- Can you throw away so splendid and historic an opportunity to do a deed for humanity's sake?

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
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Editorials

THE NATIONAL CAMPAIGN

We would know that this is a national campaign year if only by the trained campaign liars that are nailing one another in the Republican and Democratic parties. Even the presidential candidates are in the business this year. Hughes is spewing his vomit at Wilson and the cabinet officers of the latter are denouncing Hughes as a liar. Since Hughes began he has been vociferously bawling out his personalities and telling the people what an honest man he is and what a wonderful president he will make. From the Democratic side comes the same kind of slush and this is the sort of a campaign these corrupt capitalist parties make to perpetuate the criminal misrule of capitalism.

Not a single real issue is touched. Not one!

These rival capitalist politicians simply plaster each other over

with filth and each party proves the other rotten to the core.

The appeal of the Socialist party to the American people is on an infinitely higher plane. Benson and Kirkpatrick are not slinging sewage at other candidates to demonstrate their fitness to be president and vice-president. They are making a clean, dignified can-vass among the people. They are discussing the actual issue upon which the people and the plundering plutocracy are divided. They are presenting facts and making arguments, not throwing personal stink-pots at their competitors a la the bewhiskered Hughes and the Democrats.

HORACE TRAUBEL AND WAR

The pen of Horace Traubel, editor of the Conservator published at Philadelphia, and literary executor of Walt Whitman, is one of the most vigorous and incisive ever wielded against war and in favor of peace and good will among nations and men.

Horace Traubel's instinct against war and bloodshed is as deeply rooted and all-pervading as is his passion for love and service to his

fellow-men.

The series of brilliant articles recently written by Traubel in the Conservator and in other papers and periodicals ought to be read by all the millions of misguided people who are still crying for preparedness and who in spite of all history still cherish the vicious delusion that war is the way to peace.

Traubel writes in a telling, epigrammatic fashion entirely his war is a monstrous and unmitigated crime without an extenuating circumstance in its favor. It is simply murder in its most vicious, abhorrent and inexcusable extremity.

When Traubel read an editorial in a Canadian paper declaring that only when a nation knew how to fight did it become a nation, he answered in a terrific broadside that blew that editor to atoms.

Said he: "If you prove yourself a nation by war, you prove yourself a better nation by more war and a better nation by entire devotion to war". . . The fact is we long ago proved we can fight. But we never yet proved our ability not to fight. To know how to fight is still at the best only barbarism. To know how not to fight is at the worst still civilization."

Horace Traubel is one of the supreme liberators and humanitarians of this age. It is a thousand pities that so few of the common people he is giving his life to actually know him. It is the tragic fate of such men to die before they begin to live. Traubel is not only the pupil of old Walt Whitman but the master democrat of his time and the genius incarnate of human love and world-wide brother-

STRIKE ON THE MESABE RANGE

One of the fiercest strikes is raging in the Mesabe Range and twenty thousand mine-workers are involved. The issue is the right For stone age ideas and ideals and for deadly hostility to progress to organize and a living wage. Both have been denied by the corporations and they have estab i h d gunman-rule as Rockefeller did in Colorado to break the strike and perpetuate the peonage that has

prevai ed for years on the Range.

From the inception of this strike the capitalist press has maintained its conspiracy of silence. This is not in the least strange. Publicity would expose a condition of industria slavery that would incite widespread indignation and possibly revolt, hence publicity must be avoided and not even the information that there is a strike of the slaves of the pits must be allowed to reach the public.

But how about the silence of the socialist and labor press? This is not so easily accounted for, nor so satisfactorily from the working-class point of view. Is it because these miners are not attached to Gompers' A. F. of L. that their desperate struggle is ignored as if it did not exist? Barring the International Socialist and far-reaching consequence of this strike, or done justice to it and the proletariat engaged in it. Nearly all these papers have in fact ignored this strike and to read them one would never suspect that such a desperate industrial battle was being fought.

It does not matter to the Rip-Saw that this army of mine-workers is not affiliated with the A. F. of L.; it does not matter that the great bulk of them are unorganized, that many of them are common laborers, that some of them wear the badge of the I. W. W.; it does not matter in the least, I say, what they belong to or do not belong to, it is sufficient that THEY BELONG TO THE WORKING-CLASS, and the very fact that they are unorganized makes all the more creditable their battle to establish the right to organize, and all the more binding upon socialists and union men the obligation to stand by them and give them financial and moral support and render them every possible aid in their struggle to unionize that scab

locality and holst the flag of industrial solidarity.

The writer understands clearly the nature of this tremendous conflict on the Mesabe Range and his heart is with the strikers to the end. For years the peons of the pits in that infernal region that ought to blossom like a garden and would but for the wolves of exploitation that are ravaging it, have been denied the right to organize and have been subjected to the most flagrant robbery and the most shameful indignities. At last, thank God, they have risen in revolt. It is the revolt that comes finally to all workers when conditions can no longer be endured, and it well deserves the backing of the entire labor movement. If, through the want of proper support, this strike fails, it will set back the clock of unionism for years, but if it wins, it will have a tremendous influence in promoting industrial unionism throughout the country.

Already has rioting been incited and innocent blood been shed under the gunman rule of the outlaw corporations, and already are the leaders, honest and fearless men, lodged in jail and threatened with long sentences. The cause of these men, these comrades and fellow-workers, cries aloud to the labor movement and the Rip-Saw makes this appeal in their behalf, earnestly entreating every socialist local and every trade union to rally to the rescue, financially

and otherwise, of the strikers on the Mesabe Range.

Frank P. Walsh, chairman of the committee on industrial relations, has written a letter to John D. Rockefeller, Jr., since the supreme court of Colorado rendered its decision fixing the responsibility for the crimes of Colorado upon the Rockefeller regime, calling upon the young Sunday school teacher to abdicate his autocratic control of the workers, but it is not likely that he will do so until the abdication is wrested from his plutocratic dynasty by the workers themselves.

THE FIGHT AGAINST MILITARISM

The American Union Against Militarism, Munsey Bldg., Washington, D. C., is entitled to full credit for waging relentless warfare against militarism. The officials of this union are peculiarly fitted for the work they have undertaken and the propaganda they have organized during the past few months has developed marvelous power and efficiency and is making its influence felt throughout the length and breadth of the land. The secrets of the Army and Navy League have been ferreted out, the public archives have been searched. and every measure introduced in Congress touching militarism has been closely scrutinized by the Union and reported to the country in a series of bulletins and other official documents.

Through the Union, publicity has been given to the inside operations of the gang which has been promoting militarism in the name of preparedness, and a healthy public sentiment has been aroused

against their intrigues and machinations.

When war was about to be declared upon Mexico the officials of the Union promptly demonstrated their capacity to act efficiently in an emergency. The telegraph was freely used and within a few hours after President Wilson issued what was looked upon as his is brilliant and fascinating, to say the least, and is pronounced to ultimatum to Carranza and war seemed inevitable, all the machinery of the Union was set in operation to prevent the calamity. were not actually pressed into service until their appointment was given the widest publicity and their influence was no doubt a factor in preventing war and paving the way for a peacable settlement of the difficulties between the two nations.

During this time the jingoes and their press and statesmen, such as Hearst and Fall and other freebooters whose "interests" in Mexico demanded intervention, were shouting for war and had it not been for the American Union Against Militarism, the Socialist party and kindred influences, bloody war would now be raging between the United States and Mexico.

Right heartily do we commend the American, Union Against Militarism and wish success in increasing measure to its labors.

Charles Sumner said: "Not that I love country less, but Humanity Review, not a socialist or labor paper has recognized the magnitude more, do I now and here plead the cause of a higher and truer patriot-I cannot forget that we are men by a more sacred bond than we are citizens—that we are children of a common Father more than we are Americans." This would be construed today as treason by charlatan "patriots" of the Roosevelt ilk, but it nevertheless expresses the only Americanism that deserves the least respect.

THE "COMMON" LABORER

If the working class is ever to be emancipated—and it certainly is—then the common laborer, as he is so often sneeringly termed, has got to be reckoned with. In the machine process more and more skilled labor is being turned into common labor and as a consequence the army of common laborers is rapidly increasing and will soon bulk sufficiently, if it does not already, to swing the whole labor movement.

To the extent that common labor is educated, organized, classconscious, to that extent the labor movement in general is strong or weak. Common labor is not only the barometer of the movement but to such an extent IS the movement that it either pushes it onward toward its goal or drags it downward toward slavery.

There are not a few among union men themselves who regard the common laborer with indifference if not with scorn, and their attitude toward their own brother, though he work harder and receive less, but reflects their own narrowness and ignorance, and they themselves are the greatest barriers to the emancipation of their class.

The contempt in which "common labor" has always been held is expressed at the same time in the honorable (?) standing accorded to leeches and parasites in the same community, and both are the reflex of a class-ruled society in which the exploiter is exalted and his exploited victims debased.

It has never been fashionable, nor even respectable to labor. From the days when the slaves built the pyramids to the present era of capitalism, labor has been slavery and the working-class has been the "lower class." The talk we hear from the lips of lily-fingered apologists and retainers about the "dignity" of labor in a system in which labor is essentially slavish, is pure gammon. Not one of this gentry labors—except with his mouth. His palaver about the "dignity" of labor has for its sole purpose the keeping of the sweated and despised laborer content with his slavish lot.

No one labors in the present system unless he is compelled to as the only means at his disposal to maintain his existence, and it is a blessed thing that this is true and it were more blessed still if no one would labor at all until labor is redeemed from slavery and labor becomes work and is freely done by free men.

But to return to the "common" laborer. The labor movement, economic and political, will have to turn its attention specifically to common labor and educate and organize it if it ever expects to destroy wage-slavery and emancipate the working class.

9. Making the Beginning Under Socialism

By Walter Thomas Mills

When Socialism is established, referendum and recall; ground rents will be applied to public purposes. Monopoly profits in transportation, manufactures and exchange will be abolished

The purchasing power of human service will rise and the selling prices fall, until all useful people will be able to buy out of the market all that their labor puts there.

Making the beginning under Socialism has to do with the first steps to be taken in making the escape from the private appropriation of the collectively created ground rents, and from the extortion of monopoly profits.

Under the public ownership of all monopolized industries, the control of the industries will go with the ownership, and hence Socialism not only involves the transfer of ownership but such an extension of democracy, and such a perfection of the state as will make certain the democratic management, not only of collectively owned industries, but in the end of all collective interests by those collectively concerned, of every name and nature whatsoever.

Therefore, to make a beginning under Socialism not only involves securing control of the public authorities, securing the ownership of the great monopolies, but it also involves the extension and perfection of the organizations

of labor.

To make the beginning under Socialism then, means the creation of a political party strong enough to control the Government; the extension of public ownership until all unavoidable monopolies shall become public enterprises, while at the same time organizations of labor must be enlarged and adapted to the actual work of exercising their authority as citizens in the management of the industries in which they are employed.

To completely accomplish all of these things great changes in the state, in the industries and in the organizations of labor will

be necessary.

But the matters are already within our reach and the machinery already at hand for beginning the work.

As the work proceeds all abuses will be eliminated, new tasks undertaken just as the new conditions will make new undertakings necessary and smaller successes will make possible, as well as practicable, the larger undertakings.

With the above in mind:

Every effort to extend public ownership;

Every effort to give voice and representation to the management of a publicly owned enterprise to the employes in that enterprise;

Every effort to reconstruct political party organizations in such a way as to give recognition and representation in the management of the party to the industrial or

Every such effort is a step in the process of making the actual beginning in the creation of the co-operative commonwealth.

WHY DEBS SHOULD GO TO CONGRESS

I am not a Socialist, but I would regard the election of Eugene V. Debs to Congress as one of the finest events of a life time.

There are a number of men in Congress who will fight on the right side of almost any issue, and will even fight courageously and unselfishly, if they are strongly urged. But almost without exception they have to be taught which is the right side. These men are good politicians, but poor soldiers of the common good. For it's a poor soldier that must be taught which side he is fighting for in every battle and must be driven to the front by those behind him.

With Debs in Congress, there will be at least one man who will instinctively be on the right side, and who will charge the enemy's line, even before it is formed for the battle.

You can take every event in Debs' life and analyze it as closely as you please, and you will find not only that he has never harmed a human being, even in his bitterest fights, but that throughout his whole career he has been fighting for the weak, the humble, and the oppres ed, unselfishly and devotedly.

Every man that hinks a child is worthy of more consideration than a dollar, ought to vote for Eugene V. Debs for Congress. I wish I could.

CO-PARTNERS IN CRIME.

In sentencing two strikebreakers to jail at Detroit recently Judge Connelly scored corporations for importing these men into the city. The accused were employed by the Michigan Central Railroad during its recent strike of railroad clerks. When the strike was settled they were discharged, and then they stole from the company. In sentencing them to ninety days in the house of correction, the court said:

"When a corporation brings an army of strikebreakers, many of them men with criminal records, to a city and then turns them loose and the criminals steal from the corporations, I can't see why the officials expect the court to become wrathy because of the criminals' misdeeds.

"I can't work up much enthusiasm over this case. It is simply a case where the criminal bit the hand that fed him or the biter was bitten. It is only a natural course of development. The only good thing about the matter is that the corporation is the sufferer in this case and not some innocent citizen.

The Oklahoma Earthquake

The most interesting spot on the face of the earth politically at this time is OKLAHOMA. There the sham battles between the Republican and Democratic parties are a thing of the past. It is a grim warfare now between the working class and the petty parasites and each know that it is war to the death. No quarter is asked and none given but doggedly and with the courage of desperation they fight grimly on to the final battle in November.

That the Democratic party managers see their finish is attested by the following report in the Dallas, Texas, News (Democratic) of Aug. 15, 1916:

Oklahoma Democrats See Hard Fight Ahead

Governor Declares Those Members of Party who will not Work Should Join Socialists.

Oklahoma City, Ok., Aug. 14.-The new Democratic State Central Committee met here today and organized. . .

The committee organized with the greatest possible outward show of harmony. Last night, however, there was considerable caucusing among some of the members known to be insurgent as to the present State administra-

The committee voted to hold a big State rally in Oklahoma during the State Fair at which men of national prominence will speak, resolutions indorsed the Wilson administration, Congress, the State administration and State Legislature. The Socialist "fair election bill" was denounced in the resolutions and by speakers. This bill has been initiated to be voted on at the election in November.

Two secret sessions were held to consider financing the campaign.

In his speech, Governor Williams said Democrats must go to work. "The Democrat who does not work ought to join the Socialists," he concluded. Later Campbell Russell referring to this passage in the Governor's speech said, "the Governor suggests sending some of our Democrats over to the Socialists. Do you know we've got several thousand Democrats the Socialists wouldn't have."

Senator Russell continued, "we must let the people know that through the Democratic administration and Democratic election machinery in Oklahoma, they get a square deal, and that they may now do what they want to do. Oklahoma has a problem in the Socialist that no other State has had and Oklahoma can not find the solution in any book of precedents. It must be worked out right here. One half of the entire population of Oklahoma is homeless. The question we've got to answer is asked in this rambling tenant population who are in partnership with the landlords in robbing the soil and converting the proceeds to their own uses."

Attorney General Freeling pointed to the danger that lies in the proposed Socialist election laws and urged that a fight on Socialists and Socialist measures be made vigorous and open. That the Democrats have made a mistake in not measuring swords with the Socialists is the belief of the Attorney General. J. B. A. Robertson, who was a close contestant with Governor Williams for the Democratic nomination for Governor two years ago urged that a militant effort be made all along the line this fall for democratic victory. It was patent that Judge Robertson sees a hard fight ahead for the Demo-



This showing indicates at a glance that there is something is a working-class party. It is wrong with the Socialist party and I propose in this article to point out frankly what I believe it is. We socialists, to be true to ourselves and our party, must be our own severest critics, and whatever else befalls, we must never become blind to our own faults.

First of all I want to say that with all that may be justly charged against it by its most relentless critics, I am proud of the Socialist party and its achievements, and

I have unqualified faith in its future. There has never been a time since it was first organized when it did not stand ready to help the workers in their struggles for increased wages, shorter hours, and better conditions, and it has stood by and defended even those who have maligned it. The members of the Socialist party have never stopped to ask what union a body of strikers belonged to, or if they were organized at all, the fact that they belonged to its power.

for the benefit of strikers and their clear the true socialist position of free speech and free assemblage Socialist party ever abandoned the liberation of imprisoned union men, and fought every injunction ever issued to strike down labor unions, and yet there are those who call themselves socialists, who go about charging that the Socialist party is not a socialist party. at all, but a capitalist party, and in making these lying charges. these so-called socialists simply disgust their hearers and discredit themselves.

The A. F. of L. today, as an organization, is thoroughly reactionary. It stands absolutery for capitalism and for wage-slavery. There is not so much as a hint in its declared principles or its avowed policy that the capitalist system is ever to be abolished or that wage-slavery is ever to be ended. Of course, there are thousands of members of the A. F. of L. who are socialists and industrial unionists, but they are in a hopeless minority and the policy of the organization under the Gompers machine is shaped in spite of them.

Now this attitude of the Socialist party toward the A. F. of L. and toward reactionary unionism is anti-revolutionary and a source of weakness to which can be traced the withdrawal of uncounted militant members during the last few years, and so pronounced has this attitude become that the major part of the socialist papers rarely, if ever criticise anything with the A. F. of L. brand upon it and in fact draw the line at a strike that does not have the A. F. of L. endorsement. At this very hour a terrible battle is raging on the Mesabe Range in Minnesota. Twenty thousand slaves of the iron pits are fighting for their lives under the gunman rule of the corporations in one of the most desperate industrial battles ever fought in this country. But these twenty thousand iron workers do not happen to belong to the A. F. of L. They have been denied the right to organize for years and treated like peons, and yet scarcely a socialist paper has so much as made a mention of this strike which ought to command the support of the entire socialist and labor movement and of every paper that pretends to serve the working class. Had these iron workers belonged to the A. F. of L. their strike would not have been ignored as it has been because some of them, forsooth, belong to the I. W. W., which, whatever may be said of it, is at least not an adjunct of Wall street's treacherous Civic Federation.

The German socialist party proved what becomes of a socalled socialist party without the right kind of economic organization when the test of history is applied to it. In the crucial hour when the war was declared, the four and a half millions of political socialists, instead of standing like a granite wall against war, as industrial socialists would have done, rushed pell-mell like sheep into the Kaiser's legions and became patriots of the fatherland par excellence while their great party, hailed for years by all the world, literally collapsed like a house of cards.

The future shall find no more butchered victims in ruling class wars so far as we can prevent it. are internationalists. We are not fighting for the countries owned by capitalists but we are fighting to dispossess the capitalists of all countries and to make the whole world free.

It is for the Socialist party to unite the workers of all countries with the clear, distinct and avowed purpose of fighting the capitalists of all countries and wiping their infernal system of robbery and murder and slavery from the earth.

From Committee on Industrial Relations, **Washington, D. C.**

concerning the Colorado Supreme Court's condemnation of the Rockefeller methods in Colorado, Frank P. Walsh, Chairman of the Committee on Industrial Relations, declares in a letter just sent to Mr. Rockefeller that "the total ignorance and misunderstanding which you plead, taken in connection with the abhorrent facts which the highest court in Colorado has now condemned in public to the world, are convincing proof that you should ab-dicate that 'imperial control,' as the court has characterized it, and give the workers who produce your wealth their rightful opportunities of citizenship and of self expression."

Mr. Walsh's reply letter, in full, is as follows:

July 24, 1916. Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., No. -26 Broadway, New York City.

My dear Sir:-I have received your telegram of July 14th, in reply to my letter to you of July 11th, your telegram being as

Your letter of July 11, has just been forwarded to me here, where I am spending my summer vacation and is the first word which has reached me in regard to the Supreme Court of Colorado, referred to in your letter. My office informs me that as yet they have seen only newspaper accounts of the decision, and at once took steps to ascertain the facts. Pending the receipt of this information, I can only say that any offenses, no matter by whom committed, which could have been justly characterized in such language as you have quoted, would be quite as abhorrent to me as to you, and I am confident that no such conditions as you describe could exist in the camps of the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company under the plan of representation which was adopted by joint action of the company and its employees at the time of my visit to Colorado last Fall.'

In view of your assertion of entire lack of knowledge of the decision of the Supreme Court of Colorado in the contested election cases, involving the conduct of yourself and associates in the political and industrial control of Colorado, I am taking the liberty of enclosing to you, herewith, a copy of the opinion and judgment of the court.

You will note from this opinion that the appalling arraignment of what your organization has accomplished in Colorado is taken entirely from the testimony of the general manager of your own company. What standing, there-fore, ought your so-called "industrial plan" for the operation of your mines and the control of your workers' lives, have in the estimation of the people of our · country?

Your avowal of ignorance of the fraudulent and criminal results of your mastery in Colorado does not lend hope that you and your present organization will bring about better conditions in Colorado.

HITTING THE ARMOR TRUST By Joseph E. Cohen

Time was when individual capitalists or groups of capitalists ran their business to suit themselves, so far as they could. Any talk of state or federal supervision was regarded as monstrous and the first time it was proposed that the government fix selling prices of goods, the capitalist class joined in a song of hate against us as a nation.

That was awhile ago, although not so very long in the past. But the world

has moved.

It has moved so far that we find the Bethlehem Steel Company telling the public that "we have offered for the future to accept any price which the Federal Trade Commission shall decide to be fair alike to the Government and to ourselves.'

How does this offer come to be made? Very simple. There is now a measure before congress to establish a government armor making plant, at a cost of \$11,000,000. The sudden avowal of public spirit on the part of the armor trust (one-third of which is represented by the Bethlehem Company) is to save itself from extinction.

If the government builds its plant, the armor trust will very likely go. So far as can be learned, no one outside the trust is shedding tears over such a possibility. And there is little reason why anyone should.

For the Bethlehem Company goes to some pains to show why a government plant is desirable. Not that it intends to do so. Far from it. But in sending forth its plea it convicts itself.

This is how it does it.

The company went into the armor business to supply our government. Our government is its only customer. The entire arrangement has, therefore, been the turning over of money out of the national treasury to an absolute monopoly.

In spite of the fact that it is much cheaper to make armor here than abroad for reasons that even a spokesman of the trust would not care to dispute, up to 1896, the price charged us was as high as that paid for armor in foreign countries. How did this come about?

The Senate Committee on Naval Affairs says, in a report submitted in February of this year: "There was every evidence of combination and collusion instead of competition, but no proof."

That the trust was clever enough to conceal the proof, it seems to want us to know, in telling us this fact. But why was it not clever enough to refrain from telling us at all?



We urge all well disposed men and women to help restore America to the American people, and by the American people we mean all who live and labor in America.

Admitting that she is breaking international law in more serious ways than the other belligerents, the momentous question for us, is, not to defend the rights of neutrals in general, not to insist on international law for humanitarian reasons, however high these things may be, not to break off diplomatic relations, which would probably mean war; but the question is a practical one and not theoretical, a condition and not a theory; it is, "Shall we plunge one hundred millions of people into war, for the sake of upholding international law, or for the sake of humanity, when we are not being invaded and when every nation desires to live in peace with us?" It is a questionable humanity to plunge one hundred millions of souls into war, for the sake of humanity. 4. If we can only be patient until the war is over, there will doubtless be no more great wars for years to come on account of general exhaustion, satiation of war feeling and return to sanity. War after all is only a relatively temporary duration of abnormal conditions.

5. From a purely selfish point of view, if we will only be wise enough to keep neutral, we will be called upon to supply Europe to a prodigious extent and at enormous profit and may become the commercial center of the world. What have we to gain from the war? We certainly have much to lose.

What would it avail the Irishman, if, after achieving the liberty of his country and succeeding in establishing an Irish Republic, on the following morn he had to wait on an Irish capitalist, hat in hand, and ask for a job to help maintain himself and his family in the Green Isle, that he had risked his life to free the day before.—James Connolly.



The Socialist Party Platform

of the Socialist party has been submitted by the committee and is now before the membership for a referendum of the party. Eugene V. Debs has issued the following statement of his objections to the new platform:

Every member ought to read carefully the draft of the new platform of the Socialist party recently submitted to the party membership for final ac-tion. The importance to the party and to our propoganda of a sound platform, a clear and ringing declaration of what the party stands for and what it stands against, cannot be over-

The platform now before us doubtless had the most careful thought and conscientious, attention of the committee that framed it and it is certainly well written, its propositions are clearly stated, and its indictment of capitalism and militarism strongly drawn, yet it would be expecting too much to find it free from objection.

My own objections are three in number and are herewith submitted as follows:

First, The class struggle should be more clearly and specifically stated

and more emphatically declared.

Second, The platform should declare in positive and unequivocal terms in favor of revolutionary economic organization, and state the reason for it. This omission is in my opinion, a grave defect. It has been the weakness of our party in the past and it will be still more the weakness of our party in the future. Hundreds of militant, red-blooded socialists have quit the party and their invaluable influence has been lost to us because of the party's evasive not to say cowardly, trade union attitude. We have too long feared to give offense to reactionary trade unionism, bowed to it, catered to it, and been innoculated with it, instead of maintaining inviolate our uncompromising integrity and innoculating the union movement with the virile spirit of the revolution.

If the Socialist party is a revolu-tionary party, it is in logic and in fact, bound to declare its recognition of and adherence to the revolutionary industrial union as against the reactionary craft union, and take its position accordingly. Honesty to the workers no less than party consistency demands this regardless of

that appeals to men.

The draft of the new platform working class is the foundation of the Socialist movement and without it, socialism is impossible, and this truth the Socialist party must teach to the workers and declare to the

> Third, I am opposed with every drop in my veins to the two declarations in favor of war. If these are per-mitted to stand the party might as well declare openly in favor of mil-

The first of these objectionable features is found in the words: "and the necessity of effective defense in war." Ruling class war? Of course. There is no other. And working class slaughter? Of course, and for the same reason.

The second objection appears in. the words: "except in the case of an invasion of its own territory." This is putting the party back upon the same ground it occupied in Europe when on that very account, it was swept into the hell of slaughter in which our comrades by millions are now perishing. Every nation in Europe, taking its own word for it, is fighting a war of defense and resisting invasion.

In that phrase lurks the bolt of destruction. To hell, I say, with the doctrine that would send the working class there!

What has the working class to lose by "invasion?" Its chains? Yes, and that's all and that is what it will be fighting against, the loss of its chains, when in its patriotic fervor and its fear of offending its master, it enters his war and is slaughtered to save his country from "invasion."

These two phrases embody a deadly peril to the party. They ought to be stricken out. Our declaration against war must be positive and unequivocal and our hostility to militarism absolute and uncompromising. We are not nationalists, but internationalists. Let the capitalists fight their own wars and resist their own invasion. We know but one war and that is the war of the working class against the capitalist class, the war of all the workers of the world against all the capitalists of the world.

Long enough have the workers been humbugged by capitalist wars. If the Socialist party is true to itself and the working class, it will take how many craft union leaders may be its stand staunchly in favor of the offended. We are not setting traps to class war, the only war that can put catch votes, but framing a platform an end to all war, and quite as staunchly against every war waged by the ruling The industrial organization of the class to rob and kill and enslave the

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working class.

Comrades, I appeal to you in the name of your class—the class that has always been the victims of ruling class slaughter-to strike these military declarations, capable of the most vicious interpretation and fraught with incalculable danger to the party, from the new platform!

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

We have no fixed code of morals. Our laws are made and remade from time to time and are always in favor of the affluent and the revenue of the country of a sum in privileged classes.

Ninety per cent of the inmates of penal institutions today have been found guilty of crimes against property and property holders to any extent comprise but a small percentage of our population. Laws insuring the sanctity of human life and those things which tend to preserve life and make it valuable, are deemed of secondary importance. This is so because they are made at the instigation and in the interests of the small percentage of influential property holders.

During labor disputes hundreds of lives are risked and often sacrificed in order that the dividends of the already rich may be still further increased. "The people be damned" has been the shibboleth of the privileged classes from the beginning of civilization.

The thoughtful student of the times understands that the criminality of an act does not consist in the fact of taking something for nothing, but in the manner in which it is consummated. Forge a check or steal a loaf of bread or a door mat, and you face a criminal charge; sell a corporation's worthless or watered stock and you become a valued cog in the intricate mechanism of Big Business. Hold a man up at the point of a gun and take his money away from him and you will be imprisoned as a menace to society; but get all he has accumulated for years by selling him a piece of worthless real estate through the grossest misrepresentation, and you become a successful business man, a pillar of society and a probable candidate for political and legislative honors. Fail to meet your hotel bill upon demand and you may be put into jail; avoid payment of your income tax by means of the most barefaced perjury and you receive the commendatory chuckles of your fellow capitalists.

We may say, therefore, that wrongdoing in some cases is unpunished and pardoned if committed in certain ways by the more influential members of society, and ruthlessly penalized in the case of the small and maladroit offender. If getting something for nothing were classes as crime in all cases, there would be immediate need of more and larger

> There can be no question as to which of these classes of crime are more injurious to society. During the past year alone, tax-dodgers have mulcted excess of three hundreds of millions of dollars. It is questionable whether all the thieves who have been confined in state prisons during the last ten years have stolen as much. It is not necessary to carry large sums of money on our persons so as to afford a temptation and an opportunity to highwaymen. Every large store has its detectives to prevent shop-lifting. The streets of our cities and towns are thoroughly policed to prevent the cruder forms of lawlessness. But what effective steps have been taken to protect ourselves against the wholesale swindling of our business buccaneers? captain of industry can take a good lawyer into his confidence and, through his pilotage, steer a safe course through the shoals of prohibitory laws into the clear waters of social security and affluence beyond. A real estate "shark" can make a million by ruthlessly exploiting the public; and if he be adroit, can slip freely through the meshes of the law against swindling. There are more shady and actually crooked business deals pulled off daily in the City of New York alone than would serve to fill Sing Sing prison to overflowing, if prosecuted with the vigor that obtains in the case of the little offender. And while the latter are usually the result of poverty and want, the former spring from greed for wealth and power.

Much of the crime against property which has been punished by imprisonment is directly traceable to the poverty and lack of economic fitness of the criminal. Only in exceptional instances do others than the poor and needy find their way to prison. Criminologists assure us that there is a criminal class. If this be so, its invariable and only discernible signs are poverty and want. As a matter of fact, crime is the result of conditions; and these conditions are largely based on our present economic and sociological systems. The working class lives always in want or fear of want, while the professional swindler is the result of wrong training and wrong environment. And this applies equally to the millionaire and the professional cracks-

If living conditions were equitable, prisons than we have today. Those who if every man were given the product of profit largely by legalized robbery are his own labor, crimes against property

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would be the exceptional in penal annals instead of the rule. There would no longer be the migratory hobo, the casual laborer, the multimillionaire, or the problem of the unemployed with all its concomitant evils. The relations between man and man would become more simplified and more clearly defined. The complications of our present penal codes would cease to clog our courts and befuddle our citizens. The true solution of our penal problem lies in the correction of our false social and economic standards.

Hence it would behoove the conscientious social reformer to look beyond the mere act of crime. He should cease confusing symtoms with causes and should provide himself with a working hypothesis that will include not only the petty, sordid violators of our law against property, but also the malefactors of great wealth, who are equally the victims and the parasites of our present social system.

JUDGE DENOUNCES STRIKE AGI-TATION AS ANARCHY.

The class character of our legal institutions is remarkably demonstrated by the legal aspect of the Westinghouse strike cases. The smoke had hardly cleared away from the massacre of three workingmen by Steel Trust Apaches, when that iniquitious survival of legal barbarism—the John Doe warrant,—was called into use.

Deputies armed with these blank warrants swarmed over the strike district. Everyone who had any connection with the strike was immediately arrested, regardless of their whereabouts during the alleged riots. Before a week had passed, fifty strikers were confined in jail without the formality of a preliminary hearing. Seventeen of these were charged with being accessories to the murder of their fellow workmen who were slain by the Steel Trust Welfare Department.

Then the District Attorney discovered a rule which practically doubled the amount of bail required to have the strikers released. Some of those who were charged with murder were flatly denied their constitutional right to bail. The grand jury was given special instructions. The Court in an address teeming with denuncia-tions of "anarchy" urged the grand jurors "to save a blot from being placed upon the fair (grimy) name of Alleshany County. The grand jury responded nobly with fifty indictments.

The Coroner's inquest was a farce. Without a shred of evidence the seventeen accused of murder were held to await the action of the grand jury. This obedient body thought the county officials were asking too much and promptly dismissed the indictments.

The trials followed with fourteen convictions. Some of these were paroled because the Court could not discover that they had been agitators. But eight were sentenced to terms ranging from three and one-half years down to six months according to their degree of activity in the strike. Other trials will follow in September.

An appeal has been taken to the Superior Court by those convicted. A writ of supercedeas has been granted, releasing these eight comrades from prison until the appeal is heard.

The outcome depends upon the workers of America. The character of the attorneys for the defense is a gusrantee that every available legal remedy will be used, if they are not hampered by lack of funds.
