## McCarthy Gets Last Minute Bid **From GOP Staff**

By George Breitman SWP Candidate for U.S. Senate from N.J. McCarthy is getting set to again take the center of

the national political stage.

On Oct. 29, the U.S. News and World Report revealed that "Senator Joseph McCarthy received last minute overtures from some officials high in the Eisenhower Administration, asking him to campaign actively for the Republican candidates."

As I warned on Oct. 4, neither the unanimous recommendation of the Watkins Committee to censure McCarthy, nor the decision of the Republican high command to keep him under wraps during the campaign, meant the end of McCarthyism. I said that while McCarthy might have suffered tactical setbacks, the fascist movement he heads is still a profound threat to the American working class.

It is true that McCarthy did not try to play an open and prominent role in the elections. But during the campaign the fascist threat grew in a different way.

A major McCarthyite gain was scored when racist violence to keep Negro school children segregated in Jim Crow schools was organized by the mis-named National Association for the Advancement of White People. At the same time the Ku Klux Klan began burning its crosses. In McCarthy the Klan finds a natural leader in the national political arena.

HEMINGWAY, ZOLA AND FAULKNER were among the authors banned from the racks of drugstores in Utica, N.Y., by a self-appointed committee of "thought-supervisors" headed by Louis Ritz, president of the Mohawk Valley Pharmacists Association. The Associated Press

report, Oct. 23, revealed that "a list of 530" verboten books and periodicals were distributed to the storekeepers, Ritz said the list was prepared by the Chicago Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women.

A "SCABS WANTED" AD appeared in the Cleveland Press, Oct. 12, under the heading: "Permanent Employment as replacements in a Labor Dispute." The ad was taken by the Patterson-Sargent Co. after a 16-week strike by 250 workers belonging to the CIO Gas, Coke and Chemical Workers' Union. On Oct. 15 the Cleveland Press reported the strike broken. "The union surrendered to a company ultimatum to employees to return to work by today or be replaced permanently with new employees. . . . The strike was called off although it was made clear by the company to the union that the company would not rehire eight employees, including the union committee, because they had participated, the company said, in 'unlawful strike activities' . . . It was the second time this year that an employer here has broken a strike by using against the union the threat of a provision of the Taft-Hartley Act."

A COMMUNIST PARTY appeal against the order of the Subversive Control Board that it must register as a "foreign agency" was heard by a Federal Court, Oct. 21. The legal arguments hinged on the constitutionality of the McCarran Act of 1950. The lawyers for the CP also attacked the constitutionality of the Communist Control Act of 1954, the Democratic liberal-sponsored Act which incorporated the union-busting Butler bill with the notorious outlaw provision. Government attorneys tried to dodge a test on the constitutionality of the 1954 Act. The N.Y. Times, Oct. 22, reports that

#### "Foreign Agent 783" 1.

On Oct. 13, as reported previously in the Militant, U.S. Attorney Leo A. Rover attacked Federal Judge Luther W. Youngdahl as having a "fixed personal bias and prejudice in favor" of Owen Lattimore, whom Rover seeks to send to prison on grounds of alleged "perjury" about associations with the Communist Party. Rover demanded that Youngdahl, the presiding jurist in the case, "disqualify" himself.

This raw attempt to strong-arm the conservative Republican judge and thus clear the way in a third attempt to railroad Lattimore to jail was answered by Youngdahl Oct. 23. The judge declared that Rover's statement was "so patently and grossly insufficient that I cannot escape the conclusion that the purpose of the affidavit is to discredit, in the public mind, the final action of the courts, or to intimidate the courts themselves."

The judge dismissed Rover's affidavit as "scandalous." "At bottom," he said, "the affidavit is based upon the virulent notion that a United States judge who honors and adheres to the sacred Constitutional presumption that a man is innocent until his guilt is established by due process of law has 'a bent of mind' that disables him from conducting the fair and impartial trial to which both the accused and the Government are entitled." The timing of the new attempt to hustle Prof. Lattimore to prison fits perfectly with the GOP need to smear former Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney who appears to be running ahead in the Senatorial campaign in Wyoming. O'Mahoney happens to be one of Lattimore's attorneys.

Outside of Wyoming, where the McCarthyite wing of the Republican Party is making sinister use of the renewed persecution of Owen Lattimore, the capitalist press has paid little attention editorially to the case.

Abroad, the case has been given a different reception. The reaction of the Manchester Guardian Weekly may be taken as typical. This liberal journal calls the action of the Justice Department against Lattimore "a scandalous vendetta." (Oct. 21.) It reveals the shocking fact that "Publishers in Britain have been approached by the police, at the request of the Ameri-

With only a few buses running during recent London bus strike, crowds struggled to get aboard some of the vehicles still in operation. Although bus strike ended, the walkout of dockworkers and ship repair workers in London continued and spread to other ports. (See story page 1).

#### McCarthyism to the Rescue 3.

Early in the election campaign the Republicans said they did not want to make McCarthyism an issue. But as the straw votes began to indicate chances of a Democratic victory, the GOP high command changed its mind—if it had not made up its mind from the beginning and was simply calculating the best timing for a major witch-hunt play.

The frame-up and smear of Lattimore in order to try to defeat O'Mahoney in Wyoming is the outstanding instance of the GOP use of the McCarthy smear technique. But it is not the only one.

On Oct. 11, Civil Service Commissioner Philip Young announced that 6,926 "security risks" had been dismissed or allowed to resign from government jobs. The implication was that the 6,926 were communist "spies" or close to communist spies or "soft" on communist spies. Naturally, responsibility for placing and leaving these "spies" on the government payroll was loaded on the Democrats, which is a kind of poetic justice for their having started the witch-hunt.

On Oct. 20 the FBI tried to whip up another communist "spy" scare by arresting 10 Puerto Rican members of the Communist Party on charges of allegedly "conspiring to teach and advocate" the violent overthrow of the U.S. Government.

He staged his big drama in Cleveland on the eve of the election to focus newspaper, radio and television headlines and cameras on "labor racketteering" and its alleged tie-up with the local Democratic administration.

Bender staged his show with all the modern "know-how" of the smart publicity agents who will write anything for a price. Advance releases built up suspense. "Bombings" would be investigated. Surprise witnesses with sensational testimony were promised.

Since Cleveland is becoming noted for the number of bombings of Negro homes, of the Towne Casino with its mixed patronage, and a colored Congregational church site, it was generally felt that Bender was "playing with dynamite" by looking into bombings.

But if anyone had any illusion that the Congressman was really interested in doing anything other than smearing his opposition and discrediting the labor movement, the illusion was dispelled when the scheduled political explosion went pft instead of boom!

First of all, the investigation didn't touch the anti-Negro bombings, all of which remain unpunished to this day. The only aspect of the hearings that interested the large Negro community at all was the use of a discredited criminal inmate of the Warrensville workhouse, who happens to be colored, as a star witness. This character, by methods which were not revealed, was induced to testify to a long string of crimes of violence, none of which involved the anti-Negro bombings.

The second thing that made the drama turn into a farce was that the charges and testimony exposed not labor racketeering, but the jungle code and practices of capitalist building con-
