

of workingmen. These are militant rights that the workingmen have

gained through political activity, and there is not a country of Western Europe where legislation to protect the life and welfare of the masses is not more advanced than with us.

At the rate we are going in this country, if workingmen do not get into politics, determined to fight to the finish the old political organizations, we shall have in ten years no freedom of speech or assembly, no right of workingmen to unite, nor any other constitutionally guaranteed method of combating growing oppression.


