Kenosha, Wis., Oct. 21.—The employers of Kenosha have set about the work of crushing organized labor in that city, which has for years been known as a stronghold of unionism.

The fight was begun by locising out the employers of the Badger Brass Manufacturing company and announcing that makers could get back to work only by accepting an increase of hours from nine to ten and a transformation of the factory into an open shop.

Five unions were affected by this movement—the Metal Polishers's Generator Workers', Lamp Makers and the Spinners' and Molders'.

The next step was the organization of an employers' association and preparations to extend the same principles to all the Kenosha industries. This organization, embracing practically every manufacturer in the city, adopted the following statement of principles:

Thus organization shall be known.

It is therefore certain that there will be a good, large fight in Kenosha before the unions are crushed This organization shall be known as the "Manufacturers Association of Kenosha"
