THE CONSTITUTION

The Tories have no constitutional rights in the matter. First of all they are a MINORITY Government. Labour has majority of votes in the country and Labour is opposed to denationalisation.

Secondly, the Government was elected by a fraud. They promised the electors that they would not cut the social services, slash the food subsidies, or create unemployment. But they have done all these things since they came to office. They are a Government of unscrupulous defenders of the wealth and privileges of a small minority. They have no constitutional rights at all.

In resisting this economic vandalism, transport workers are acting in the best interests of the great majority of the people. They are therefore acting in accordance with the constitution.

We earnestly appeal, therefore, to the whole Labour Movement to stand by the transport workers in this fight. If the Tories see that we are serious, if they see that Labour is uniting the whole country against them, then they may pause and think again. But if there is any sign of weakness, if there is any attempt to blame the workers for a situation created solely by the Tory Government, then the resulting disunity in Labour's ranks can only encourage the Tories to stage a fight. Only the greatest solidarity behind the transport workers can force Mr. Churchill to capitulate. It can Churchill to capitulate. It can even force him to resign.



The Rajk Trial in Hungary and the Kostov Trial in Bulgaria followed much the same course, as did that of Xoxe, the Secretary of the Albanian Party (which is not a member of the Cominform): but for sheer brutality and the mendacity of the "confessions" extracted from the accused, the Prague Trial has not been equalled since the purges of the Soviet Communist Party in the thirties.

It is, moreover, interesting to notice that the accusations made against the victims of purges of the present bear a striking resemblance to those of twenty years ago. Then the people put up for trial were charged with "Trotsky-"nationalist deviationism, and "economic sabotage," always of course, as "counter-revolution aries" and "agents of the West".

Today the charges against the accused are of "plotting with Western imperialists for the restora-tion of capitalism and the downfall of the Socialist State," "economic sabotage," "Titoism" and "Zion-ism" (that is, nationalist devia-tionism), and "Trotskyism".

There will be the anachronism of people going into a subsidised house or flat and having to pay tax on furniture to put into that subsidised dwelling.

The workers engaged in the industry will have to face the consequences of cut-throat competition, short time and redund-ancy, for the timber content being reduced and the number of articles increased to meet the tax line, will throw hundreds, if not more, on

subject to the same treatment as furniture, as a result glass process-workers will be faced with short time and unemployment.

Finally, removal of control on the retailers profits from 33½ per cent as at present to anything they would like to make, will have serious consequences. It is not generally known that the retailers, especially the large concerns, exercise an iron grip on our trade.

HOUSING: Homeless Amid Plenty is a Scandal

'Ration all Room Space' says TOM BRADDOCK

S Socialists we are aware that the Building Industry must be reorganised as a Public Service before the huge programme required to bring our housing and factories into an up-to-date condition, either by complete re-building or reequipment, can be properly

However, right here and now the most deplorable housing conditions exist; long waiting lists, overcrowding, slum properties and condemned houses still occupied. An understanding of the actual accommodation available will show a way out. The preliminary information supplied by the census of 1951 gives us the particulars re-

By the application of a short term emergency policy we can rid our country of the worst of

The total population of England and Wales is 43,745,000. Based on information supplied by the 1 per cent. sample taken, we have in existence to accommodate this population a total of about 56,708,100 rooms, including kitchens (but not sculleries and bathrooms). This gives us practically $1\frac{1}{3}$ rooms for each man, woman, child or infant in arms.

Disregarding infants and children under five years of age, we get $1\frac{1}{2}$ rooms for every person aged five and over, i.e., about 40,000,000 persons. These are divided into about 13,000,000 house-itolds or families.

If we disregard kitchens and all single room dwellings, we reduce the number of rooms available to about 43,708,100. If we again deduct further 3\frac{3}{4} million rooms as being in slum or condemned dwellings, we get a round figure of about 40,000,000 rooms, that is, one per person (disregarding children under five years who can.

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without serious overcrowding, be accommodated in rooms with their parents or guardians).

These figures make it quite clear that there is, as well as overcrowding at one end of the scale, a serious condition of under-occupation at the other. If the accommodation could be shared out we could give shelter, under reasonable conditions, to the whole of our population without any overcrowding or any lack of accommodation such as we are experiencing under the present system (or lack of system)

FAIR SHARES

As it will be impossible under present, or indeed any, building arrangements to abolish our waiting lists and slums in less than twenty years or more, it seems obvious that our duty is to apply fair shares of accommodation already here to hand.

In fact, it would seem that we are wasting labour and materials in building houses and blocks of flats that are not urgently necessary. Our immediate need is not to provide expensive houses for those who can afford high building prices or high rents, but to put the under-privileged so far as liv-ing accommodation is concerned into decent and sanitary dwelling places.

Remember, we have assumed the evacuation of slum and con-demned property. This would be demned property. This would be completely demolished so soon as its occupants were properly accommodated. Also we have taken no account of kitchens or oneroom dwellings.

APPALLING CONDITIONS

There is a further and almost as important, matter that we must The census returns show an appalling condition of under-equipment. Today—

- 17 households in every 100 have
- no piped water supplies. have no cooking stoves.
- 13 have no kitchen sinks.
- 21 have no water closets. 45 have no fixed baths.

These shortages could and would have to be overcome in placing our people in adequate accommodation. How much labour and material would it entail?

The above percentage figures, translated into actual units of equipment, show that just under 13 million of one type or the other will have to be fitted. A fair estimate of the cost of the equipment and such building costs as might be required to instal same, in separate apartments where necessary, would be an average of £30 each, a total cost for the 13 million units of, say, £400

sidering Municipal Policy in pre-paration for the Local Elections next May. Housing and Rents are without doubt the biggest and most explosive problems. The workers are rightly fed up with words and promises—they want action.

That is why Tom Braddock's plan for solving our immediate housing difficulties is worthy of the most serious attention in the Fundamentally, he movement. points out, housing is not a technical question it is a political ques-To put everyone into decent housing accommodation requires (at most) only £400,000,000 . . . plus a Government that is not afraid to attack the class privileges enjoyed by that group of people who at present occupy TOO MUCH space. The job could be completed in less than four years.

This is the first of a series of articles which Tom Braddock is writing for the "Outlook" and, in response to many requests, we shall give as much space as possible in future issues to the Housing question from all its many aspects. We invite Labour Parties and members to send in their views for publication.

When we realise that a year's job of building, say, 150,000 new houses costs in the neighbourhood quickly, if given the opportunity, we could solve our immediate housing problems.

It is only one year's work for our present house builders if it could be tackled all at once. It could not, but as the main struc-tures, in which we are to place this equipment do exist, a period of four years is ample time to

UNRELIABLE EVIDENCE

It must be remembered that the great majority of our people would not be disturbed. Over-crowded houses would be relieved of their excess occupants, those remaining would not be disturbed in any way. Generally speaking only those who are either over-crowded or who are occupying more rooms per head than they need would be disturbed.

These are of course those people who can be generally described as "better class" for want of a more accurate term. They will not like the prospect of their houses being divided into separate habitations each fitted with sinks, W.Cs., bathrooms, etc., for the occupation of other families. They are going to tell us the old stories about how

how they will rush back to the slums as soon as possible.

This is just bunk, Comrade. The job has got to be done and if these "class" people want to avoid having strange families close to them, they had better start closing up with their own sort, altering their houses and getting their class friends in with them. This will leave the rest of their houses vacant ready for re-equipment for full use by the present over-crowded families and families without accommodation at all.


To sum up: Here is a policy which will solve within four years our immediate housing difficulties. By our present methods, taking into consideration the losses through the decay of existing ac-commodation, it will take a generation or more to accommodate those on our waiting lists, let alone hose in slums and condemned

A short term emergency policy s therefore called for and here We can put everybody into reasonable living accommodation in about four years. We can do this by making use of what we have; that is the way out, use what we have got now.

What are the objections? They are fairly obvious and are generally covered by the resentment felt by those already living under comfortable conditions at the possi bility of some disturbance in order that all shall be able to enjoy a reasonable standard of comfort.

If however the protestations made by the leaders of all the political parties are real and not examples of callous humbug and hypocrisy we cannot allow, having seen a way out, great num-

According to the "Times" the "National Federation of Property Owners which is now organising a rent petition on behalf of private pro-perty owners has drawn some encouragement from the L.C.C. announcement."

In other words, the L.C.C. has encouraged all those who are demanding an interference with the present Rents Restriction Acts.

WO-THIRDS of the population would be affected by any changes in the Rent any changes in the Rent Restriction Acts. In 1920 an increase of 40 per cent. was allowed to the landlords—15 per cent. for "fair return" (profit) and 25 per cent. for repairs. Now they are asking for a further 50 per cent. increase for "repairs".
