

DEBS HEROIC

STAND ON WAR Debs Conquered Prisons and Jailers

Debs' conviction under the war espionage act came as the result of a speech be made at Canton, O., in 1914, in which he attacked the government's part in the war and assailed the terms of the selective service act under which the American army was being raised. He was found guilty in September, 1914. of trying to obstruct the draft and was sentenced by Federal Judge David C. Westenhaver to 10 years in the Moundville, W. Va., penitentiary. Debs made no effort to prevent the imposition of the penalty. John Brown of Ossawatomie, was his favorite exampler. He offered no evidence in his own defense and made his own address to the jury. an address characteristic of his style, just a clear statement of the facts as he upheld them. To the jury he said:

I have no dispute with the evidence presented by the government, no criticism of the counsel for the prosecution. I would not take back a word of what I believe right to save myself from the penitentiary. I am accused of crime. but I look the court in the face, I look the world in the face, for in my beart no accusation of wrong lesters.

"Gentleman, I have been accused of obstructing was. I admit it, gentlemen. I abbor war. I would oppose war if I stood alone."

Although Debs imprisonment was slowly killing him, although his advanced years combined with the heart trouble which finally ended his life. were bound to kill him in prison in a few years. Debs made no effort to regoin his liberty. He would not ask for a pardon. He would not bend or sicial an inch on matters of principle. He was ready to serve his full term, although it meant his certain death, rather than weaken or compromise in the least. He was an unimwest, courageous warrior in the battle for truth, justice and bumanity, without a peer in his gener-

His release from Atlanta came purely from the efforts of his fellow Security and friends, and was granted in spite of his proud deciaration that he had not changed his views and would not promise to curb his speech or actions in the future.

He had been a friend of every friendable wrecks he could and helped them in their misery. He never broke a prison rule. He transformed a dangerous, refractory negro "lifer" into an exemplary prisoner. There were other instances of his power to better his follow-inmates and these were the man who cheered Eugene Debs as he left

Debs was not forgotten by those who were his fellow prisoners in Atlanta, who still remember the kindly, Christlike character who exercised such a great influence over them. Among the messages received by the Debs family was one from Sam Moore, Negro "lifer." Sam Moore, it will be recalled, was wor from sullen hatred and rebellion and the horrors of solitary confinement by Debs love and under Debs influence showed such remarkable improvement that he became a trusty. From the time Delis left Atlanta until he died Sini Moore and Debs had kept up a correspondence.
