Preparedness Spells Disaster for Labor; Fight It With All the Power that You Possess

WRITTEN ESPECIALLY FOR THIS ISSUE. HAT are the chief advocates of preparedness preparing to do?

In one breath they tell us how they hate militarism in Europe, and in the next breath, how we must be made to like it here in the United States; that militarism has proven a curse to the Europeans. and that, therefore, we must rush into the

curse to be saved. A number of schemes for saving us have been proposed; the administration thinks it knows how, but Morgan's Navy League says it has a better plan, and the general staff of the army thinks that an army of 1,500,000 would do the trick. Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania, in a speech in San Francisco a few days ago, said he wanted not only a large army, but as many dreadnaughts as there are States. Ex-President Taft wants a navy equal to that of Germany, with adequate submarines and air-craft thrown in for good measure, and a regular army of about 500,000 men; while President Roosevelt wants all that anyone wants and then

AT THE BEGINNING of this clamor for preparedness, we were told it was for de-fense against invasion, and now we are told it is not only for defense against invasion, but defense for our possessions—the open door for American products; that the Stars and Stripes must be upheld wherever and whenever occasion demands, etc.

I repeat, what are the capitalists preparing to do? Do they intend to take advantage of the weakness of our European neighbors after the war? Or do they intend to be in a position to dictate, if possible. the policy under which the European nations shall conduct their affairs, or who shall have the world's markets? Do they fear that the Europeans may decide to continue the present policy of socialized industry? Our neighbors might decide that since the socializing of industry worked so successfully in times of war, that it would work still better in times of peace. Such arrangements would sound the death-knell of capitalism and the American capitalist surely wants "preparedness" to protect not only his own hide, but that of his capitalist brother of Europe. Or, do they fear the rumblings of discontent from the inside? Is it possible that they fear the collapse of capitalism unless the workers are forced into utter subjection? Or have the shrieks and groans of their starving, wounded and murdered victims of Ludlow, Calumet, Lawrence and every other industrial hell, caused them to tremble for their own safety? Do they fear an industrial crisis after the war, when the inflated stocks, that are now soaring skyward, will drop with a crash, carrying with them starvation, misery and death for the workers? Is it to meet such a situation that they want to prepare? Or, do they fear that some nation may call them to account for the part they are now playing so profitably, of supplying some of the warring nations with munitions of war?

Not being in personal touch with the Morgan and Rockefeller groups, I cannot say just what their plans are; but I do know, personally, some of the people who are clamoring for "preparedness" and have a fair knowledge of the history of those with whom I am not personally acquainted, and I know that their patriotism fairly reeks with the smell of profits; that they would no more shoulder a gun and fight for their country than would the devil bathe in holy water. Therefore, knowing these parasites, I know that they have some hellish scheme on foot that spells disaster for the working class.

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT, in a speech delivered before the National Security League of Chicago, in try-

ing to justify his position for "preparedness," first attempted to shield the broadclothed pirates who stole most of the money Uncle Sam spent in the past for "preparedness." He said the legislators were not to blame for the "pork-barrel" graft and put the blame on the selfishness of the lawmakers' constituents. In other words, he blames those who are robbed for being robbed, because they are selfish. Now, Mr. Taft is one of the little-big men whom I have met, once in Connecticut and about six months ago, when he came to the capitol of Pennsylvania to tell us lawmakers how to do things, and therefore I am not in the least surprised at his deductions of graft.

He further said that, while he did not defend graft, it is a part of the price we must pay for the experiment of popular government. "God knows" I am not even surprised at him saying this, because it may be part of their plan of "preparedness" to disfranchise us and give us a monarchy.

Some time ago the war promoters invaded my home city, Reading, Pa., and a new organization, called "Preparedness for Defense," was born. A committee was appointed to arrange a mass meeting. One of the largest theaters in the city was engaged and provision made to secure two smaller ones on short notice, to take care of the overflow. Two Congressmen, an ex-Congressman and a brass band were engaged to arouse the patriotic spirit of the people. I went early to avoid the rush, but there was no rush, no overflow, not even enough to fill the lower floor seats. The speakers orated for two hours, and in substance said:

"We need a larger army and navy to protect our possessions. We demand the open door for American products. We must protect the power that will come our way after the European war, against the combined powers. We must get into the struggle

DOES THIS SOUND like preparedness against invasion, or like preparedness for aggression?

"But," said one of the speakers. Congressman Crago, "preparedness does not only mean billions for supply, but men who know how to use the supplies. Guns are all right if you have men to carry them, but are of no use if you do not have. We must therefore teach the young to be patriotic, to love and revere the colors, so that they will, unhesitatingly, shoulder the gun and follow the flag when called to do so."

He took care to say "so that THEY will carry the gun"; not "WE." I feel quite safe in saying that not one of the speakers or any of those actively interested in the meeting would shoulder a gun and follow the flag.

And, as to our possessions which need protection. At the time when the jingo press was clamoring for Mexican intervention I was approached by one of the street characters about town. The fellow was selling shoe strings for a living. He said, "Jim, things look pretty bad in Mexico, and I think it is time we go down there and settle things." I asked him in what way the situation in Mexico concerned him. He looked at me in surprise and said. "Why. we must protect our interests there." Now. here was a poor creature who did not possess the priceof a burial lot, talking about protecting his interests in Mexico. This fellow has the kind of a psychologically developed brain that Crago and the rest of his kind want for all the workers. I say if there are possessions which need protection, let those who possess them protect them.

Looking at the question of preparedness from its different angles, as presented by its advocates, and comparing them with our international relations and the industrial situation in the United States. my conclusions are that the capitalists are using the slogan of invasion as a cloak to hide their real purpose. When the European powers were prepared for war, no one feared invasion. Now, when the European nations are torn to pieces and loaded down with debts running into many billions, its fighting population reduced by many millions and its citizens, in a great measure, reduced to women, children and cripples, we are told that there is danger of invas a. "But," say the skeptical, "what you possess.

about Japan?" The population of the United States is again as large as that of Japan; our navy appropriations are three times as large as those of Japan, and our army appropriations again as large. Besides, the only people who are talking about Japanese invasion are the war promoters of America and their jingo press.

IN MY MIND, preparedness means one of two things, or both: The American capitalists want to be in a position to dictate the commercial policy of the world; in other words, take advantage of the European nations now torn to pieces. On the other hand, the end of the war will work great changes in the industrial conditions here in the United States, and the capitalists want to be prcpared to meet them.

The other day five men, representing fourteen billions of dollars, met in the Hotel Astor, New York City, to devise ways and means for the American industries to cope with what they termed "chaotic labor conditions" which they believed would prevail after the war. These men deployed labor's activity in politics and looked with dread upon the possibility of an amalgamation of the five railway brotherhoods. President Baer characterized the amalgamation as the most daring and gigantic thing ever attempted, pointing out how such an amalgamation might paralyze railway traffic and cause bankruptcy, or, at least, a great raise in railroad rates. To be sure, these gentlemen know why they want "preparedness."

Some people believe that, when the war ends, all those able to do so will come to America to escape the heavy taxes which the present war will make necessary. If so, a large army may be necessary to teach us how to starve without grumbling. On the other hand, it is possible that the reconstruction necessary in Europe will create such a demand for labor that the workers will prefer staying there. This in time would mean a scarcity of labor here, and the law of supply and demand in the labor market would then begin to operate, for once, the other way, and this would mean higher wages and a higher standard of living for the workers and

Therefore a well-disciplined soldiery, in control of the masters, would prove a mighty handy weapon to keep the wages of the workers down and profits up. Preparedness, to me, spells disaster for the working class. Therefore fight it with all the power

reduced profits for the shirkers.

If this becomes a military despotism, you Congressmen who vote for it will be guilty both of treason and of the blood of the thousands who will be slaughtered because of it.

If this nation becomes a military state it will not be at demand of the people, but solely to satisfy the treacherous looters of America-Morgan and his crew-who, if justice prevailed, would have been hung a year ago for treason.

N THE MIDST of the most frightful and fateful war the world has ever seen, and as a citizen of the only great civilized nation at peace today, the first Socialist to be elected to Congress sends his greeting to

In spite of machine guns, submarines and aeroplanes — the dominant factors making history today are economic in character. They are a part of the great capitalist transition taking place in the world.

ENGLAND, the country which first developed modern capitalism, defeated Spain in the 16th century, and Holland in the 17th century, and later on France in the 19th century. And now Great Britain is trying to crush the competition of Germany. It is idle to blame any man or any set of men in England so long as we still have capital-

Neither is Germany at fault, however. Germany has developed economically far enough to compete in the world's market. It is one of the world's great powers and is

"rightfully seeking its place in the sun."
We still live in a capitalist era. But capitalism has evidently not quite overcome even become fully international. It is in the main international only as far as the close connection between British and American capitalists is concerned.

WHILE SOCIALISM is international, Socialism cannot become anti-national if Socialism is to fulfill its mission. In reality it never can become anti-national.

Therefore we cannot very well blame the Socialist parties of the various European nations for standing with the rest of their people in this world crisis. And least of all can we blame any Socialists for defending their homes and their wives and children whenever and wherever they were face to face with an invasion from countries that have barbaric military organizations or tribesmen as soldiers, as, for instance, Cossacks, Turkos, Sikhs, etc.

WE ALL HOPE that the time will come when all wars will be impossible. We all fight for a world that will be guided by brotherhood, good will and Socialism. Our Socialist Party will be one great force to bring about such a development.

Until such a day arrives, however—the day when philosophy and philosophers shall rule the world—hunger and love will continue to rule it. In other words, we must take care of the immediate interest of the population, and especially of the proletariat in the various countries, including our own. That is work which must be done every day and from day to day. And it is Socialist work of paramount importance.

Best wishes to our Socialist Congressman. And may economic science, Socialist brotherhood and practical wisdom guide him.


MEYER LONDON IN CONGRESS


