Governor Green announced this week that the Illinois National Guard is to be increased to nearly three times its prewar size. The guard will consist of 34,805 treops including two infantry divisions, 2,623 air corps troops, and other auxiliary units. Of this total Chicago will have approximately 19,000 ground troops and 1,923 air corps men or approximately 50% of the total. 60 new armories will be built. It seems that Gover-

nor Green is preparing the state of Illinois for war, and particularly the Chicago area.

forced to walk the picket line to get a real wage increase, and to meet the still soaring cost of living, Governor Green is prepared with the State Guard if Captain Barnes Labor Detail can't handle the job, of restraining the militant actions of the workers to defend themselves.

The capitalist class is proparing for the next strike wave of the workers with their anti-labor bills. Congress has just passed the Hobbs Eill and is leading even bigger legislative guns against labor. But they know what strength militant workers have when they stand united for their just domands. The capitalists aren't taking any chances. If they can't shackle the workers down to the law of their courts, they are prepared to use the armed forces.

The National Guard lived up to this tradition as in 1894 whon it was used to smash the railroad strike. Recently when workers of the Pratt & Whitney plant in Hartford, Connecticut wont out on strike. and set a mass picket line around their plant, Gov.Baldwin sont 50 stato troopors "to preserve law and order". They did so by breaking up the picket line with night Said Govornor Baldwin, sticks "wo wont in because I folt it was our duty and I still fool it is our duty. They knew workers must choose between starvation wages or breaking these laws, to a brutal new police army - the expanded National Guard - is made ready.

Workers can propare against this private army of the lords of money by forming a military defence of their own. Workers should organize flying squads which are propared to defend workers in other industries. They should form dofence councils - permanent inter-union; inter-industry defence councils of both union and non-union workers. This must be done soon, now, to be effective.

the Chicago Housing Authority announced that the 2,334 veterans' temporary housing units being constructed for the past four months have been abandoned. The other 2,760 which were won't even be planned started. The reason given: lack of funds. Three million dollars was needed.

Here is the "pludrcrous spectacle: Congress has approved a seven billion dollar budget for the "peacetime" army. The Chicago city government has spont \$115,000,000 in the last year on street lights, sowers and other political patronage plums.

More than 100,000 famis lies need permanent homes in Chicago. The capitalist government cannot even provide five thousand temporary ones.

What is so dramatically illustrated is that the "great free enterprise systom" can nover provide adequate housing for the majority of people - workingeclass people.

Between 1930 and 1940 moved into dugouts, caves, shacks, old box-cars and unused warehouses (US Government Bureau of Labor Statistics).

Has there been a housing shortage for the last 16 years? Yes, and longer than that. Workers pay for their housing out of

the wages they earn. So the two-thirds of the people at the lower end of the scale are doomed to take broken-down housingoften houses cast-off by the rich. This is what their money can buy and this is the only kind of housing that low cost makes profits for the

A "veterans" housing program", then, is an illusion. It can only discourage the whole workingclass movement, waste its offorts. Only when the entire working-class, including the millions of vets brings its tromendous weight to bear against the lords of finance and property - can the housing problem whe solved. Then it will be solved not in a capitalist "housing program", but as part of ce complete social revolution.

Since June 12, on and off, for an hoursor otwo as dozen, sometimes two dozens members of the American Veterans Committee have been picketing the city hall. they want homes. They have had enough of fox-holes. They desire to get back to "normal".

It was somewhat strange to observe these vetorans move slowly about the city hall. That huge chunk of concrete, a block square's worth, emphasized more completely the puny protest of these dissatisfied exsoldiers.

The leaflet they distributed stated that they were "fighting mad". But their demonstration - if one can call it that - did not indicate this. In fact it was difficult to realize that here were the follows of Tunisia, Casino, Normandy, Iwo Jima, Okinawa. 9,723 Chicago area men killed .. the highest casualty rate for any county in the US ... These were the men who had endured all this - against their inover 400 thousand families torests and even against their will.

#### Dear Brothers:

On Wednesday, June 19, the addressing machine operators of the M & A (Mailing & Addrossing) Dept. here at Montgomory Wards carried thru a good demonstration of labor solidarity. Twonty workers -Negro and white - approached Mr. Kase, (manager of dept.) to domand a change in production rates. Mr. Kase was alarmod at the unity and fighting spirit of the girls and protested that he would see only one girl at a time, or a committee. The girls sensing the strongth in unity, replied - "All for one and one for all; we came together as a group not as individuals." Mr. Kase sensing the fighting mood of the girls backed down and finally lot all the girls come in.

The girls demanded a downward revision of production rates. For a long time the goneral feeling was that the rates wore too high. In fact, even the most compotent girls are unable to produce the rates set by the company. Since the girls are given a rating according to fulfillment of certain rates it becomes clear that no girl will get a rating high enough to qualify for an increase in wages. Girls who have for years consistently made the nocessary output find themselves unable to make the domanded rate. To top everything off the mothods by which they arrivo at the production standards are so complex and vague<sup>®</sup> oven the supervisors have difficulty in explaining the girls how the company sets production rates. In fact, upon checking the rates Mr. Kase informed the girls that an orror in computing the VIFWS

As long as there are no rogular mostings where mombers can democratically thrash out problems and decide on policy, the union will be unable to onforce its domands against Sowol Avory & Co. : Wo need regular meetings and democratic discussions on wages, grievances, vacations and seniority.
