"Springfield, Mass., Jan. 7, 1901. To the American Comrades of the So-cial Democratic Party: 2As my stay in America concludes

on the twelfth, I take this opportunity of writing a few words of encourage-ment to the whole hearted, energetic met in the various centers where th S. D. P. flag has been raised. As a result of my investigation during my short stay I feel convinced that there are great facilities at the command of the earnest and sincere comrades who are endeavoring to teach the American toller the duties and possibilities which they have for bringing about the ideal which every Socialist has made his re-ligion. The difficulties and obstacles that lie in the way of cohesion and solidarity are many, but they all can and will be surmounted.
