



But it is not the present strength alone that is significant. THE STEADY RATE OF GROWTH IS MUCH MORE IMPORT-ANT. He goes on to say:

The Socialist movement grows with comparative steadiness and never, on the whole, loses any ground once gained. The mathematician would plot its curve as an ascending parabola; he would reckon it in the terms of a geometric progression.
