When the life of a simple Japanese fisherman, Aikichi Kuboyama, flickered out on the night of Sept. 23, the whole world asked: Are we doomed? The death of this obscure worker from radiation sickness, caused by a U.S. Hydrogen bomb test explosion last March 1, has given tragic proof of the incalculable deadliness of the H-bomb.

Aikichi Kuboyama was one of 23 members of a fishing-boat crew who, as the daily press put it, were "dusted" with radioactive ash from an H-bomb set off more than 80 miles away. The word "dusted" gives an impression of a substance no more harmful than talcum powder. But bombs that can kill 80 miles from the blast point can wipe out the human race.

Japan has been "plunged into almost hysterical mourning" over the death of the 40-year-old fisherman "who has become the nation's symbol of hatred and fears of atomic weapons," reports the Associated Press. But that mourning should not be



confined to the Japanese. The American people, too, and more than all others, should grieve for what this symbolizes to this country ,to its 162,000,000 people and, first of all, to the tens of millions in the area of New York City and several hundred miles around it.

Bit by bit, we have learned of the true nature of the H-

bomb set off last March. I read with chills in the N.Y. Herald-Tribune of Sept. 27 the report of the Alsop brothers that an H-bomb of the March 1. type "will destroy a circular area of 300 square miles by fire and blast. But it will probably expose an area of 6,000 square miles to lethal radiation." That means a curtain of death dropped over an area covering all of New York City, Newark, Jersey City, Hoboken and as far south as Philadelphia. Just 100 such bombs could wipe out the United States. But the merchants of death have not stopped there. n H-bomb with three times explosive power of the March 1 device has been perfected. A condensed version of "The Hydrogen Bomb," by James R. Shepley and Clay Blair, Jr., which appears in the Sept. 24 U.S. News and World Report, reveals that it had been planned to follow the March 1 blast with "a super-giant of all atomic bombs." But "new calculations pushed the giant bomb near the practicable limit of thermonucear weapons, 45 megatons, 2,-400 times the force of Hiroshima." The risk to the U.S. bases and ships was so great that explosion of the new bomb 'was postponed for a later test n a greater expanse of the Pacific Postponed - not abandoned! he madmen of Wall Street and Washington appear determined to go through with their incredbly risky tests that have already saturated the world's atmosphere with immense amounts the decayed profit system, sooner or later to hurl the bomb and involve us in a war of complete obliteration. Solidarity **Of Labor** Is Decisive

DETROIT, Sept. 30 - The 108-day attempt of the Square D Company to smash Local 957 of the United Electrical Workers ended in defeat for the company today.

Although the 1,200 workers who had been on strike since the middle of June were forced to make heavy concessions they saved their union.

This was the feeling uppermost in the minds of the Square D workers when they voted today to accept an agreement negotiated with the company in the past week,

(A full analysis of the new contract will appear next week in the Militant.)

The setback to the company's union-smashing plan, which had been followed with avid interest by Big Business from 'coast to coast, was made possible by the intervention of rank-and-file unonists in the struggle. When Detroit's police were mobilized to run strikebreakers through the line and to club pickets, militants from plants in the area rallied to the aid of the strikers.

This was followed by a declaration of solidarity from 13 officials of local United Automobile Workers unions. They joined the pickets together with Flying Squadrons. Mayhew pointed to the profits that rent-gouging landlords make in the slums. In Chicago, he said, an average of 27,000 people live in a square mile; but in the Southside Negro area there are 55,000 people per square mile - double the city average.
