising sporadically over France are no longer handled with the demagogic promises of June. Salengro's promise that there will be no more sit-down strikes was carried out even in his home town of Lille, where troops were used to break the strike of 300 coal truck-drivers. In Tripoli, French reserves ruthlessly suppressed the strike of the Moslems demanding the union of the Lebanon Republic with Syria. And in Morocco French troops have been used to shoot down Moors whose agita-

While Grange was recruiting crews to break the strike on the East Coast, Dubinsky's office was distributing leaflets in St. Louis telling the needle trades workers that: "The (boss) Government of the United States is eager to establish an abundant life for the men and women who turn the wheels of industry." Between the main policy of Green and Grange and that of Dubinsky and Lewis there is no essential difference.

More important even than the question of organizational structure is the question of policy. There are only two bases for a labor movement: collaboration with the bosses against the workers; or solidarity of the workers against the bosses and their labor agents. There is little room for a new set up on the first basis. Lewis and Green are fighting it out now to decide whether the bosses will be served by craft or industrial class collaboration structures. But on the basis of a class struggle policy the marine workers can build a mighty organization.

"THE MUSIC OF AMERICAN PROSPERIT

Unemployment to Grow; New Crisis Coming

In a recent article the New York Times grows absolutely lyrical about the condition of American capitalism. It talks about the "music of American prosperity". It shows that dividends are going up and coupon clippers are busy. Wages it says are going up, unemployment is decreasing, and payrolls are rising. If we believe this picture prosperity is all around us.

Millions of workers know from their daily, bitter experience that the picture of the Times is a class picture which records the improvement in the position of the bosses. The bosses run society and the government and have have been able to use the upswing which is taking place to improve the position of their class. At the same time they have thrown a few crumbs to a few million workers in the form of Christmas bonuses and increases in wages to escape paying the federal tax on the undistributed surplus earnings of corporations which is a high sounding legal name for the surplus value created by the workers; and to bribe the workers into passively accepting the rising cost of living.

A truer picture of the situation in the country and what is in store for the workers is contained in a recent report of the Federal Reserve Board. The Board says that "The current level of activity is higher than at any time since 1930." "Shoes, rayon, petroleum, refinery products and tobacco have been produced at the highest department is asking for dirigibles levels on record." "In such industries as iron and steel,-output during recent months has been less than 10 per cent under the average for 1929, and in machine tools-activity is now greater than Army Engineers, announced plans at any time since 1929."

WAR PROGRAM SPEEDS INDUSTRY

In accounting for this upturn the Board avoids stating that government spending has played a large part. Billions handed out to big business corporations directly; millions more indirectly through the PWA, WPA, etc; and the record breaking war program involving gigantic expenditures for coast defense improvements, cruiser construction, etc. have stimulated industry.

The Federal Reserve Board says about this that "Improvement in domestic conditions has continued to be the principal particularly of industrial products, also have increased."
