WORKERS! FORM" DEFENCE SQUADS TO PROTECT NEGROES

The defence of Negroes against terror attacks here in Chicago has hit a "snag". The Socialist Workers Party, which has taken the lead in calling for defence squads within the Conference to Combat Terrorism Against Minorities held a"mass" meeting of its own last Friday evening (Aug. IS) at 708 E. 47th Street. To the 125 people there the SWP proposed a new "compromise" defence guard plan: Demand that Mayor Kelly deputize one thousand special guards chosen by Negro, labor, and "progressive" organizations to defend Negroes threatened with terror attack. Since it is an obvious fact that Mayor Kelly will refuse this demand, workers are still left the urgent problem of providing their own defence of Negroes. SWP has offered us nothing.

The Conference, composed of more than 50 church, inter-racial, "liberal" and labor groups has so far refused to form workers" defence squads to police the areas where Negroes are in danger. The reason: such defence squads are not legal. "They would have to carry weapons without permission." Such are the worries of these timid souls.

Plans for a mass protest march through some of the neighborhoods where the terror attacks have taken place remain "up-inthe-air" because the Communist Party (Stalinist) refuses to cooperate with the "Trotskyist" SWP, and the "liberals"who dominate the Conference are afraid to attompt a mass protest without Stalinist support.

Why has the Chicago working-class so far slept on this problem? First, there is a general lack of awareness of the regent violence against Negroes in Chicago. THREAT of TERROR against MEGROES CONTINUES while 13 LOCA. UNIONS in "CONFERENCE TO COMBAT TERRORISM AGAINST MINORITIES"

The daily press has suppressed the news of the 59 bombings and terror attacks against Negro homes in the last two years Second, the AFL and CIO leadership have taken absolutely no stops to publicize these attacks as a threat to the whole working-class and they have resisted any militant suggestions that the hundreds of local unions in Chicago be mobilized in defence of Megrees.

Thus the practical problem of organizing the workers toward the defence of Nogroes has not been mot. The agencies for reaching the organized body of workers are in the hands of capitalist-minded labor burgerats.

This was on July 26th. is also consistently moving in the political direction which will sabotage the formation of a workers'defence of Megroos. The SUP has openly endersed Henry McGee and the National Association for the Advancoment of Colored People as a "boni-fice leader of the Negro people"without pointing to what the soction of the Nogroos the NAACP represents. There are at least thirteen local trade unions represented in the Conference. These locals should immodiately approach scoros of other locals to join them in this urgent project. The Conference as it is now, will nover take this step. The union representation must do it. Militant rank-and-file labor pressure can and must become the dominant force in the corference if it is to play any effective part in the defence of Negroes.

At the beginning of negotiations, the rank and file at a membership meeting showed willingness to fight management every stop of the way. But the union leaders took three months to maneuver than out of this feeling. When the union asked for a \$6 raise Fields offered \$3 and replied:

"...three dollar increase would place the warehouse employees above the rates paid in this prea."

"...eny rise in living cost...is...uncertain."

The union negotiating committee came down to \$5. Management still said, "NOS"

In the face of this arrogant attitude. of the Field management, the union leadership issued a leaflet to its workers offering them two courses of action:

1. "Accept the Management's proposal weiting to "discuss further wage adjustments should inflation develop ..."

2. "...employees could refuse the Management's offer ... " and "... delay further meetings with Management until (we) know whore the OPA stands." .

Were these the only two choices open to the workers! What about strike action! These two choices acted like two buckets of water on the little fire of worker militancy which was still burning. So the negotiating committee succombed to Management's\$3 e wook meximum raise, \$26 a wook minimum, e fow adjustments in wage classifications, but no increases in vacations. \$26 a wock! Is this a living wage in Chicego, OPA or no OPA!

This "soft" contract is a chear-cut example of the collaboration of union "leaders" with the capitalist class. The "leaders" carefully manouvored the rankand-file right into Management's hands. Militant, independent workers action would have resulted in a strike - the first step toward victory of worker countries TRUST-BUSTERS SHOOTIN' UP CHICAGO

Operating from its headquarters at 208 S.La Salle St., the Midwest office of the U.S.Department of Justice anti-trust division is on the prowl for trusts. 20 trained investigators are out to get them. Judging from their discoveries one would think they were hunting a white whale. Yet trusts are as easy to locate as trees in a forest.

To date these trust-busters boast of discovering collusion between the Yellow Cab and the Checker Cab Companies to control Chicago's streets. Also chalked up is a charge against the optical wholesalers for kicking back on glasses to the 5,000 eye specialists here. Indeed an achievement! The big boys are really down with a case of fright. These trustbusters are proving as effective as an umbrella at Nagasaki.

Everyone knows the big trusts. The First National Bank, Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust, the Northern Trust Co., and the Harris Trust and Saving Dank, Conveniently centered in the loop, have over \$3,000,000,000 in assets. Illinois Boll Telephone Co. and Vestern Electric are part of American Telephone and Tolograph Corporation which is worth a moro 3,990,000,000. Chicago's woalth including personal property adds up to about \$5,200,000,000 or less than these banks plus A T & T.

Do you want to find a trust? Then hike it over to 79th and the lake to the South Morks of Carneige Illinois the sted subsidiary of U S Steel. US Steel's capital - \$1,820,000,000. Control - 35.2% of steel production. Another trust? End up at 26th and Western and spend the afternoon walking around International Harvostors, the big baby in the farm equipmont field. They make everything from twine to tractors. If you still have pep march around the mile square stockyards between 35th and 43rd, Halsted and Ash Moot Chicago's Big Four: Swift, land. Armour, Wilson and Cudahy. They try to put a tape measure around Sears Roebuck on the West Side and Montgomery Wards at Chicago and the river. From January to July

These companies manufacture 80% of the cigarettes. Then into he car. If its a Ford, Chevy or Chrysler it's made by the Big Throe in auto who are beyond competition. Need gas? Stop at Standard Oil N.J. It is one of the 20 companies producing 60% of the petroleum, and it has a larger shere than the bottom twelve on that list. And so it goes. If it's a shot of Hiram Walker - one of the 4 Big Pins in the whiskey alley. If it s Balaban & Katz Theatre -

What does this prove: Only that capitalism grows like anything else. It gets bigger and bigger. The large firm crowds out the small one, swallows it up. The langer firm shoves the large one into a corner, repeats the act. The result: the industrial and financial giants we see today. Competition leads to the victory of the company that produces the most goods cheapest. Decades of such competition brings a few huge magnates to the top of the industrial pile.

neighborhood without one.

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In another sense we see in these great combines the profit extracted from the American working class for the last 150 years. Each generation of sweat and grime has added to this tremendous heap of accumulated profit. For what else are our factories and cities but the handiwork of labor. Take away this labor and Chicago would be a wilderness, its boulevards earthen trails, the site of its buildings swamp and forest.

Under capitalism monopolies give the ruling class a super-profit. Thru them production is dominated, the market held more in control, prices raised. The destiny of the country falls into the grasp of less end less hands, and as the pirate band shrinks, its power grows.

Can the U.S. Department of Justice anti-trust division (which, incidentally, just had its appropriation cut by congress) stop this process? Did Jiggs over get the best of Maggie? The policy of the government is to serve these trusts. When the American monopolists' war broke out against Japan and Gormany the first act of Recevolt was to give the trusts the green-light. In 1943 there were 17% less companies than in 1941. The billions of dollars in war contracts were handed down thru a clustre of corporations. Today these giants are richer and fatter than ever. Ŵ

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But it is not in the working class interests to destroy this industrial plant. Middle class prattlers would make us a country of farmers and cobblers toiling dawn to dust in never-ending drudgery. This great economic machine can be made our slave instead of master. Unleash the full industrial facilities of America for a generation and the 8 hour day will have become old-fashioned religion, the housing problem, a fable. "I've got plenty of nothing" will no longer be the working class national enthem.

But first the oconomy must be taken from that greedy, evil fow whose heaven is \$ signs," whose patrictism is profit, whose knowledge is the ledger, whose culturo the ring of a cash register, whose religion is the agony of toilers. These plunderers few and weak by themselves could be squashed like an annoying insect were it not for this same state which would lull the working class to sleep with deceitful songs of trust-busting. Congress, courts, army, police - the entire governmental apparatus from the village shoriff to the presidency, here is the guardian of the ruling class. Here is the watchdog of the monopolies that the working class must beat to death. Boat unmoricifully with the club of revolution till its lifeless body can bo kicked easily aside. Then will come a democratic government representing alt who tdil. Then this huge industrial mach ine, nurtured on generations of grief, want and insecurity, will become a means to plenty and contentment.

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
