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
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Secure a Constitutional Convention

Again the question of a charter for Chicago is being agitated by the business interests of the city. It is stated by the Chicago Tribune that the former members of the charter convention will again constitute the body to draft the charter and that the charter rejected by the voters last fall will be used as a basis for the new one.

The people of Chicago less than a year ago defeated the charter that was presented to them. A demand was then made that any charter for Chicago should be drawn up by a constitutional convention composed of persons duly elected.

The body of men calling itself the charter convention is not a representative assembly. It is composed of men appointed partly by ex-Mayor Dunne, partly by Governor Deneen and partly by the state legislature, the overwhelming majority of them representing certain corporation interests of the city.

A constitutional convention is the only manner in which, if Chicago is to frame a charter, it should be done, and it is the manner of securing a charter in which the workers would at least have a

Attempt to Coerce Labor

Efforts being made by the International Harvester company to organize among its workmen an employes' benefit association must be regarded as a direct move against organized labor. It is a further attempt to destroy any effort on the part of organized labor to protect itself against the employer.

The plan, similar to the one attempted a year ago by Swift & thouar school. They glared at Co., and now in operation on certain railroads, is a means by which the corporation hopes to gain complete control over its 30,000 employes.

It is hoped by the business interests of the country that by a system of benefit associations controlled by the corporation managements, that will completely bind the men to them, putting heavy conditions on the employes but none on the companies, that any form of government insurance will be made improbable in this coun-

This arrangement will also act as a most effective whip over labor in case of unrest and destroy the solidarity of any union organization.

Men bound to a company by a benefit association, into which they have paid for years, will be fearful, and less inclined to strike.

This effort of the corporations of the country to cripple any independent action on the part of their employes is a direct result of the demands made by Socialists in other countries and in this country for compulsory governmental insurance against unemployment, illness, accidents, invalidism, old age and death.



Of course, this is an awkward situation, and yet somehow it seems to comfort the people. They get tired or seeing the same old porch-climbers make off with their valuables, and so they rise in righteous wrath and declare that here-

after they are not going to allow Republican porch-climbers to enter their homes,

and they therefore indignantly vote for Democratic porch-climbers. Of course, Mr. Roosevelt, Mr. Taft, Mr. Bryan and Mr. Hearst would object to my suterpretation of their policies. But Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Taft are prejudiced. While they are above the vicious practices of the machine politicians, they, unfortunately, belong to the Republican Porch-climbers' Union, and they would not think of being disloyal to that union.
