a word from the edit

he government and the papers keep going on about how there are almost a million NEETs (youth in no employment, education or training) but none of them are actually proposing that we're provided with any of these essentials. They are leaving us to rot on the scrapheap of no prospects. The government promised 150,000 jobs for young people but this would still leave at least 750,000 still without work and there's no evidence that they're fulfilling this promise because all we can see is yet more redundancies. By training they seem to be referring to the 'dole school' schemes where they pay private companies £100 a week per person to stick the unemployed in a room with not enough chairs or computers and tell them to work on their CVs. If they're so dedicated to education

then why are they selling off our schools to private companies in the form of academies and forcing through massive cuts in university funding?

It's all just spin - the government, the bosses and the media have no real solution to the capitalist crisis and the mass unemployment it's causing. The only thing they can think to do is to cut our education to pay for the billions they gave to the banks, cut our benefits when we don't attend their 'training' courses or aren't trying hard enough to find jobs (as if there are any jobs to be had) and use us as a cheap workforce so that the bosses can make some more profit. They're introducing workfare soon, which will mean that we're forced to work for our benefits and earn less than £2 an hour making money for the bosses.

We have to fight back. There are going to be strikes coming up in the post and the firefighters are balloting for action, already people are taking inspiration from the Vestas occupation and taking over buildings to stop cuts and closures. These sorts of actions can show us the way forward - we have to unionise, strike, protest and occupy. We need to stick together against the attacks and set up solidarity committees that can fundraise for strikes and occupations and spread them to other workplaces. We need to get down to Brighton for the Labour Party Conference and tell Gordon Brown that we're not going to pay for their crisis, that we are millions and they are few and if the capitalists can't run their own system then we'll replace it with ours with socialism.



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5 reasons why you should protest at the Labour Party Conference

1. Job cuts

Labour has done nothing for young people over their years in office as more and more of us were moved into low paid, temp jobs which offered few rights and no security. We're paying for this now the bosses are laying off workers to save money in the recession. Now, due to them spending billions on failing banks, they will cut thousands of jobs from the public sector too.

2. Imperialist war

From Afghanistan to Iraq, the Labour government has killed millions to secure oil and gas supplies in the Middle East and central Asia. Years of privatisation have taken their toll on our health service. Lots of our taxes were spent by hospitals and health trusts on dodgy investments that have now gone down the pan. Labour tried to balance cuts in public spending with increased private investment – but the recession means that private health companies don't want to invest any more. Now they want their money back. There's no such thing as a free lunch and Labour's plans for our healthcare in the year ahead could mean that many people in Britain pay the ultimate price. The tories could do even worse, but if they get in, it's Labour's fault.

Fight for jobs for youth

ithout talking in clichés here, although they are cliched for a reason, youth are the future. Yet the greedy capitalists seem indifferent to this. Youth unemployment is on the rise and there is a tumult of students seeking full time work to get into the UK job market for the very first time.

Many will be bitterly disappointed, and if something isn't done, lives will be ruined. Over the last few years, those of us lucky enough to enter work when the economy was supposedly good ended up working in temp jobs, on 'zero hours contracts' and in workplaces like call centres where trade unions are weak and the bosses can sack us with the blink of an eye.

These jobs were the first to go when the crisis hit, because we were the

most easy to sack. Now those of us leaving education to find work are battling against thousands of people our own age who have been kicked out of their jobs to avoid the dole queue. It's not right and it's not fair.

Official figures say that the jobless rate among 16 to 24-year-olds has soared to almost 20%, with more than 920,000 classed as unemployed. Imagine that, nearly one hundred thousand youths are unemployed, that's a mind-boggling number.

It's true when they say that behind every statistic is a human being. And to leave education to experience potentially years of unemployment straight off can screw up the life chances of a generation. Unemployment causes poverty, depression and a lack of confidence.

We have a choice though, to build our own confidence and fight the bosses' crisis. The key is to organise. We can demand real action to create jobs, instead of allowing them to shove us to one side like a broken Christmas toy.

- Organise and take action for local centres of the young unemployed at schools, colleges and abandoned workplaces. Use them to coordinate struggle.
- Occupy workplaces when we hear of
- redundancies. Demand reinstatement!
- For living rates of unemployment benefits.
- More schools, hospitals, and homes to pro-
- vide services and jobs. Pay for them by taxing the rich.

Hands off our education

he budget of 2009 brought a tremendous blow for key public services over the next few years, including education and the NHS.

Universities in particular will be hit as the government's plans mean that many courses will have reduced funding and staff will be made redundant. The Treasury figures show that spending on schools will increase by a mere

0.8% next year but DIUS (Department of Innovation, Universities and Skills) will have it's funding slashed by 2.4%!

Students and teachers up and down the country have called for protests and strikes in retaliation to the proposed cuts, feeling that it is unjust and contradictory in regards to the current UCL has climate. economic announced that it wants to cut it's



2009-2010 budget by £20million which is likely to lead to a loss of 200 to 400 jobs. Jon Richards, the UNISON Head of Higher Education pointed out; "Education is crucial to building a path out of the recession and is an investment in the future of our country".

The government however, feels that the cuts are justified because of the recesson, despite the obvious negative effects that they will bring. Teachers and Lecturers have rightly noted that the proposed cuts will mean a huge loss of support staff, and therefore the quality of teaching will be hindered, leaving the students with less to show after accumulating debts for a compromised education.

UNISON, Unite and UCU have organised protests and demonstrations to be held at college and university campuses and urge students and young people to get involved and protest against the cuts that will severely affect their education.

Success as BNP festival blockaded

n 15 August the British National Party planned to hold their annual racist gathering the Red. White and Blue festival, but thousands of militant anti-fascists had other plans.

The location of the festival was ideal for shutting it down too - a farm in a small Derbyshire village, with only three roads running into it. The plan of the anti fascists was to block the lane from both ends and stop any of the fascists getting past.

REVLOUTION had members in each of the blockades blocking the road as well as in the rally in the centre of town.

One carload of fascists thought it sensible to try to pass the blockade wearing shirts bearing the "Northants BNP" logo."

They soon realised this was a mistake as angry protesters surrounded the vehicle and physically forced it back. After turning away our first Nazis of the day the crowd, in the proud spirit of a century of international working class anti fascism, erupted into chants of "NO, NO, NO PASSARAN!" which translates from Spanish as "THEY WILL NOT PASS!"

As the day went on more and more fascists were turned away, including a

By John from Essex Meanwhile the southern blockade was holding strong but a larger and increasingly violent police force was taking its toll. Almost as soon as Revo members had joined the blockade, linked arms and formed a bigger roadblock of about 100 protesters, the police proceeded to tell us to move out of the way because the line of Nazi cars was growing bigger and bigger. The blockade was instructed by the UAF stewards to stand our ground. The police then sounded a warning saying that they were going to forcibly remove protesters from the public highway. After a few minutes, two walls of police closed in from opposite ends of the road.



The rally that had been taking place in the centre of Condor, the nearest small town, began to march to the north blockade. Now that we had successfully stopped the BNP members from going to the festival the plan was to march down the

road and to try and shut down when was left of the BNP festivel.

The local residents came out of meet houses to watch the demonstration and many clapped and cheered as we marched past.

But when we got within two hundred vards of the festival we were faced with a less friendly response; dozens of police vans, 6 mounted riot police and anything up to a hundred on foot. Two times protesters broke the police lines. and the police then became increasingly violent by grabbing, arresting and pushing people to the floor.

Eventually all the protesters met up and together marched victorious through Codnor. In total we must have number about 2,000 and the mood was very upbeat, with the demo chanting anti fascist slogans as we returned from successfully disrupting the BNP festival. By using No Platform tactics to block roads and physically stop the fascists meeting together, we ensured that the BNP couldn't organise and train their members for another year of fascist attacks on ethnic minorities and the working class.

Together we showed that working class people when not divided by race,

gender, nationality or sexuality can unite together and defeat the far right. With the BNP's electoral success they have become arrogant but after this protest and the successful action in Birmingham, the united working class has knocked them down a peg and shown them that the working class will not idly stand by The EDL claimed that it was a peaceful protest and the antifascists and watch fascism grow but will fight it wherever it may be. Hopefully these last counterprotest is a model for young people to follow when racists two weeks will send and fascists try to divide our communities and spread their hate. out a clear message to fascists that if you try and mobilise on our streets and in our communities then you will be driven out.

From occupations to workers' control

actories, offices, and other workplaces all across the world have been occupied these last few months in resistance to the recession. In Britain, workers at Visteon car component factories seized millions of pounds worth of equipment and wouldn't give it back until they got better redundancy pay. At Vestas wind turbine factory. workers occupied until the police forced them out. They demanded nationalisation to save jobs and save the environment. They inspired Thomas Cook travel agent staff to occupy offices in Ireland.

But South Korea has probably seen the top occupation so far. Thousands of workers fended off riot police with makeshift slingshots and crossbows to defend their jobs.

These occupations are an important weapon in the fight back against the recession - but

there is more to it than that.

When workers go in to occupation, they have to organise themselves. That means their food, the security, publicity, campaigning and communication. If workers can do all this, then why can't they take it to the next stage? And actually start to plan and organise their own work and own production without the management. This could form the basis for a new economy, based not upon unsustainable profit which causes recessions, environmental destruction and exploitation but based on production of what is needed to where it is needed.

It is for this reason that when workers go into occupation, we call for nationalisation under the control of the people that work there. In Argentina 2002, thousands of workers across the country started running their factories under workers' control - a slap in the face to all those today who claim that workplace democracy is not possible. This is what a socialist economy would look like, but democratically planned on both national and international levels. But it requires a revolution do it the capitalists' means of violence and repression, the police, the army and the courts are used to stop occupations and crush workers' control often before it really begins. That means that these bodies have to be destroyed for socialism to work.

The repression faced by occupying workers at Visteon and Vestas in Britain and on a larger scale at some factories in France and Korea shows that this remains very true today. But in the meantime we need more, larger occupations against job cuts and self-defense to protect ourselves. This should be a key goal for workers and youth suffering from the crisis in 2009.

Afghanistan: bring the troops home

A fter 8 years of occupation, costing ten thousand civilian lives and billions of pounds, the war in Afghanistan is losing support dayby-day. A majority of the public (62%) are now against the war. Since 2001, more than 200 UK soldiers have died in the conflict, taking over the total of 139 in the Iraq war.

The mainstream media is saturated with reports of poor provisions for the men and women sent out to die for the imperialistic dream, including blaming the recent death toll on a lack of army helicopters.

But the real reason for the high rate

of deaths and injuries is that the war is being lost. After 8 years of war to control the very lucrative gas route from Asia that Afghanistan sits on, organisations like the Taliban are growing as the promise of peace and democracy from Britain and the US turns out to be a lie. Now, the only option left for the imperialists is to send more troops. Army chiefs are predicting the war could last 40 years.

The first step to putting a decisive stop to this carnage is the pull the troops out now. In addition we need to win an argument that convinces the public, that the afghan insurgents are not "terrorists" as the UK and US governments call them, they are in fact freedom fighters, opposed to the occupation.

Only by doing this can, revolutionaries get a hearing from those forced to join fanatical groups like the Taliban as the only way to fight the occupiers. This allows socialists to put forward a left-wing analysis to challenge political Islam's grasp over the resistance struggle. We argue for a united socialist Afghanistan to rise up against occupation and oppression and for Afghanistan to be back in the hands of the Afghan people.
