

Young men and women from West Philadelphia, Germantown, Tioga and the suburbs flock to the Tenderloin apothecary shops by the score and there procure cocaine, it was stated.

Special Policeman Mulehrin exhibited three bills which he found in Bader's drug store. They were for supplies from wholesals drug houses. Bader purchased the drug at \$2.50 an ounce and sold it to the distributors at \$5.50 an ounce. It was then made up into 25-cent packages, which netted the peddlers \$18.50 an ounce.

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

It is now admitted that the "hot air boom" that was attempted by the "prosperity clubs" has collapsed before it started. There is not the slightest prospect of any immediate recovery in industry, and every person who is at all familiar with the course of industrial crises knows that there will be no improvement within the next six months at the very least.

Yet in the presence of this terrible condition the capitalist candidates for president and congress have nothing to say. Although these artificial famines have been coming at intervals of from ten to twenty years for more than a century, although it is admitted that they are caused by social relations alterable by legislation, not one of the so-called "great" political parties offers any suggestion as to

They can offer no explanation that would not give the lie to every reason which they offer for existence. They dare not suggest any cure, lest they thereby suggest their own destruction.

The only party that dares to offer an explanation of the crisis is the Socialist party. It alone dares to point out that industry stops b-cause profits stop, and that profits must remain the impulse to production so long as the means of production are privately owned.

The Socialist party alone offers any suggestions as to means of amelioration of the horrors of this artificial famine. It alone points out the way by which such famines can be prevented in the

### Aiding Russian Bloodhounds

A persistent effort is being made to secure the extradition of John Pawren, a Russian revolutionist, now in Philadelphia. The long-established practice of the United States has always been against the extradition of political offenders. For more than a century this country has been hailed as the "refuge of the oppressed." Literally millions of European revolutionists, from the days of '48 and the Commune and the German "Laws of Exception," to say nothing of the small armies of Fenians and others who have fought against British tyranny, have been sheltered in this country against the governments that sought their lives.

Recently, however, there are signs of a change. No one will claim that the tyranny of the czar is any less terrible than that of any rulers against whom the people of Europe have struggled. None have shed blood more recklessly, none have been more destructive of all forms of human liberty.

But in these days liberty has come to take on a new meaning. It has come to mean not simply revolt against governmental tyranny, but against industrial slavery as well.

Consequently the ruling classes of what once were called "free" countries, such as Switzerland and the United States, are beginning to oppose all forms of freedom. The government of Roosevelt has much more in common with the czar than with the Russian people. Taft is sent to drink the health of the "autocrat of the Russias," but even such a milk and water reformer as Professor Milyoukow is refused an audience at the White House.

Were it not for the protests of the Socialists this government would gladly act as retriever to the Russian hunter for human vic-
