By this phrase plagiarized from capitalist diplomacy the Pan-American Federati of Labor declared a monopoly on all workers from Alaska to Tierra del Fuego, and denied "foreign" interna tionals any jurisdiction. The organi-tations forbidden to "interfere" with the labor movement of the western hemisphere were the Moscow Red Trade Union International, the Berlin anarcho-syndicalist International, and the Amsterdam International Feder ation of Trade Unions—still too revo-lutionary for the A. F. of L.


