MELLON ALUMINUM TRUST FLAYED IN SENATE; JUSTICE DEPARTMENT TRIES TO WHITEWASH MONOPOLY

(Special to The Dally Worker)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.-Mellon's aluminum trust is again under fire from a new coalition of democrats and republican insurgents. What is considered the first gun in the coming congressional campaigns was fired by the Morgan senator, Thomas D. Walsh of Montana.

In a verbal skirmish on the floor of the senate the democratic forces, led by Walsh, who directed the naval reserve oil scandal in which Denby, Fall, young Roosevelt and others were proved to have indulged in speculations for the benefit of the oil magnates, Doheney and Sinclair, the secretary of the treasury, Andrew W. Mellon, was accused of violating the anti-trust law. The Coolidge administration was arraigned for condoning this

violation. Walsh showed that the Aluminum Walsh showed that the Aluminum company is owned by the secretary of the treasury and his brother, R. B. Mollen, and that it is a monopoly Mellon, and that it is a monopoly which defies the law without any fear of consequences because Mellon is a member of the Coolidge cabinet and Attorney General Sargent uses the department of justice in order to conceal the crookedness of Mellon instead of prosecuting the concern.



'Zeigler!' and 'Scranton!' Clarion Calls to Miners Who Fight for Progress

By J. LOUIS ENGDAHL.

SCRANTON AND ZEIGLER! The names of the two coal mining towns, one in the Pennsylvania anthracite field, the other in the southern Illinois soft coal field, typify methods of the war of enthroned reaction in the United Mine Workers of America against the developing left wing.

They are not the only methods employed by the Lewis czardom. But they demand thoro study by the thinking elements among the coal miners who are striving to promote the class integrity of their organization.

Scranton stands out big again, as it has in the past, as the scene of vicious oppression within the miners' union. Six hundred delegates, representing 158,000 organized coal miners, had been gathered together at great expense from every corner of the anthracite field to discuss the "Black Friday" betrayal put thru by President John L. Lewis, at Philadelphia, last week. Thoro discussion of the agreement had taken place in many of the miners' unions and quite a number had instructed their delegates to wage bitter war against it.

But immediately Ed Scharfenberg, of the South Wilkesbarre miners, demanded the floor to discuss the agreement, a red-baiting drive was launched against him and he was driven out of the convention. He was charged with having literature of the Progressive Miners' Committee in his possession, and President Lewis, appearing as witness for himself, in addition to being prosecutor, judge and jury, declared the Progressive Miners' Committee a dual organization affiliated with the Workers (Communist) Party.

All this, of course, is sheer nonsense. No one knows better than Lewis himself that the Progressive Miners' Committee is not a dual organization. He knows that he lies when he tries to compare the Progressive Miners' Committee with the Industrial Workers of the World and the "One Big Union," the latter organization being confined to a small section of Canada. Lewis knows that the Progressive Miners' Committee has fought the "One Big Union," in the Nova Scotia coal strike, for instance, and that the Progressive Miners' Committee has fought every splitting and dual tendency in the union.

Lewis knows that his whole case against the Progressive Miners' Committee is built on an unstable sub-structure of malicious falsehoods. No wonder he wouldn't give Delegate Scharfenberg an opportunity to state his case. The craven coward and cheap bully that he is, wouldn't even accept Scharfenberg's challenge to read the leaflets that his henchmen claimed they had stolen from the progressive delegate. The truths set forth in the leaflets might be the spark that would set the discontent against Lewis' sell-out flaming in the convention.

This criminal deed of suppression perpetrated by President Lewis at Scranton is a confession of the unstable foundation on which his traitorous regime wobbles.

In Zeigler the Lewis-Farrington outfit, co-operating with the Ku Klux Klan, aided the capitalist courts to convict left wing mine workers. The only crime of the Zeigler miners is that they hold progressive views in conflict with the predatory interests of the officialdom. They were dragged into the courts for this crime, and an attempt will be made to complete the attack by sending them to prison, just as Alex Howat was sent to jail in Kansas thru the collaboration of President Lewis with the mine owners and their capitalist

"Scranton" and "Zeigler" are clarion calls to all militants in the miners' union to organize energetically and intelligently for new struggles.

The five-year slave contract has gone into effect in the anthracite coal fields. The actual workings of this treason pact will become apparent with each new day's developments.

"Scranton" and "Zeigler" are admissions of weakness by a tottering regime trying to play a Mussolini role in the American labor movement. The future belongs to the militant masses of miners seeking to weld their organization into a weapon for combat against the mine barons and the whole ruling class in America.

To Sign Separate Agreements. By SYLVAN A. POLLACK (Special to The Daily Worker)

NEW YORK CITY, Feb. 19 .- The conflict between the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union and the Dress Contractors' Association has now reached a stage that the union has decided to sign separate agreements with individual contractors due to its inability to come to an understanding with the association.

The union has at all times expressed a desire to meet the association and try to come to an agreement, while the association demanded as a prerequisite that the workers on strike in all of their shops return first. also that the business agents of the union stop visiting shops affiliated with their association, unless accompanied by their representatives.

The union rejected these impudent demands of the bosses and stated its willingness to go into a conference without any conditions being laid

down beforehand. The contractors' association later agreed to this suggestion of the union and a conference was arranged for

Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Bosses Change Their Mind.

At the eleventh hour the bosses once again brought forth their proposition that the workers return to their shops before the conference opens, also that the business agents stop visiting their shops.

Seeing that the bosses' association was not serious in its intentions, the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union sent an ultimatum to the contractors' association declaring that if they did not agree to an uncondicional conference by Tuesday at 1 p. m., the union would go ahead and sign separate agreements with the members of the contractors' associa-

No answer was received, so preparations are now being made to handle each shop separately, giving each boss a certain amount of time to come to terms with the union, and if he refused, to call a strike in his shop.

No General Strike. "This does not mean that a general strike is being called." So stated Charles S. Zimmerman, who is general manager of the organization department of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union. "Every contractor will be given an opportunity accept our terms and if he refuses a strike will be called in his shop. "A shop chairmen's meeting will be



(Special to The Dally Worker) NEW YORK, Feb. 19-Pension payments to retired employes of the United States Steel corporation and its subsidiaries from the fund established jointly by it and Andrew Carnegie reached the total of \$2.068.652.83 during the year 1925, according to an announcement by C. L. Close, manager of the bureau of safety, sanitation and welfare.

The number of employes on the pension roll at the end of 1925 was 5,084, representing a total increase during the year of 606. The average period of this service was 31.35 years and the average monthly pension \$43.20. After citizens at this transparent attempt having slaved for the trust over thirty years, the retired worker gets the munificent sum of less than \$50 a month on which to maintain himself and his family if married.

HUNGARIAN AND GERMAN RULERS PLANNED TO FORGE RUSS ROUBLES

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Feb. 19- English and French papers are now printing exposes of an agreement between the monarchist movement of Hungary and Germany to forge Russian duma roubles to finance a counter-revolutionary campaign against Soviet Russia. The newspaper Paris Soire pubishes a document concluded in 1920 between the Hungarian and the Bavarian monarchists, which was signed for the Germans by Ludendorff and Colonel Flivver Magnate Favors Bauer. This contract concluded with Horthy, had for its purpose the production of false 1000 rouble notes for financing the German-Hungarian-Russian monarchist movement. Blacklist Scheme

WASHINGTON —(FP)— Secretary of Labor Davis' perennially promoted scheme for compelling alien workers in the United States to register once

In the current issue of Ford's magazine, the "Dearborn Independent," now sent to all press writers in Washington, Davis is given the place of honor, to explain his plan. Opposition has been so effective in the country at large, and notably in the labor movement, that he has dropped the word "registration," and taken up "enrollment." The word means the same as the old—a system of silent terrorzation of the alien as to his political, industrial and social thinking and expression. Any federal judge or other "enrollment" official who may not like the way the alien is facing industrial problems may decide to block his securing citizenship, according to the labor spokesmen who have, since 1921, protested against the idea.

At the same time it would reveal the existence of these sinister influences and aid us in our endeavor to rid the country of foreign-born agitators of that character."

"AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, that no person appointed to any office instituted by this act shall directly, or indirectly, be concerned or interested in carrying on the business of trade or commerce, or be owner in whole or in part any sea vessel, or purchase for himself or another in trust for him any public lands or other public property, or be concerned in the purchase or disposal of any public securities of any state or the United States, or take or apply to his own use any emolument or gain for negotiating any business in the department other than what shall be allowed by law; and if

person shall offend any of the prohibitions of this act he shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor and forfeit to the United States the penalty of \$3,000, and shall upon conviction be removed from office and be forever thereafter incapable of holding any office un-

Many precedents are established under which Mellon is in viola tion of this identical sectiton of the act creating the treasury department. The most noted instance was that of A. T. Stewart, a retail merchant who owned the concern now known as Wanna makers. Stewart was appointed secretary of the freasury by Presi dent U. S. Granf. The appointment was confirmed by the senate. When the attention of Grant was called to the fact that Stewart was violating the law by holding office since he was engaged "in trade and commerce," the president recommended to both houses that Stewart be exempted by joint resolution from the provisions of the bill. Failing in this, Stewart's resignation was demanded and secured. But then, what do capitalist laws amount to when they interfere with the plunderbund?

We do not relate these facts because we expect Mellon to observe the law, or because we believe the democrats one whit better, but only that workers may come to despise with an implacable hatred the Wall Street government at Washington and determine to establish in its place a workers' government.

The latest "achievement" of the rade union officialdom in their endeavors to further tie the unions to the capitalist chariot is the so-called "new wage theory" enunciated by the last American Federation of Labor convention. We quote in part from the report of the committee on the executive council report:

"... We urge upon wage earners everywhere: That we oppose all wage reductions and that we urge upon management the elimination of wastes in production in order that selling prices may be lower and wages higher. To this end we recommend cooperation in study of waste in production. . . "Social inequality, industrial in-

stability and injustice must increase unless the workers' real wages. the purchasing power of their wages, coupled with a continuing reduction in the number of hours making up the working day are progressed in proportion to man's increasing power of production."
