

ONE HUNDRED MEN IN PURSUIT OF OUTLAWS IN VIRGINIA

Richmond, Va., Oct. 2.—A gang of outlaws, led by men named Thomas and Zimmerman, held at bay in a desolated spot near Arvonia, after shooting N. M. Gregory, a prominent citizen of Buckingham county, last Saturday, has excited this part of the Old Dominiou as it has not been excited since civil war days. The outlaws have evaded and defied the officers of the law sent to arrest them. Calls for troops have been sent to Gov. Swanson. Sheriff Williams of Buckingham county is determined to capture the gang dead or alive.

Plans were laid by the sheriff last night to lead a posse of 160 or more deputies against the desperadoes early today. The forces of outlawry are strongly posted, it is believed, but sheriff will-lams feels confident that upon the approach of his superior force they will break ground and disperse. He is determined, however, to run them down and effectually rid the community of their presence.

YEAR AMOUNTS TO \$18,664,821

Washington, D. C., Oct. 2.—The report of the commissioner of pensions for the fiscal year ending June 30 list, made public today, shows that during the year there were 34,333 deaths among civil war veterans who were on the pension roll. This falling off was equal to about 5 per cent of the total, and left 625,084 survivors on the roll. The number of deaths was 3,122 greater than during the previous year.

The total number of pensioners at the end of the year was 951,687. During the year \$4,355 pensioners of all classes were dropped and 38,682 added, making a net loss of 15,684. The statement also shows that 188,445 widows of soldiers already have taken advantage of the law of the last session of congress, increasing to 512 a month the pensions allowed to widows.

The actual expenditure for the year on account of pensions was 152,083,056, but on account of the law increasing a count of the law increasing the rate to individual pensioners the annual value of the roll at the close of the year was 153,485,761, an increase of 18,644,211 over the previous year. The expenditure was the largest in the history of the bureau.

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

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

Labor the Issue

There is no evading the fact. The Republican and Democratic puppets of the capitalist class may dodge and twist as much as they like, they cannot avoid the fact that at last the question of LABOR AND ITS REWARD HAS BECOME THE CENTRAL ISSUE OF A GREAT CAMPAIGN.

They have pointed out how the progress of machinery has meant increase of productive power until poverty is no longer necessary, and its existence has become a social crime. They have shown the workers how their every effort to secure relief through their unions was being balked by the use of governmental powers in the possession of the employers. Sometimes it has been the police and the militia, but of recent years the courts have been the main dependence of the capitalists in the battle with organized labor. The Socialists have shown that the powers of government are retained by the possessing class because of the control by that class of the two largest political parties. So long as that control existed it made no difference which set of candidates were elected. The capitalists won and the workers lost in either case.

Where the Struggle Lies

The interests of the employer and the employe never differ except when it comes to a division of the joint profit of labor and capital into dividends and wages. This must be a constant source of periodical discussion between the employer and the employe, as indeed are the other terms of the employment.-From Taft's speech of acceptance.

What a tremendous "except" that is. The only place where employers and employes ever differ is over the question of who shall have the product. That is all. All the capital that ever existed on earth never did and by small glimpses, it is because of her bis fullest and best work for Socialism never will produce anything. Capital is an inert creation of Labor, own tact, her love of home life, and her unless he has the sympathy and help that in the hands of idle, ruling CAPITALISTS has enslaved its creator.

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MONOPOLY MEANS STAGNANCY

We frequently hear it said that Socialism will destroy all progress and end

ety in a stagnant pool. Of course, the critics of Socialism who make such prophecies know nothing hatever about it. They say such things to frighten people, just as some persons frighten children by telling them of hobgoblins and witches which never existed and never will exist.

Socialism to one who knows Socialism has no intention of taking the great tream of life and directing it into a vast, stagnant pool. That would be the end of the human order, while Socialism is the beginning of a human order.

For centuries upon centuries we have fought each other tooth and nail. As ads, savages, cannibals, and barbarians, we often depended for existence upon the destruction of our fellow human beings." We had to live, and to live we fought and destroyed each other.

We sometimes look back at those old days with horror. And yet are we very far from this old savagery? Do we not today fight and destroy-each other? Is not the merchant proud

when he bankrupts and sends to ruin his fellow merchant? Is not that capitalist greatest who is most successful in bankrupting and destroying his fellow capitalists? Is not that magnate greatest who add a field to field, house to house, factory to frectory, leaving multitudes landless, unemployed and starving?

Is not the workman tôday pitted against the capitalist and the capitalist

against the workman? Is not union labor in a death struggle with scab labor and scab labor with union labor? And do we not approve and adopt for our own use that organization which most successfully overpowers and destroys other

Are not those whom we emulate the most successful in impoverishing

And what does all this competitive and combative effort mean? Are we not all of us fighting with might and main to reach a position in which we shall be independent and free, in which we shall have guaranteed to us and to our children the necessaries of life, and in which we shall dominate the lives of other men instead of having them dominate our life?

And have you not observed that this competitive struggle has always ended in monopoly? In the civilizations of the past the victors in this struggle have invariably gotten into their own hands the land, the wealth and the government. Have they not taken the brooks and rivulets and united them into one stream that emptied itself into the great STAGNANT reservoir of their own personal

It is monopoly that is stagnant, and whenever the world has come to a stage where a few have monopolized things essential to life the societies of the past have been destroyed. The reservoirs of wealth have been filled to overflowing while the people s arved.

A lamp surcharged with oil will not burn, and the societies of the past, like the lamp, have perished for want of proper distribution.

Cur present panics and industrial crises-periods of stagnancy-will end only when things readjust themselves and the people begin again to get sustenance.

Today the reservoirs are full, and the people who have flooded the reservoirs are not allowed to produce any more until in some manner the reservoirs are

This is capitalism—and stagnancy.

How different the Socialist ideal! The Socialist has no intention of drying up the little rivulets and of ending them in the reservoir of monopoly. He intends to retain and preserve the millions of little brooks and streamlets which refresh the earth, but he wants them all to have a destiny, a great, common destiny, co-operative in its purpose, unified in its aim.

Nature does not have dams or reservoirs. Her's is a circle of usefulness. Billions of little springs and brooks empty themselves into the larger streams and these into the great, onrushing rivers. As they move on their way to achieve their destiny they water and refreshen the -arth. AND EVERY DROP THAT COMES FROM THEM IS TAKEN UP AN SENT BACK TO THEM to feed and replenish them so that they may start their creative and productive work

This is precisely the end and aim of Socialism. It is as if the earth drank of the co-operative labors of all the millions of individual streamlets only for the purpose of rendering back to every unit the full product of its labor.
