Who Wants Big Armaments,

The gospel of our awakening military "patriotism" would be amusing, if it were not so serious and dangerous. "The appeal to national vanity and aggressive combativeness the appeal to the animal instincts in men is always dangerous, but it is particularly so in these times of universal war-madness. (Applause.) The propaganda for increased armaments at this time is pregnant with gravest menace to the well-being and security of the nation, particularly because it is likely to be promoted and intensified by sordid economic interests. I refer to the socalled "armor ring," which has reaped the prime and only benefit from the billions this nation has exded for armaments, and whose business interests are best served by war scares, war preparations and actual wars. Mr. Gardner has told you about the Carnegie Peace Fund of \$10,000,000, with an annual income of well-nigh half-a-million dollars, all used for anti-war propaganda. But he has failed to mention the millions expended by the international trust for pro-war propaganda. (Very hearty applause.) I do not charge that the present militaristic agitation has been instigated by the patriotic gentlemen engaged in the manufacture of armor plate, arms, and munitions, but I do say that these gentlemen have been known in the past to work up war sentiments in their own countries and in foreign countries, and to make millions from the sale at extortionate prices of armor plate, and rotten armor plate at that, for the defense of their beloved countries, as well as battleships and guns which are expected to be di-

niciously patriotic in matters military. in matters military.

Strenuous preparation "against war" means not only invitation of war, it means the brutalization of the country. A military power is a despotic power and training for war has a most demoralizing effect on the youth of the country. You may say all you want about the ennobling of military discipline and the 'martial spirit," but it is a matter of common and notorious knowledge that the barracks of professional soldiers reek with brutality, vice and degeneracy. (Hearty applause.)

Let Us Count the Cost.

But this is not all. There is an other side to military propared about which Mr. Gardser des den strangely silent. He has told us the pathetic story of our lame aeroplanes, our floating submarines, our gunless forts and empty guns, our obsolete ships and lonely troops, but he has not shown you the reverse side of the medal—the tremendous cost of that crippled establishment. The fact is that we already expend on our military and naval forces larger sums than any other country in the world. In 1913 we paid for our army more than \$165,000,000, for our navy almost \$141,000,000, and for military pensions upward of \$172,000,000, a total of almost half a billion dollars for wars, past and prospective, not including the cost of the state militia. In the same year Great Britain and Russia each expended for similar purposes less than \$450,000,000 and militaristic Germany less than \$300,000,000. It costs Germany to keep a soldier in the field \$183 per year. It costs us

I know what some of their plans are. When Villa made a raid into New Mexico he was paid by American gold to do it for American capitalists. ers of the World, Unite!"" Count me for Labor First. This country is not "our" country. Then why should the tollers love it or fight for it? Why sanction the title deeds of our masters in the blood of our fellow-slaves? Let those who own the country, who are howling for and profiting by preparedness, fight to defend their property.

I despise the rule of Rockefeller and Morgan as much as that of King or Kaiser, and am as outraged by Ludlow and Calumet as by Belgium. Joe Hill was as cruelly martyred as Edith Cavell, and I cannot work myself into a frenzy of patriotism wherever a contraband ship is sunk and we lose a few prominent citizens.

Congress to take two years for the increase of the regular army. Would they delay thus if they felt that there were a grave crisis at hand? As a matter of fact, Mr. Wilson, barring political reasons, could perfectly well have repeated at the Manhattan Club the appeal of his message of a year ago—that the country keep calm and beware of changing the United States into an armed camp.

That men as sensible as President Wilson and Mr. Garrison have yieided to the latest argument of the militarists that at the close of the war we shall become the objective of robber-raids by Germany and Great Britain, because we shall be the only really prosperous nation, with large supplies of cash, is not to be believed. Munchausen never invented a more absurd fairy-

But when all the details are discussed and when all the matters of military policy have been settled one way or the other, the great question still remains: Should the United States, in the fevered disquiet of a world-crisis, alter the policy of its national life, and go in for large armaments? It cannot be successfully averred that what Mr. Wilson proposes is merely an enlargement of the old policy. As Mr. Bryan has correctly pointed out, it is a complete break certainly so far as the army is concerned, in that thus far the army has been regarded as a national police and not as a body to prepare for invasion or war abroad. For more than a century the country has been unarmed and has never had a foreign war save of its own seeking. Even in the days when it was weakest, no one assailed it. Only since the days when we began to have a large navy have the rumors of war and the talk and gossip of war been abroad in the land to unsettle the public and to form the basis of militaristic appeals to Americans slavishly to imitate the military follies of the old world, to join the international alliances of the militarists who everywhere coin money out of the fears of the professional soldiers and keep the masses of the people in subjection by means of their armed fellows who are primarily instructed that they must kill their own relatives if,

What has been the pride of America-that we were free from a large professional soldiery, that the military and naval votes of our Congress could not, until recently at least, be used as the basis for increasing the burdens of militarism abroad and clamping still heavier loads upon the hard working peasantry, who, in the end, carry the soldiers on their backs - all this is now to be put aside without deliberation, without even the assurance that if the sacrifice is made the end sought will be achieved, and without, of course, waiting to put the issue squarely before the whole people a year hence. Is it any wonder that the President's words had but a half-hearted ring, or that foreign observers consider us the most volatile of people?

Light-Hearted Draught of Poison

It is, of course, partly due to the supreme self-confidence we have in ourselves, for which we are often criticised. Those who with clean hands urge that we take far-reach ing steps towards navalism and militarism believe, light-heartedly, that there is such a thing as a reasonable preparedness which would satisfy our generals and admirals. They, witnessing Germany's spiritual, moral, and now economic undoing through the poison of militarism believe that we, too, can use the hypodermic syringe and escape the habit, indulge mildly in the drug, and profit only by its virtues, avoid ing all its evil effects. That no one else has escaped the poison-not even democratic France-seems to count not at all in this hour, though every generation of Americans has thought differently until this day.

We are sure that with great armament works springing up about us like mushrooms over night, we shall escape the armament scandals of Europe, those due to international concerns like the Harvey United Steel Company, composed of British German, American, French, and Italian companies, all of them engaged in booming the market for armor plates in their respective countries on the plea that each country needed to defend itself against the other. or the scandal of the Krupps, whose cannon and ammunition are now being used against Germany and the Germans that made them. But we, being satisfied with our experiences with the patriotic unselfishness of our trusts and our protected manufacturers, take no fear from the enormous transformation of peaceful American industries into those that make the supplies of war-we are beyond price and beyond tempt-We listen gravely to the assurances that we must increase our "national insurance" bill - now seventy-four cents on every dollaras the only means to national safety and forget that never have such large sums been spent in the way of national "insurance" as since 1900, and that never in any similar fifteen years in the world's history have there been so many or so terrible wars. We do not stop to ask whether a different kind of insurance is not needed; whether anybody else could be so utterly and hopelessly discredited as the militarists who raise this false cry have been by the events abroad.

Surely the way to true national preparedness for the genuine tasks of humanity, for the elevation of mankind, for the carrying on of the ideals of the great and unarmed American democracy of which we are so proud, lies elsewhere, along totally different lines!-Reprinted from N. Y. Evening Post.

crously unprepared, and are urged to increase our military and naval forces. Our advocates of "preparedness" recommend a trained army of 800,000 men, 205,000 in the standing army and 595,000 in the reserves. They recommend a navy at least equal to that of Germany. An army of that size would involve an expenditure of no less than \$750,-000,000 per year, and the navy would consume about \$500,000.000 annually in construction and maintenance. That is a total of \$1,250, 000,000 per year, and nearly \$1,-500,000,000 including pensions, \$15 per capita of the population, \$75 per family, about one-sixth of the average annual earnings of the American worker. And these monstrous annual offerings at the altar of the military moloch must be taken from the vitally necessary works of social progress and civilization.

The Daily War at Home. Mr. Gardner and his militarist friends are so obsessed with the imaginary danger of war with a foreign nation that they do not seem to realize the vastily graver dangers of the actual daily war waged within the nation, the frightful and inhuman industrial war; which calls for all available resources and effects of the country. In our last war with Spain less than three hundred American soldiers were killed on the battlefield, but more than fifty thousand American workmen are annually killed in our mines, works and factories and on our railroads, while about half a million are injured, maimed and crippled in our industries. With a fraction of the millions expended for military purposes we could provide for a sufficient and efficient corps of mine, railroad and factory inspectors and for the maintenance of proper safeguards, which would reduce these frightful industrial casualties to a minimum.

Ten of thousands of our people annually succumb to the ravages of tuberculosis, the typical disease of poverty. We could practically stamp out the dread white plague by applying a portion of the senseless military expenditures to the building of numerous sanitaria, offering plenty of fresh air and nourishing food to the unfortunate victims of he disease. (Applause.).

There are hundreds of thousands of aged workers in all parts of the country succumbing in helpless and pathetic destitution. They have spent their manhood, their strength and lives in useful service to their fellow men. They have helped to make this nation great and wealthy and powerful, and now that they have become old and feeble and incapable of making substantial profits for our captains of industry, an ungrateful community consigns them to the cheerless almshouse, the cold street and the dread bread line. We owe a duty to these aged public servants, the soldiers and heroes of our industries. Less than half of the military budget would provide old-age pensions for them and enable them to close their lives in moderate comfort and decent self-respect. (Applause.)

Just at this time the United States is undergoing one of the severest economic trials in its history. The wheels of its industrial process have become hopelessly clogged. Millions of American workers are without jobs and without bread. With an expenditure of a hundred million dollars, taken from the war budget, the government could organize numerous industrial enterprises, set the destitute jobless toilers to the work of making things they need for the sustenance of their lives, revive business and break the vicious circle of business depression, unemployment and poverty.

With the millions and billions of dollars called for by unproductive military expenses we could improve our system of education, raise the condition of our workers, and introduce measures of civic and social justice, which would make this country vastly stronger, more irresistible and unconquerable than all the dreadnaughts and aeroplanes in creation. (Hearty applause.)

The people of the United States have arrived at the parting of the ways. They will have to choose between embarking on an adventurous and exhausting policy of militarism or staking their future on a rigid determination to maintain peace and social progress. The present militarist agitation is only a mild and meek beginning. Where will it end? Today Mr. Gardner is contented with an army of 800,000 men and a navy second in rank. Will he be satisfied when he gets it? No. For if we are to be prepared for war—I beg pardon—"against war" in general, not for war with a particular nation, but war with all

comers, we may conceive of a conflict not only with a first-class foreign power, but with a combination of powers. All the powers now united against Germany may turn against us. Mr. Gardner says they will be ready for a new job as soon as they are through with their present one, and Germany herself may even queerer bed-fellows than politics, as recent events have amply demonstrated. Japan is fighting on the same side with Russia in this war, and every power on either side is fighting with some former enemy against some former ally. To be fully prepared, to be in a position to look the entire world "squarely in the face as one strong man against the other" with a proper "martial spirit" born of a "strong arm" we must have land forces surpassing those of Germany and a navy superior to that of Great Britain. And as the powers of Europe increase and improve their military and naval forces, we must keep pace with them.

Choose Before It Is Too Late.

Every dreadnaught built becomes obsolete in a few years, and new inventions every once in a while throw all military equipments and ammunition into the scrapheap. There is no stop or pause in the ever-increasing burdens of military preparation. A nation that once allows itself to be drawn into the mad vortex of military rivalry, cannot resist, cannot recede. When Russia began to choke under the intolerable load of militarism, Czar Nicholas cried out in vain for a general limitation of armaments. When the naval rivalry between Great Britain and Germay reached the breaking point, the former implored without success for a "naval holiday." Military, "powers" are the slaves of the military system. Mr. Gardner has referred somewhat ironically to the war-attitude of the Socialists of Germany, France and Belgium, who have all voted war credits to their governments and are now engaged in the slaughter of their comrades. The situation is certainly tragic, but Mr. Gardner has failed to draw the only true lesson from it. When the war exploded among the overarmed and overprepared nations of Europe, no power on earth could withstand its force. It was too late to avert the catastrophe then. The time to act was in the early days of military agitation in Europe, when the beginning rivalry of armament laid the foundation for the war. That was the time to protest and to resist. (Great applause.)

And so it is in the United States. When we once adopt the policy of ever-increasing armament, when our cities and towns are full of barracks, when we are swelled with the "martial spirit" which Mr. Gardner advocates, nothing will save us from a cataclysm similar to that which is now engulfling poor Europe. The insidious and dangerous militarist propaganda must be stopped before it has acquired much force.

And the danger of militarism to our country is not imaginary, but terribly real. In 1897 we spent on our army and navy less than \$72,-000,000. Today we have raised that sum to more than \$306,000,000, an increase of about 325 per cent., and now we are again asked to double or treble our military burdens. And for what? For a fantom fear, for the brood of hysterical imagina-

irist propagand in the United States has received its main impetus from the war in Europe. But that war is rather a guaranty of peace than a menace to Its conclusion will leave the military powers of Europe exhausted and in anything but a bellicose spirit. It is true countries have recovered after wars and have fought again. But a war of this magnitude and ferocity does not occur even once in a century, and when it does occur it is always followed by a long era of peace.

Some day the orgy of murder and blood which is now devouring Europe will cease. The unfortunate nations at war will pause, bleeding, exhausted, ashamed. Their war-intoxication will pass, and they will begin to realize the unspeakable horrors of it all. Their weary eyes will encounter nothing but ruin and desolation in Europe, they will turn to us, the great republic of the West, which alone of all powerful nations has managed to maintain peace. They will look to us for comfort, for hope. What shall be our answer? Shall it be the same vicious rattling of sabres, or shall it be a message of peace, a promise of a saner, better, humaner world for the future? Let it be peace. The United States can never become a first-class military power. Let us center our ambition, our hope and aspiration on making our country the first great peace power of the



Dr. Sargent of Harvard University says that military drill is bad for perfectly healthy boys and that it are not quite strong.

Military drill develops the external muscles at the expense of the internal muscles which support the vital organs.

Military drill does not make boys graceful and quick. It makes them stiff and angular.

The Massachusetts Commission which studied the effect of military drill said that it made the hove round-shouldered and narrow-chested. Until a boy is 18 he is not strong enough to carry a gun.

If you really want physical training give the boys gymnastics and sports.

Military drill kills initiative and It develops only self-reliance. patience and slavish obedience. Do you want your boy to become a machine? Independence of thought and action are the foundations of democracy. Your boy will lose these if he is given military drill.

When a boy carries a gun he naturally begins to think about shooting somebody. Fear and Hate are the two things which make war inevitable. These are developed by military drill.

It is bad enough to teach adults the practices and principles of warfare-such as spying, eaves-dropping, hitting from behind, lying, forging letters, following up a beaten enemy and hammering at him until he is annihilated. But what a

musketry. The English observed that only half of the approaching mass were uniforms. 'Shoot low,' commanded the English officer, they are only boys; aim at then "Only boys! Aim at their legs. legs!"

You in New Jersey will reap next autumn the results of your State's terrible indifference to her true interests; that is, you will begin to reap; the full blast of the whirlwind, you will reap later; for New Jersey has passed the bill providing for military drill in the public school; and you can be saved from this infamy, from their perversion of childhood to the mimicry of murder, only by the most drastic and fearless concerted action; you must not permit your boy to be taught military drill; you must not let less alert fathers and mothers run the risk of losing their boys to the army and navy; you must begin to agitate now, by word and pen and act; this law must be repealed, and you, in the name of your Socialism, your brotherhood with the workers of all the world, must be the organizers, where others, led by you, will gladly

In the Voice of Labor, which has been waging a ceaseless battle against the "Preparedness" of which the militarization of schoolboys is an important part, it is scarcely necessary to argue for peace; all intelligent men and women desire it; all intelligent men and women who have been informed of the muddy origin of the whole "Preparedness" agitation, of the staggering fortunes made by the war-traders, of the intense anti-labor bias of such war-traffiking firms as Bethlehem Steel, are more then apt to be whole-heartedly opposed to Preparedness," and to recognize it as war's inevitable precursor. But the reason we do not count for more in the struggle for democracy, is that we are not strongly enough organized, and not active enough, either as an organization, or as individuals. It is only when we dread "Preparedness" as strongly as the misinformed patriots of the past dreaded "the enemy," that we shall overcome it.

America is facing the most serious crisis of her history; a false step now will mean not only ruin to self for many decades to come but ruin to the entire world, East and West. On the other hand, her people may tip the scales of Justice as never before was granted to a people. It is no time to minimize the danger; for the danger is great. and as we minimize it, and soothe ourselves into lazy cheerfulness, we risk the very opportunity its conquest brings. Let us take a solemn pledge upon our lips and in our hearts, with the effort for disarmament that pledge implies; it is the pledge of the Anti-Enlistment League, the most uncompromising antiwar organization in the United States, the organization with the aim "To win Americans as individuals and as a nation to record an unqualified rejection of war as a means of settling international

profits and hate that make war possible, sign this pledge; cut it out of the paper, and mail it in today to the League's headquarters. The signature of the pledge is the basis of associate membership; the signature of the pledge, together with the securing of ten new members or the payment of one dollar, the basis of active membership. It is unnecessary to add that the activity of the active member is by no means confined to the foregoing; we want all the activity we can get, we have one hundred million people to save from the militarism which means war, and we have hit upon this method of gathering together all its most de finitely convinced opponents.

You will note the word "defensive" in the pledge, perhaps it shocks you, almost certainly it puzzles you, but it is very much meant, and unless you unqualifiedly oppose war, your place is not with us. For we believe that war between nations is murder, and as such is not justifiable under any motive whatever; furthermore, we believe that war is two-edged, that it injures the victor almost as much as the vanquished, and that it is almost futile to attain the ends for which it is waged. Our rejection of it, therefore, is complete, and insofar as we have power, it shall never again be waged in this land we love, and which we would save to peace, and to the Democracy which is its life.

You and I, as individuals, cannot stop the giant appropriations pending in Congress (though we can and must write urgent letters to our representatives to vote against them), you and I, as individuals, cannot jail the war-traders who are deliberately pushing this country into a war for Mexican and South American Capitalist markets: but you and I, as individuals, can refuse to enlist. If we are women, we can refuse our consent to the enlistment of others, and by pinning the white feather to the man who goes to the front when he knows it is wrong, rather than stay at home and be called a coward, we can show up the false courage as against the

Fight "Preparedness" in its sine qua non, the man behind the gun, without whom the gun itself is of no avail. Fathers and mothers of New Jersey, brothers and sisters of the little boys the militarists threaten to corrupt and destroy, show them the true courage! Teach them the beastiality of war by refusing yourselves to enlist.

old world. It is literally true that after some six or seven thousand years of trial, some few persons, the majority fighting material, in this and other countries, have decided to give up war forever. They have not done so lightly. weighed all the arguments for and against. They have considered all the brands, even including "defensive" war (of which the most modern form requires that the self-defending nation shall strike the first blow on another's territory) and "punitive raids," and they find that however different these appear through a diplomat's monocle one is not to be told from another those among conquered and conqueror alike who pour out their blood on the battlefield and see their children's children sold into the bondage of war-debt.

These persons have, in short, such as are Christians, taken their Christianity with ingenuous simplicity. They have understood "Thou Shalt Not Kill" as no figure of speech but an explicit correlary of the rule of love, and deciding to continue with their Christian ideals, they have renounced the "duty," patriotic or otherwise, of shouldering the gun.

We who have signed the Anti-Enlistment pledge in the name of our Socialism have shown a similar simplicity of heart. Wiser ones than we must smile if they do not weep over the child-like faith we have put in the old slogans, the literalness with which we have assumed it true that the workers of the world are brothers, identical in interests, bound to fight not against but with another in the one great war, the war of brains and human need against senseless cruelty and greed. Labor's War, "the liberation war of Humanity."

But from whatever motives we have come at our unflinching renunciation of war, we are agreed that the time is ripe for such differentation, as that amiably slurred by the middle-ground pacifist, between ourselves and him. We are glad that

he has at last come out in an almost denunciation of bold "Preparedness," that with us he will protest against compulsory military training of young school boys, as well as for any other anti-militarist activity he will assume. Murder will wear the guise of humanity. Hideous things will be glamored with romance.

Let us choose NOW not to be duped THEN.

And then let us take a look at this "price of peace" of which the militarists have so much to say What is it? Well. let us grant the invasion of the foe who will come to us across thousands of miles of water, and land his million troops with the non chalance of a summer youth drawing up his cance on a sandy beech Reprisals on non-resistants? Perhaps, a few, but the wholesale slaughter of an unarmed people? The thing is not conceivable. Those who so imagine forget that even invaders are men with stomachs.

the Bethlehem Steel group, the Carnegie Steel group, the Midvale Steel group, the Harvey Steel group, and last, but not least, Col. Thompson's International Nickel Co. group. METHODS USED IN PREPAREDNESS PROGRAM.

States. They had taken advantage of Lincoln's preoccupation with the war to put the transcontinental railroad land steals through Congress under his nose. Their only desire was to invest their money in the United States and reap such profits as they could.

Now, everything is changed. The United States is becoming, so far as the investment of capital is concerned, a good deal of a sucked orange. In other words, America has changed from an importer to an exporter of capital. We no longer bring capital from abroad to finance our industries. We send capital abroad to finance the industries of other people. A single instance of our activity in this direction is afforded by the fact that a group of men acting under the leadership of Mr. Rockefeller's National City Bank have formed a company, the avowed purpose of which is to go abroad and seek monopolies and privileges in any and every country on the globe.

The most powerful American capitalists are frankly in search of foreign investments and foreign trade. The nation that has the most of these things is always the most hated nation. The gentlemen who are going about it to get these things know that. They know they will need fleets and armies to hold what they hope to get. They could not go to the American people and say: "You will not share in this prosperity which we hope to get for ourselves, nevertheless, we want you to provide a great army and a great navy to enable us to get and hold all we can." So they conjure up the bogey of invasion. They believe they can get the army and the navy they want if the people can be well scared.

Mr. Wilson is playing the game. He has been dragged into it, inch by inch, but he seems to be pretty well in. His reasons for being in may not be and apparently are not precisely the reasons of the great capitalists for wanting him in. He feels sensitive just now because Elihu Root practically charged him with being a coward or a bluffer, and perhaps both. His political sense also tells him that if part of the country has gone crazy 'over "preparedness" that he must not let Mr. Roosevelt, or somebody else like him, get all the "preparedness" votes. But there is absolute proof that Mr. Wilson, down in his heart. knows this country is in no danger of invasion. Here is the proof:

Mr. Wilson, in Cleveland, on January 29, 1916, urged the creation of an armed force that could move on the "shortest possible notice" and added:

"You will ask me: 'Why do you say the shortest possible notice?" Because, gentlemen, let me tell you, very solemnly, you cannot afford to postpone this thing. I do not know what a single day may bring forth."

If this means anything, it means that we should waste not one moment in gathering ourselves together to resist a blow. Is Mr. Wilson gathering our forces together?
