## **Shadow of Dictatorship Deepens Over U.S.**

F HITLER wins, say the Army men, the newspapers and government officials he will attack the United States. Everything for national defense. Conscription is the key to the problem.

For the first time in United States history the government is resorting to peace time conscription. The "big lesson of France, Poland, Belgium and other countries overrun in recent months is lack of preparation," said Henry L. Stimson new Secretary of War, to the Senate Military Affairs Comwork. Anyone can study the plans; they are not confidential.

It is interesting to notice that within six months after the study of the plan by the military attache the national defense act was adopted by Germany as the framework for their present warfare and is patterned after the American industrial mobilization plan.

Amazing, you may say. But here it is in black and white. The most terroristic capitalist dictatorship on earth, Hitler Germany, based its present hideous warfare and regimenting of the whole country into support of the war machine ON THE AMERICAN M-DAY PLANS. Hitler like Roosevelt, adopted "our" M-Day Plan, as Cherne states, for national defense.

That does not mean that you will see military service or will even be accepted for military service. But unless you are exempt or deferred, you will be inducted into the armed services.

In a letter to Roosevelt 16 CIO and AFL leaders who make up the Labor Policy Advisory Committee of the National Defense Commission expressed "full and unstinted devotion to our country and to the program of national defense."

Not only do the CIO, AFL and Railroad union leaders pledge their complete support, but also the support of their membership for the war drive:

"We and our membership are united in our effort and determination to give effective and expeditious co-operation in the fulfillment of the defense program, and to contribute to a free and secure democracy."

The press reports that the letter made the President "very happy." It did not mention the feelings of the millions of workers who face longer hours, reduced wages, military service, higher income tax, and the high cost of living and other miseries which the national defense program means.

But conscription now is not the whole answer. The government has a vast scheme which it has been preparing almost since the end of the last war and before peace with Germany was signed. Conscription is provided for in those plans, known as M-Day, meaning Mobilization Day. Introducing conscription now means that the government, frightened by the successes Hitler has already achieved and frantic at the thought of what will happen if he succeeds in smashing England, is beginning to apply its plans now before war breaks out.

What are those plans?

M-Day is the abbreviation of Mobilization Day, first day America is at war.

The M-Day plans are a blueprint for a totalitarian and brutal dictatorship. This can best be shown by this fact: Mr. Cherne, author of M-Day And What It Means To You, in a radio address at the University of Chicago Round Table, on July 14, stated:

It is interesting to go back to the German plan. In 1934 the military attache of the German government was privileged to study our industrial mobilization plan. Let me emphasize this was not "fifth column" nor surreptitious

Hitler copied the 1934 plan which was an outgrowth of plans developed by the General Staff of the United States Army since 1920.

But since 1934 the M-Day plans have been revised, improved, enlarged and elaborated in 1936 and again in 1939. Part of this process of "improving" the M-Day Plans was to observe Germany's highly successful experiments with the 1934 model.

Every workers knows what Hitlerism means: destruction of labor unions, elimination of strikes. forbidding of the right to speak, write, think as you please-in one word-dictatorship. If we are to be victorious in combatting the original "made in U.S." model on which Hitler's Blitzkrieg is based, we should learn everything about this M-Day plan which effects every worker-at home, at work, play, and in the Army.

There are dozens of books, pamphlets, and articles on M-Day. We will use data collected by Leo M. Cherne, for several reasons: first, he is easily the outstanding civilian authority on M-Day; secondly, his

Since Mr. Charne wrote this, the Burke-Wadsworth Bill has been approved by the Senate Military Affairs Committee, and the draft age is to be from 21-31.

How many men will be covered by the first draft and what proportion will be accepted?

There are 10,000,000 male citizens in the United States between the ages of 21 and 31.... World War experience indicates that 6,000,000.... will be initially deferred from military service for various reasons. If, however, the percentage of deferments leaves less Continued on Page Two

than 4,000,000 men available.... there are 3,000,000 men between the ages of 18 and 21,.... the greater portion would be unable to secure deferments for reasons of dependency or importance in the industrial scheme .... there remain only the 13,000,000 men between the

ages of 31 and 45.... The government doesn't miss a trick. Everyone is eligible for military service, unless you are deferred or are indispensable to industry.

What pay will I receive if I enlist or am drafted into the Army?

(Mr. Cherne lists a long table showing wages range from \$21 monthly for buck private, to \$8,000 yearly for generals).

But Congress is debating giving only \$5 monthly to drafted men. "In time of war, ten per cent additional is paid for overseas' service," says Cherne.

Does the mere fact that I am married protect me? No. Your marriage certificate is not a deferment cer-

tificate. First of all, the marriage must have taken place before the declaration of war.... Secondly, if your wife is your only dependent, you will have to show that she cannot support herself without you. If she can work, she will not be viewed as a dependent... But until she is actually employed, she will constitute a sufficient justification for your deferment.

But, according to the M-Day plan, the government will see that you wife is put to work. Marriage will not protect you.

No hiding behind petticoats. No shirking of duty. We must all make sacrifices for the national "welfare"-or go o the pen.

Flat feet exempted less than 4%, eyes 21.68%. Have no fear boys, even if you have most or all these physical disorders, you still won't be excused from military duty. You will be given "limited military work," says Mr. Cherne. Verily, there is no escaping the war machine.

How soon after M-Day am I likely to be inducted into military service?

If you are between the ages of 21 and 31, you will probably be inducted into military sevice within a period of from two months to one year AFTER M-Day...

Cherne bragged in his Round Table radio address that no one had found a single mistake in his earlier book on M-Day. Well, here it is. You will be inducted into military service not AFTER M-Day, as Cherne puts it both in this present work and the previous one, but BEFORE the United States enters the war-for the first time in its history.

This is a big new development in America military policy. As Stimson put it, it's "one of the lessons of the Battle of The government learned its lesson. But the France." labor movement, unfortunately, shows no sign that is has learned it's lesson from the Battle of France: that support of capitalist governments' war machines does not stop Fascism, but allows the free and unlimited development of fascism at home.

Can I be forced to work for a certain firm or in a certain industry?

.as the war develops, increasing controls over labor will certainly be exercised. If you are a skilled worker needed in an essential industry, your labor may ultimately be subject to absolute control. You will be required to go wherever the government thinks you will be most valuable. If you refuse, you can then be inducted into the armed forces on the basis of the principle adopted in the last war: work or fight..

"Work or fight" unless you are a government official or member of the exploiting class, who toil not, neither do they fight. They draft us to fight. And in true Hitler fashion to work where they please. Will I still work only 40 hours a week with time

and a half for overtime?

A national war effort will in all likelihood call for a sur ender of some privileges which you now enjoy under <sup>V</sup>ages and H ir Law and the Walsh-Healey Public cts Act....

Waruh 1 ...... orae. ) MSure .dX the United States has greater in ustrial resources, it does not have comparatively greater reserves of skilled man power. It seems almost certain, therefore, that

overtime provisions in the Federal laws will not be able to withstand the pressure of a wartime effort.

For 60 years American labor has fought for the 8-hour day. Today, in 1940, Cherne guarantees that the 40-hour week will be abrogated. This is the real American way: the draft is given a fancy name; long hours, reduced pay, are called "surrender of some privileges." The very words used, "privileges," show the transitory character of all New Deal reforms.

Cherne makes another mistake. France raised hours of labor to 72, not 48. He could have added that England has also raised hours of labor to 72. And the U.S. will do likewise. Labor gains of 60 years standing will be wiped out overnight. Labor is not alive to this serious menace to its living standards.

Will child-labor legislation protect my children from 14 to 18 against factory work?

... it is certain that women and children will be used to fill whatever gaps occur. The various state and Federal laws that now prevent the employment of children between the ages of 14 and 18 will have to be suspended. Women will be allowed to work longer hours than they are today, while children will be permitted to work in industries from which they are now barred.

Women will be "allowed" to work longer hours. Children "permitted" to fill whatever gaps occur! This is called civilization.

May I leave New York to take a better-paying posi-

tion in the Philadelphia Navy Yard? The War Labor Administration will not only have to see to it that the job and the worker are joined, but

the two stay together, especially in essential industries. The propagandists of the American way like to contrast it to the European way of having all citizens move about

only with passports. Is this any better than Hitler's way? Will my wages go up after M-Day?

If our experience in the First World War is any indication, wages will certainly rise .... But remember that in the last war the cost of living rose even more rapidly than wages.

Cherne admits, in other words that real wages will fall If present-day Germany where "our" very own mobilization plans are in use is any indication, not only will wages not rise, but they will fall steadily. If England is any indication of wage trends, we see that wages have remained stationary, hours have risen to from 60 to 72 weekly, the cost of living has gone up, taxes have increased-and real wages, therefore, have fallen precipitously.

How much will M-Day increase my personal income tax?

## Millionaire Labor Bleeder 1es

CHICAGO, AUGUST 10.—One of the country's lesser known millionaires, Mike Carrozzo, was buried two days ago in a \$10,000 bronze casket.

He was a union leader! Typical wealthy labor faker, bleeding 15,000 Chicago street and construction laborers in 25 union locals. The value of his estate will be determined in Probate court.

Last July he deposited \$277,251 to lift a lien of \$241,000 placed against him by the government for evading that much income tax in 1937 and 1938. That would place his income near a million dollars yearly.

He owned a 805 acres estate near Hobert, Ind., and a \$75,000 home in Long Beach, Indiana; hundreds of Hereford cattle, prize winning swine, draft horses, several bookie joints His huge racing stable was listed in his wife's name until he was indicted on charges of violating the Sherman Anti-Trust Act in collusion with paving and building contractors. Now his horses race under the name of Superior Farm. He was at Arlington Park races almost daily 'til his illness.

gates. The best and prettiest entertainers were always present.

He compelled Chicago subway workers to pay \$40-\$50 initiation fees to the Street and Tunnel Miners' union. A democratic union doesn't need such steep initiation fees. Head of this union is Peter Fosco who, as County Commissioner, is a member of the Cook County government. Another labor "leader."

Last spring Carrozoz called a strike of 60 workers in the city's asphalt plants, a protest at the city's refusal to award a contract for 100,000 tons of asphalt to a concern incorporated and headed by Kart, Carrozzo's attorney.

Chief figure in the coming battle for control of Carrozzo's lucrative domain is his ally, Frank (The Enforcer) Nitti, Capone's former head man. Attorney Kart. appointed by Carrozzo, is in charge of the local unions. 'The spotlight on Carrozzo's wealth throws light on the need for unions to kick out gangsters and exploiters. Carrozzo was both. Many others like him are left -too many. William Green, president of the AFL, announced he would send a representative to "watch" the battle for control. Were he a real leader of labor, Green would help the rank and file oust gangsters. He would wage a public campaign to expose the sources of Carrozzo's income, his tieup with different capitalist concerns, and the city government.

.... there will be a general increase in all kinds of taxation, amounting in most cases to between 100 and 200 per cent.

Look at England. Income tax began at \$1,000 yearly income. This was lowered steadily until today all workers pay income tax-20 per cent of their weekly salary. The U. S. will be no exception. In order to raise the \$15,000,-000,000 required yearly for the war machine the government has already begun to take the money out of what is called "consumer spending." They do so in the form of income taxes, taxes on amusements, etc. You pay for this war. You fight this war. You die in this war. But you do get a free grave.

Will M-Day lead to housing shortages?

....Gradually, therefore, as the war continues, you will be living in a more and more deteriorated dwelling. This is our future when American is at war. Lowered wages. More deteriorated dwellings. Not allowed to move Where to about without permission. Told what to do. work. Dictatorship in the army. Dictatorship in the factory. Dictatorship in the streets and highways. All in the mame of fighting dictatorship!

Why does the government have to control men in industry in time of war?

Business and civilian life cannot go on as usual, even if the war is not fought on American soil.... The economic factor in warfare has displaced or at least equalled in importance the military factor.

. Modern war allows little time for parliamentary quibbling...., The war effort must be fast, complete, unreserved and frequently brutal—brutal in its effect on civilian as well as on the soldier.

Hitler did away with parliamentary quibbling in 1933. To fight Hitler says Cherne in diplomatic language, "we" must copy Hitler.

What are the chief labor problems that arise in connection with war?

President Roosevelt's recently appointed National Defense Advisory Committee is studying the following labor problems:

.... Measures to prevent workers' or employees' grievances from interfering with war production..

.....The necessity for modifying the legal work-day, with due regard both for national necessities and the welfare of labor.

.... Maintenance of maximum production in all war work, and the suspension during an actual emergency of any regulations which unreasonably limit production.

(Sidney Hillman, labor leader, is a member of this Commission. This traitor to labor will see to it that "workers' grievances" do not interfere with war production; that the workday is lengthened; that regulations limiting production are suspended. Unfortunately, nearly all the heads of the

nt take arow. M-Day to What steps ' control and regulate Tabor?

During the last war the right to strike was not fully recognized by law. Today the National Labor Relations

Act protects the right to strike. The government is already seriously concerned over the possibility that strikes might interfere with national defense. Some such administration as the War Labor Administration will therefore have to be formed for the control of labor in war.

.... The pressure of public opinion may be used to prevent strikes in essential industries.

....Compulsory arbitration of disputes after all means of conciliation and mediation have been exhausted may be required.

Control wages, lengthen hours. "Public opinion" and the law will prevent strikes, "Compulsory arbitration" will be clamped down on the labor movement. Cherne's question is "What steps will the government take AFTER M-Day to control and regular labor?" In this answer he errs again. These steps are being taken now, before M-Day.

How will labor disputes be settled after M-Day?

...compulsory arbitration may be invoked.

The government will encourage the activities of labor union because it can best supervise the labor problem through the unions.... machinery similar to that used in the railroad industry today will prevent strikes in war production, at any rate until a lengthy conciliation procedure has been exhausted.

A highly significant paragraph! Chene shows how the Railway Mediation Act functions against the interests of labor: by entangling and exhausting the workers in the lengthy and complex conciliation procedure. Labor should learn a lesson from this: that lengthy conciliation procedure is a deadly enemy of the trade union movement.

Even more significant is the fact that the government "will encourage the activities of labor unions." With men like Green, Lewis, Hillman, & Co. at the head of the unions, the government can more readily corral the unions into support of the war machine. Each day makes clearer the fact that corralling the workers into support of the war machine is the chief function of these labor fakers, who are beginning their service as recruiting sergeants before the war begins. The only leaders workers can trust are men who devote their lives to struggle against the war machine, the government, and against the labor lieutenants' of the bosses in labor's ranks.

Does M-Day do away with free speech, free press, freedom of the air, and civil liberties generally?

....there is no possibility after M-Day that peacetime liberties will be permitted to those who oppose the war or seriously hamper its conduct. Action will be taken against pacifists, foreign agents, fifth columnists, spies, saboteurs, and violent critics. If they seek to use the medium of the radio, the Federal Commun tion Commission will be able almost automatical' close the air lanes to them. The use of the wirestolar

It become inaccessible to those who oppose the cond.ct of the war. Moreover, the Post Office Department may deny or withdraw second-class mailing privileges, as it did during the First World War.

The Espionage Act, which was used effectively against political objectors during the First World War, is still on the statute books..

Finally, the Constitution itself provides that in time of war the right to obtain a writ of habeas corpus may be suspended. This, in effect, means that a person charged with a crime during war need not be brought to trial immediately, nor is there any prohibition against his being held incommunicado. In addition, it is possible to try prisoners in an Army tribunal by courtmartial rather than in a civil court.

If you oppose the war, if you wish to fight for the right to strike for a decent wage, if you merely want to live like a human being, not a slave-M-Day guarantees that this shall not be.

Try to agitate against the war! Radio is closed to you It's closed anyway. Newsprint is denied you. Postoffice mailing privileges are denied you. The Espionage Act is invoked to arrest you. The historic weapon against tyranny, the right ot Habeas Corpus, is suspended. Yon can b held incommunicado and tried in an Army tribunal by court-martial.

No wonder that Mr. Cherne said in his Round Table radio broadcast:

### All of these plans result in an end- temporary or permanent-to our democratic form of government.

Over the United States the shadow of totaliratian dictatorship is deepening. In 1776 merchant capitalism fought English tyranny to establish a new nation. Even before the French Revolution the United States gave birth to the ideals of capitalist democratic government.

In 1861 rising industrial capitalism fought a bloody war t crush the slave system and extend capitalist democracy.

And now in 1939 and 40 finance capital is preparing challenge Germany and Italy and Japan and even Rus if need be to determine who shall dominate the world. its plans call for a new kind of governmental system, ideals of the role of the state, of the relation of ma the state, of industry to the state. Beware of the machinations of the socialist pacifists who stick to their vain hopes of a peaceful and gradual development of mankind.

The defeat of fascism will not be achieved upon the war-maps of the High Command, nor through against you.

You will not pronounce yourselves in favor of their puppets whether they be fascists or democrats, republicans or royalists. You will not allow capitalism

to drag down in its death agony the whole of society.

Your decision must be to save mankind by raising victoriously the red flag of the World Proletarian Revolution.

This is the only way to crush German fascism.
