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
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

ARE WE THIRSTING FOR SLAUGHTER?

Wall street and the ruling class in general are seeking to have it appear that we must go to war with Germany. The freedom of the seas, they tell us, has been denied us and we must therefore rush into the European war and have hundreds of thousands of human beings sacrificed to wanton slaughter.

The people of the United States and the people of Germany have not the slightest grievance against one another. Left to themselves they would be on terms of perfect amity and peace. They would not dream of flying at one another's throats and tearing at one another's vitals like wild beasts. It is not the people but the ruling class of the United States and Germany that want the war and they want it for purposes entirely their own. The people of both countries have everything to lose, including their lives, and absolutely nothing to gain by such a war.

We are opposed to plunging this nation into the European slaughter. Every workingman should cry out against this unspeakable crime.

The false cry of "patriotism" and "preparedness" and "defense of the flag" and "honor of the nation" should not deceive anyone not feeble-minded. Patriotism for their own profit is the real shibboleth of the capitalist class. They want war to serve their own ends and they declare it at their own sweet will. But they do not rush to the front themselves and have their own bodies shot into bloody tatters. They remain safely in the rear enjoying their luxuries and egging on their slaves as they slaughter one another without knowing why.

Let every workingman and every other man who abhors war and slaughter raise his voice in protest against the threatened war with Germany. There is absolutely no excuse for it. The working people will furnish the great bulk of its victims.

If the miserable pretext that is urged for hostilities is permitted to serve its satanic purpose and war is declared it will be not only the costliest war this country ever waged in respect to blood and treasure, but it will be to the eternal disgrace of the United States.

When the plutocrats who own the country are in the front ranks of the army raised to wage war it will be time enough for their wage-slaves to bring up the rear.

The patriotism of the ruling class is spelled p-r-o-f-i-t-s.

PROSPERITY AND STRIKES

It should appear curious to those who do not study economic causes and effects that the more prosperous a country is under the capitalist system the more discontented are the working-class who produce that prosperity. This is an anomaly indeed and yet to the student of economics there is nothing strange about it.

The reports of the United States Bureau of Labor show that during the first nine months of the year 1915 there were 916 strikes and lockouts and that during the first nine months of the year 1916 the number had increased to 2,584.

The prosperity of 1916, if such it can ever be truly called in the present system, was far greater than that of 1915 and in fact greater by far than ever before in the history of the country. This abnormal state of affairs was of course produced by the European war. The exports from this country to foreign markets for 1916 aggregated more than seven billion dollars, or an average of more than five hundred million dollars per month.

Of course with such enormous exports of the country's products, coupled with the monopoly control of what remains for the domestic market, the high cost of living is easily accounted for, and the high cost of living has more than absorbed the paltry increase in wages which has been granted, and as a consequence, the workers are not only not better off, but actually worse off than they were before

their wages were increased and the cost of living more than offset the increase, and hence the multiplication of strikes and lockouts in all the principal industries of the land.

In the year 1916, by far the most prosperous in the history of the country, there were nearly three times as many strikes and lockouts as there were in the preceding year of 1915, when prosperity was just getting its start and the wage increases had not yet taken place nor the cost of living mounted to the incredible altitude which it now occupies.

All of which simply means that prosperity for the working-class is a fraud, a delusion and a false pretense under the capitalist system. The real prosperity is exclusively enjoyed by the capitalist class who pocket the swelling profits while the workers continue at their slavish tasks for shelter and shoddy and provender enough to feed their labor power and keep it alive.

Socialism, the collective ownership of industry and production for the benefit of the workers will bring real prosperity to the country and bring it for all who are willing to do their share to earn it.

If the working-class refused to fight the battles of their exploiting masters not another war would ever be declared.

War is the crime of crimes and the monumental shame of civilization.

GATHERING THEM IN

A recent cable dispatch from London says:

A Reuter dispatch from Berne says the German authorities have suddenly called to the colors all officials of trade unions and socialists organizations. These officials, who aggregate 10,000 in number, have previously been exempt from military service.

The war grows more and more interesting. The trade union and Socialist officials are not to be slighted. They too, are to be given a chance to prove their patriotism by getting shot into tatters for their masters. The next in order will be the chambermaids and next the wet nurses and finally the orphans. They all have blood in their veins and they all need to be called to the colors.

Great is war. The European massacre proves it beyond doubt. Hurrah, for wholesale assassination! Hurrah, for the grand army of armless, legless, eyeless, cripples! They are all patriots and heroes—in fragments and tatters. What a glorious spectacle, and how proud we should be of it! Now turn to the numberless widows with breaking hearts and the fatherless children thrown upon the world. Glory Hallelujah! Capitalism and slaughter forever!

Kaiser William and King George still have all their fingers and toes intact. They are safe in their armored trains decorated with a basketful of hero's medals.

Let the glorious slaughter proceed while there is a patriot alive!

The workingman who rushes to the front to be butchered for the benefit of his master is a bargain counter hero—while he lasts.

Let the ruling class butchers welter in their own blood if they must have war.

A BUNDLE OF RELATIONS

Emerson says that a man is "a bundle of relations, a knot of roots, whose flower and fruitage is the world."

Every man is related to every other man on earth whether he recognizes his kinship or not. The man is wise who realizes that he is simply one of the myriad that crowd the earth and that the more nearly he can adjust himself and his relation to his fellow-

men the more he expresses of his own life and the more happiness he finds in the world.

The individual self-seeker who thinks he can lock himself up in his own little castle and shut humanity out as aliens is guilty of folly that verges on insanity. In shutting himself in he dwarfs himself to his own miserable size and although he may be richly dressed he is no longer in the "bundle of relations," the "knot of roots," and he begins to wither and perish like a tree that has been uprooted and no longer receives its nourishment from the common soil and sunshine.

Happy is the man, poor though he may be, who is race-conscious; who is wise enough to understand that his happiness is bound up in the happiness of the race and therefore consecrates himself to the common service of his fellows so completely that he utterly forgets his own petty troubles.

And such is the Socialist and hence the joy with which he serves the cause, the loyalty with which he fights for its principles, and the devotion with which he clings to its ideals.

If the most sordid plutocrat could feel for once the thrill of joy the Socialist feels in clasping hands with a comrade and in giving himself body and soul to the cause he would realize that all his private possessions in the means of life are trash so far as being fruitful of any real happiness to him is concerned, and he would no longer wonder why Socialists feel themselves infinitely more richly rewarded for the service they render their cause than the exploiters possibly can in harvesting the dollars that are drained from the veins of their hapless victims.

The capture of Villa, "dead or alive" has cost the United States government to date \$162,418,000.00, enough to build comfortable homes for the families of 162,418 workingmen. This is capitalism's style of statesmanship, "defense of the flag and the national honor," and keeping the nation out of war. Villa is still doing business at the old stand.

MOONEY'S OUTRAGEOUS CONVICTION

The capitalist jury in San Francisco brought in the verdict expected of it in the case of Thomas J. Mooney, who was falsely charged with having been responsible for the bomb explosion in the preparedness parade in that city last summer.

The prosecution, backed by the manufacturers and big business men, succeeded in convicting Mooney upon false and trumped-up charges and sentencing him to prison for life. The conviction and sentence are infamous beyond expression. Every fair-minded person who attended the trial is convinced of the absolute innocence of Mooney and his indicted associates, which include his wife.

The truth is that Mooney and his wife and comrades have been active, offensively active in fighting the battles of the working-class on the Pacific coast. They were not of the pure and simple craft union species, but real unionists who stood for the industrial organization of the workers, and they have long been a thorn in the flesh of the capitalist union-wreckers in California.

For this reason and no other they were marked for vengeance and the explosion of the bomb in the preparedness parade was the signal for their arrest and for lining up the filthy prostitutes of alleged witnesses to swear them into life sentences in prison.

At this writing a motion is pending for a new trial. This may or may not be granted. Probably not. We have absolutely no faith in capitalist courts. We know how they are ruled, how they are controlled, and to what end. For cold-blooded justice, for sheer infamy, and for downright prostitution to the basest ends commend us to the courts of capitalism. We know them.

But whether a new trial is granted or not we must stand by Tom Mooney and his brave wife and their comrades. They have stood staunchly for the working class and we can do no less than to stand by them to the last. Their conviction is an outrage that should make the blood boil in every workingman's veins. It is a pity, yes, a thousand pities, that the labor movement does not realize that this conviction is a deadly attack upon itself.

Funds, more funds are urgently needed in this case. Let everyone help according to his means and be prompt about it. Take time enough and be true enough to yourself to do your part. Margaret Sanger is a heroine. All honor to her. She has fought the fight without flickering. The hounds have been on her track. They have torn and rent her flesh, but they have not chilled her heart or cowed her soul. She is facing the enemy squarely and fighting with the courage of a crusader and the faith of a martyr. She knows she is right and in good time the world that now ignores or hates her will honor her as a benefactor of her sex and the race.

TO THE AMERICAN PEOPLE:

By a mere executive decree, the president of our country has broken off diplomatic relations with the German empire, and placed the people of the United States in imminent danger of being actively drawn into the mad war of Europe.

During the last thirty months, the blackest months in the annals of human history, six million innocent men have been brutally killed, and many more millions have been crippled and maimed for life. Whole countries have been devastated and the accumulated treasures of human industry and nature's generosity have been ruthlessly destroyed.

Europe is a dread house of mourning in which disconsolate sobs of the widows and orphans at home mingle with the agonized groans of the wounded and dying on the battlefields.

In this savage carnival of wholesale and indiscriminate murder, there was but one powerful member of the family of nations that preserved an attitude of comparative sanity—the United States of America. Removed by the vast stretch of the Atlantic ocean from the scene of the inhuman conflict, safe in our economic self-sufficiency and proud of our advanced and democratic institutions, we watched the self-destruction of our European brothers with bleeding hearts, eagerly waiting for the opportunity to bring them back to reason and peace, to life and happiness.

And, suddenly, with little notice or warning, without the sanction or consent of the people and without consultation with the people's chosen representatives in Congress, we are practically ordered to join the mad dance of death and destruction and to swell the ghastly river of blood in Europe with the blood of thousands of American workers.

The Socialist party of the United States, speaking in behalf of thousands of its adherents, and in behalf of the working class of the country, enters a solemn protest against this wanton attempt to draw us into the European conflict.

We are opposed to wars between nations, because war is a reversion to brutal barbarism. We are opposed to the present threatened war in particular, because no great war has ever been waged with less justification and on more frivolous pretexts.

The policy of unrestricted and indiscriminate submarine warfare recently announced by the German government is most ruthless and inhuman, but so is war as a whole and so are all methods applied by both sides. War is murder. War is the climax of utter lawlessness, and it is idle to prate about lawful or lawless methods of warfare.

The German submarine warfare does not threaten our national integrity or independence, not even our national dignity and honor. It was not aimed primarily at the United States and would not affect the American people. It would strike only those parasitic classes that have been making huge profits by manufacturing instruments of death or by taking away our food and selling it at exorbitant prices to the fighting armies of Europe.

The workers of the United States have no reason and no desire to shed their blood for the protection and furtherance of the unholy profits of their masters, and will not permit a lying and venal press to stampede them into taking up arms to murder their brothers in Europe.

The six million men whose corpses are now rotting upon the battlefields of Europe were mostly workingmen. If the United States is drawn into war, it will be the American workers whose lives will be sacrificed—an inglorious, senseless sacrifice on the altar of capitalist greed.

Workers of America, awaken! The hour is grave; the danger is imminent; silence would be fatal! Gather the masses in meetings and demonstrations. Speak in unmistakable tones. Let your determined protest resound from one end of the country to the other!

Send telegrams or letters to President Wilson, to the United States senators and congressmen. Demand that American citizens and American ships be forbidden to enter the war zone, except at their own risk. Insist that the nation shall not be plunged into war for the benefit of plundering capitalists.

Down with war! Down with the inhuman social system that breeds war! Long live peace! Long live the international solidarity of the workers of all nations!

We mothers of the working-class have no "honor" to protect. Our honor was taken from us when we were denied a voice in the control of our nation. What honor do women possess worth fighting for when you gentlemen brand us as being lower

than the drunkard, lower than white slave, lower than the illiterate negro, and the most ignorant and depraved of men?

The mothers of the working-class have no ships at sea. True our sons have built every ship that floats, and guides them on their voyages, but you gentlemen own them. Why should a wage slave fight for his master's ship?

The mothers of the working-class have no commerce that they wish to send through the blockade. Hunger and privation have dogged the steps of our children all these cursed years that you gentlemen have fattened on the profits of war. We have no ammunition to send to murder our brothers and sisters in Europe. We don't want them murdered! They are of our blood, they are our comrades in the struggle for human liberty. We long to send them peace to replace your cursed profit-mongering war. If you want your ammunition to murder our brothers and sisters to add to your profits, GO TAKE IT TO EUROPE YOURSELVES.

If you gentlemen of the rose-leaf honor and the elephant-hide wallets, want war, GO FIGHT IT. You have a perfect right to go to war if you see fit. BUT SO HELP US GOD, YOU SHALL NOT SEND OUR SONS TO DO THE FIGHTING.

Dare to be a Coward!

Wendell Phillips said at the time the United States government was in control of chattel slavery that he wanted two words inscribed upon his tomb as his epitaph. These two words were "traitor" and "infidel"—traitor to a government which protected human slavery and infidel to a church which sanctioned the crime.

It sometimes happens that the "traitor" is the true patriot and the "infidel" the man of real faith.

It happens also that the popular "hero" is sometimes a coward while the despised "coward" is the real hero.

There are times when it requires courage amounting to heroism to be a coward. The present critical period when this country is about to be engulfed in war by the capitalist class is such a time. For months the big interests that rule this nation, for reasons perfectly obvious to all but the stone-blind, have been intent upon dumping this nation into the European slaughter pit or at least bringing it to the verge of the abyss. The attempt to force a war upon Mexico for the benefit of Wall street, which is mainly responsible for the uprising and continuous turmoil there, proved a fiasco, notwithstanding it cost the government the enormous sum of \$162,418,000. Another effort must be made to put over the "preparedness" program with its billions of outlay to militarize and terrorize the people, and now it is Germany with which the United States must go to war. At this writing a state of war already exists and all that is lacking is the formal declaration by congress which is expected to follow the first "overt" act committed in the submarine warfare.

The one outstanding fact of the situation is that the people of the United States do not want war with the German people, do not wish to murder them, and that the people of Germany do not want war, do not wish to kill the people of the United States. But the people, the MERE PEOPLE are not consulted. They have no voice, nothing to say. They have only to pay in blood and treasure, foot the bill to the last drop and the last farthing.

For months the big interests have been conducting an "educational" campaign, lavishly financed, whose ostensible object has been to inspire the people with "patriotism" but whose real purpose is to prepare the common herd for slaughter. In this infamous conspiracy against peace and all things of good report the press has been the harlot-in-chief. With but few exceptions,

and these of little influence, the capitalist papers and magazines have filled the air with the cry of "Wolf" and made the most frenzied appeal for "preparedness" against foreign invasion. The pulpit has almost unanimously echoed the cry and the appeal. The subserviency of press and pulpit to the ruling class is quite as flagrant and despicable today as it was a few decades ago to the power of chattel slavery which then ruled the land.

The schools have also been prostituted in this insidious campaign to make murderers of school children and turn what is left of this republic into a military despotism. School board after school board is echoing the demand of the plutocrats to enforce military training in our public schools and to convert what should be our educational institutions into soldiers' barracks and recruiting grounds for the grand army of capitalism's hired killers.

The church too has been seized with the same spasm of "patriotism," a fact not at all strange in the light of history and of the plain fact that the church, as a rule, has always been on the side of the exploiters and oppressors, the class in power. Preachers without number are shouting for "preparedness"; trustees and deacons and elders are vouching for the "patriotism" of their "flock," and even the teachers of Sunday schools are rising to pledge the loyalty of their innocent wards to the lords of war and murder.

Oh, what a spectacle, what a shameless, sordid, soulless, ghastly spectacle is here seen in all its naked horror and repulsiveness!

In this nation-wide campaign of mis-education "preparedness" is the slogan of the pirates of Wall street and elsewhere who are as destitute of genuine patriotism as sharks are of mercy for their victims. "Preparedness" of the capitalistic brand is a sham, a delusion, a fraud and humbug, deserving only the scorn of men who have sense enough to see through the flimsy game and manhood enough to denounce its infamy.

By all the subtle and satanic means conceivable this insidious and treacherous campaign for "preparedness" has been waged. In theatres and picture shows and other places of amusement hints and suggestions appear in the program, winding up with the display of "old glory" all tending to inculcate a false and vicious patriotism, to arouse the killing instincts of the people, and incidentally to arm the nation to the teeth for the destruc-

tion of the people's liberties. It is not amusing but disgusting almost nauseating, to sit at a picture show and witness the ghastly attempts at applause led by shallow-pated clacquers when a cheap hero or some other shoddy imitation of "patriotism" is thrown upon the screen. The ignorance thus on exhibition, steeped-up and impenetrable, is enough to move the most optimistic to tears of despair.

The break with Germany is a God-send to Wall street and the big interests that own the country and control the government. They are now able to put over their program with perfect ease. Congress is tumbling all over itself voting the hundreds of millions to fasten the great standing army on the country and provide the capitalists with the kind of a navy they have long wanted to back up their imperialism and their conquest of the world's markets.

And mind you, dear reader, when they have that army organized up to its war strength it will never be reduced. That army is coming to stay and if the workers, especially those who voted the present administration into power, have any doubt about it that doubt will be dispelled at some future day when "prosperity" has taken flight and they are out on a hunger strike.

There is absolutely no reason, no excuse for plunging this country into the European hell of slaughter. To do so would be nothing less than a monstrous crime against the American people.

There may be only a few of us sane people compared to the "patriots" that have been wrought into frenzy for war to "defend the flag and the honor of the nation," but we have our convictions and we will speak out and hold our ground or perish where we stand.

If there is a fraud behind which slimy hypocrisy has hidden, lo, these many years, it is the fraud that masquerades as "the defense of the flag and the honor of the nation." The politician screams it as if he meant it and every penny-a-liner, every sycophant and time-server takes up the cry.

We are told that it is our solemn duty to protect our citizens at home, on the high seas, and abroad. Well, we know how we protect them at home where more than half a million of them are slaughtered or maimed in industry every year and millions of others are on the ragged edge of starvation. As to the citizens on the high seas and those hobnobbing with the parasites of Europe and luxuriating in the proceeds wrung from the sweat of



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
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
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
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the slaves at home, we are not particularly interested in providing special protection for their benefit. They are not of the working-class. The latter are in the pits and hell-holes of industry slaving their lives away. They never get to the high seas nor, do they visit the art galleries of Europe. They work and support the nation, including its gilded parasites, yet the capitalist congress does not worry itself about their "defense" in the slightest degree. All its concern is about the "better class" who do not have to work but put in their time skylarking about with the parasites of other lands. For the "protection" of these worthies the government is ready to declare war in an instant and shed the blood of hundreds of thousands who are never permitted to enjoy the luxuries of travel. But it is not at all strange that the government is so sensitive about those "abroad" for they are of the class that own the country and of course the government is but the instrument of their power, their rule, and their convenience.

The capitalist class and their fawning henchmen are attempting to show that we are bound to go to war with Germany on account of Germany's ruthless submarine warfare. They lie. We are bound to do nothing of the kind. Germany's submarine warfare is without doubt perfectly infamous, but it is not directed at this country. It is aimed at the countries it is fighting, and its war zone is about as well justified as is the blockade of its ports by Great Britain. It is a game of desperation and starvation in which the United States has no part. Let American ships keep out of the war zone or if they enter there with full knowledge of the risk they are taking let them bear the consequences. Again we speak from the point of view of the working-class. The workingmen who will be called upon to be maimed and murdered if war is declared are not riding in these ships; the war will never be declared on their account but on account of the master class and then they will have the privilege of being riddled and torn with shrapnel and slugs that their

masters may defiantly sail into the war zones of the belligerent nations.

What on earth have the American people, the people we mean, the working people, to gain in a war with Germany? What have the people of Germany to gain in a war with the United States? Nothing, absolutely nothing. But they have everything to lose, including their lives. They may have their arms shot off, their legs torn from their bodies, their eyes gouged out, their brains blown into froth, and if anything is left of them they may limp back with it and beg their masters for a job or a hand-out, and while they are waiting they may meditate upon their "patriotism" in having "defended the flag and honor of the nation" and "protected its citizens at home and abroad."

NOW IS THE TIME TO DARE TO BE A COWARD. In this hour of made-to-order "patriotism" that is sweeping over the land like a whirlwind, the real man, the true patriot though he stand alone, will assert himself. He is too cowardly to be a hired "hero," too cowardly to be a parrot "patriot," too cowardly to be a murderer, to kill his fellow-worker or be killed by him for the benefit of the class that robs them both and holds them both in contempt.

In the name of all that is fit to be called civilization and all that may justly pass for humanity we protest against this nation being flung into the fangs of the mad-dogs of Europe.

If the capitalists and exploiters, the profit-mongers of this system in their mad cry for war are patriots then by all the gods we are traitors and proud of it, and if their hirelings are heroes we are cowards, and for the same reason.

Have you observed what "honors" are shown to the "returning heroes" from the Mexican border? The city to which they return is invariably ablaze with flags and decorations. The "business interests" are all stirred up, boards of trade and chambers of commerce are especially active, and the "leading citizens" all subscribe liberally to hire columbian orators, brass bands, etc., etc., to give a royal welcome to the "returning heroes." Most of the preachers chip in to tell the soldier boys how glorious it is to be a murderer for the love of country and the glory of God.

Is it possible that you are so blind that you cannot see through this shameless confidence game? Do you ever see these capitalists and business men and "leading citizens" associate with these cheap soldiers in ordinary times? Do you ever see them together

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at the club of the capitalist or the cheap saloon and brothel patronized by the soldier? Never! Then why have these capitalists such a consuming love for these fifteen-dollars a-month soldiers, and such a passion to publicly honor and glorify them as heroes? Can't you guess? You certainly can unless you are mentally very feeble.

Woodrow Wilson, our present president, inadvertently let the cat out of the bag when he was urging capitalists and business men to help get the soldiers to Mexico at the time of the Mexican crisis. He told these capitalists and business men in plain terms, though he said more than he meant at the time, that the soldiers were going to the front for no other purpose than to fight and die for the interests of these same capitalists and business men. President Wilson put the whole matter of soldiering and war and murder and savagery and hell in a nutshell. Soldiers are the hired killers of the master class, the menial defenders of the business interests.

We Socialists are not deceived for we are not blind and deaf and dumb. We have not been studying the capitalist system nor watching the maneuverings of the capitalist class these many years in vain. We know by whom war is declared, by whom the battles are fought, and what for; we also know who are the rich beneficiaries who declare war, but do not go to battle and the poor victims who do not declare war, but do go to battle.

We are they who dare to be cowards when heroism is cheapened and prostituted to hellish ends. We stand uncompromisingly opposed to all capitalist wars of exploitation and conquest.

We are of the working-class and we are the comrades of the working-class of every other nation on earth. We have no country to invade and our honor needs no murder and no bloodshed to defend it.

No nation worthy the name can be insulted other than by itself. Nor can any nation be dishonored except by its own betrayal of the principles of right and justice.

We are keenly alive to the need of preparedness, but our kind of preparedness is the opposite of that proposed by the exploiting ruling class. Robbery at home and abroad stands in crying need of capitalist

preparedness. Without such preparedness the interests of the robbers would be in jeopardy. The system that is corner-stoned in robbery needs must have force and murder to sustain it. Robbery of the people and an army of soldiers to "preserve the peace" and "defend the flag and the honor of the nation" go hand in hand. Exploitation of the mass wherever it exists is sustained and supported by armed murderers. Exploitation, robbery, could not exist without armed force to protect its beneficiaries and keep their victims in subjection. That is why capitalism inevitably means war. To abolish capitalism is to remove the cause of war and put an end to war forever.

We of the working-class stand staunchly for the preparedness that consists of the education and organization of our class, for the development of its economic and political power, and the use of that power for the overthrow of capitalism and wage-slavery, for the emancipation of the workers of the world, for the ending of war, for the inauguration of peace, and for the civilization of all humanity and the brotherhood of all the race.



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

Block Their Little Game

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—Every reactionary in the East who was yelling for "preparedness" a year ago is now hysterically crying for a declaration of war against Germany. Newspapers that warned against a "defenseless" condition are now printing long editorials in favor of an immediate alliance with England and Holy Russia to crush the Teutons. Munition manufacturers, Wall Street financiers, big merchants and lawyers and preachers controlled by the influences of war profits pressed from the very heart's blood of the youth of Europe, are bullying, intriguing, preaching and manipulating public opinion toward this one hellish end—war.

To the American citizen living far from New York and from the national capital it is difficult to conceive of the pressure that is being brought to bear upon everyone in official life in Washington to advance the war propaganda. It is a pressure that finds its way through professional, business, social, educational and religious channels. It is bluntly expressed in the speeches of government officials. It is whispered in reception halls and at the theatre, it dictates the music at fashionable concerts, it insinuates itself into the farm bulletins, the labor reports, the trade union meetings, the mercantile advertisements and the public prayers of the clergy. Of course it poisons the headlines, molds the phrases and designs the policy of the four daily newspapers in Washington and the chief newspapers of Eastern cities that are read here.

Congressman Callaway of Texas, startled the House some days ago by putting into the Congressional Record, pages 3320-3321, the following quoted statement:

"In March, 1915, the J. P. Morgan interests, the steel, ship-building and powder interests and their subsidiary organizations, got together 12 men high up in the newspaper world and employed them to select the most influential newspapers in the United States and sufficient number of them to control generally the policy of the daily press of the United States.

"These 12 men worked the problem out by selecting 179 newspapers, and then began by an elimination process to retain only those necessary for the purpose of controlling the general policy of the daily press throughout the country. They found it was only necessary to purchase the control of 25 of the greatest papers. The 25 papers were agreed upon; emissaries were sent to purchase the policy, national and international, of these papers; an agreement was reached; the policy of the papers was bought, to be paid for by the month; an editor was furnished for each paper to properly supervise and edit information regarding the questions of preparedness, militarism, financial policies and other things of a national and international nature considered vital to the interests of the purchasers.

"This contract is in existence at the present time, and it accounts for the news columns of the daily press of the country being filled with all sorts of preparedness arguments and misrepresentations as to the present condition of the United States army and navy, and the possibility and probability of the United States being attacked by foreign foes.

"This policy included also the suppression of everything in opposition to the wishes of the interests served. The effectiveness of this scheme has been conclusively demonstrated by the character of stuff carried in the daily press of the country since March, 1915. They have resorted to anything necessary to commercialize public sentiment and sandbag the National Congress into making extravagant and

wasteful appropriations for the army and navy under the false pretense that it was necessary. Their stock argument is that it is 'patriotism.' They are playing on every prejudice and passion of the American people."

Details are unimportant, as to the actual steps taken by the financial rulers of the United States to control the press in a definite campaign first to bring about huge expenditures for militarism and then to drag the nation into the European war for the profit of these Wall street gamblers. The fact is that Congress was last year driven to appropriate \$660,000,000 for the army, the navy and the coast fortifications. The fact is that the same influences, precisely, that achieved this result are today being desperately applied to make the American nation believe that it must share in the murder of Teutons in order to save its own "honor." The fact is that the oligarchy of millionaires who have feasted most heavily at the carrion-board of Europe will have the greatest profit from the plunging of America into wholesale bloodshed, if they succeed in their plot.

Here are some developments in the war propaganda in the national capital thus far.

A "news censor," installed at the War Department, is devoting much of his time to inducing the newspaper reporters to write in favor of universal compulsory military training.

The General Staff of the army has

drafted a bill which calls for the drafting of every boy, at 19 years of age, into six months' military service, under pretense that this is "training." A similar bill has been favorably reported from the Senate Committee on Military Affairs.

While the appropriation of \$660,000,000 for "preparedness" last year was considered to be far beyond any total for military and naval expenditures to be asked in future, it is now certain that the appropriation for war preparations this year will be near \$800,000,000. The naval appropriation bill as it passed the House called for \$368,000,000, the fortifications bill added \$60,000,000, and the army appropriation bill, reported from the House Committee at \$247,000,000, will probably be near \$375,000,000 when it goes to the President. Between the time of report to the House and final passage by Congress last year, the army appropriation was increased by \$110,000,000.


Petitions and remonstrances against war, sent to members by their constituents, are in many cases being suppressed. One congressman has received a hundred such protests against the proposed declaration of war against Germany, and has refused to file any of them with Congress. The right of petition, unless backed up by personal appearance in Washington, has been largely ignored through the influence of the insidious war-lobby.

A trainload of members of the Emergency Peace Foundation, four-fifths of them Socialists, came to Washington from New York and other cities on Feb. 12, and presented resolutions of protest against war with any European power, at the capitol and at the White House. The "kept" press attempted to ignore their coming, and various jingo politicians in Congress sneered at them. Two local papers published editorials ridiculing the idea that the opponents of war had a right to a respectful hearing from their public servants.

A German newspaper correspondent sent to Germany a dispatch which led to the offer of the German government, on Feb. 10, to talk over its dispute with the United States with a view to avoiding war. This correspondent was at once forbidden the right of the press to interview the Secretary of State, and was given a safe-conduct back to Germany. The war party at once raised a loud cry that it was "criminal" for this man to inform the German people that a large part of the American public is today opposed to war.

Seventeen bills aimed at restricting civil liberty in this country, under pretense of safeguarding the nation against spies and other enemies, have been combined into one blanket bill, and reported favorably from a Senate committee. Under one clause of this bill any person who shall in time of war or military emergency collect or convey information regarding almost any subject connected with the number, location or "condition" of the national forces, or of the resources at their disposal, may be punished at the discretion of the President. Three years' imprisonment and \$10,000 fine are the penalties laid down for violation of whatever rules the President may announce, as to what shall be said or printed regarding these matters. The bill virtually appoints the President as absolute dictator of the nation, and empowers him to punish anyone who may say anything of which he may disapprove.

A bill providing for seizure of factories and ship-yards, and for conscription of the workers in these plants, in time of military emergency, and for the waiving of the eight-hour laws and other industrial safeguards, and actually forbidding the suggestion or encouragement of the quitting of work by any employe on government work, whether in a contract or a government shop, was drafted in the Attorney General's office and sent to Congress, on the day following the dismissal of the German ambassador.

Through the energetic efforts of agents of the International Association of Machinists this bill was cut to pieces, and the anti-strike, eight-hour waiver and conscription features were taken out.

Senator Culberson of Texas has introduced one of the most dangerous of the brood of war-bills aimed at the working-class. He proposes that anyone who shall attempt to interfere with the "transportation" of goods intended for foreign shipment shall be punishable under the criminal statutes. The railroad employes see in this a direct threat at their right to strike. They are watching to see this scheme pro-

posed as a "rider" to some other measure which may be sneaked through the Senate and House in the crowded final days of the session.

More important than anything else to be done at this crisis is to impress upon the President and members of House and Senate the fact that the American public is not owned by the Wall Street war-traffickers. Letters should be written to every Southern and Western public official in Washington, quickly, demanding a referendum on the question of our going to war. Petitions should be circulated everywhere, to the same end. Mass meetings should be held, and telegrams

sent by such meetings to Senators especially. A word now will be worth more than hours and weeks of regret in the event that the war party does bring the country under military rule.

Make no mistake—vast sums are being spent in the United States today to get the coveted declaration of war. This money is being invested by the hardest-fisted and most coldly calculating magnates of the financial world. Democratic forms of government are always dangerous to privilege. The American people are becoming more restive each year under capitalist rule. Just as the kaiser was compelled to make war or see Germany captured by the Socialists, so Wall Street must make war and establish for a time the rule of militarism or it will see industrial democracy entrenched and advancing to imperil its domination. Capitalism wants war, for the self-preservation of the capitalists. This is the confession made by the owner of one of the biggest New York newspapers within the past week. It is the confession of the brutally frank among the military men in Washington. It is the confession of the Roots, the Penroses, the Underwoods and their kind, by every appeal they make for "national" defense.

If America is to be saved from these war-plotters, there must be voiced the protest of the toilers everywhere, and this protest must be kept up until the danger is fully past. Washington is besieged today by an army of foes of democracy. You can do your bit for democracy's defense.





The ones that have been idolized as though surpassing great— What are they worth—what glory marks these lauded lords of state? What of the empires that are built on beds of dead men's bones— What of the piles of princely pomp—the palaces and thrones— What of the plunderers' proud power, and all their blood-bought things— The curse and infamy of war—the pageantry of kings?

Such stuff as this is worthless trash to build a better world— Far wiser that from every throne the last damned king were hurled. With none to blow the bugle blast to call the dogs of war, Who, then, would march to murder those they never met before? And all the retinue of priests, that say their God ordains The crown that rests upon the brow of every brute that reigns— Let these go, too, and take their myths, their goblins and their hell, And give this tortured world of ours a longed for breathing spell!

One peasant lad that plows the field where grows the golden corn, Is nobler breed than all the whelps that wolves of war have borne; One song sung by some genial soul, along some sheltered glade, Shall hush some day the savage shock that madmen's guns have made; One gleam of love that suckling babe in mother's eyes beheld, Shall silence all the threats of doom that insane priests have yelled; One word of brotherhood and peace—one breath from fragrant flowers— These be the only things of worth, in this old world of ours!

Speeches by Senators Works and Lane

SENATOR WORKS

Any American citizen who would go to Europe and walk down between the trenches where they were firing at one another with their machine guns would be an ass, and would deserve to get just what he would get. I would not fight for him. No, I would not take any chance of being shot for him. That kind of a citizen is of no value or credit to us; that is, he puts this Nation in peril and does not bring anything of value in return to this country after having been nurtured in it to the age of maturity, an age when he ought in ordinary decency to help keep out of trouble by using a reasonable amount of common sense. So I would say to him when he starts for the war zone: "My dear brother, we bid you farewell; you may go there if you want; you can tramp up and down all your life between the firing lines; but I do not assume any responsibility for your happiness or good health. It is right up to you."

After a nation has fought bravely and well as have the others and for what it considers to be as just a cause and for as high ideals as its enemies, and it should come and say to me that there is a certain zone about my enemies' country inside of which no ship will be permitted to pass with ammunition or food, I would say to him: "Very well, that suits me first-rate. I live more than 3,000 miles away from you and our people at home need all the food we have and more than they get and it looks like we might need our ammunition after a while in order to rehabilitate ourselves from a peace footing to one of reasonable war preparation in the event that some other nation may come to dislike us. It is up to you gentlemen. I will keep my ships at home."

There is many a family in this country today, gentlemen, who under the high cost of living, due in part to the war, are not getting quite enough to eat. Right here within five blocks of this building where I am talking, or not to exceed ten squares, and all over the country there are families that are cutting down on their food supply for lack of money with which to pay for it. Our first duty is to them. Prices of food have gone up so high that no more can they eat the amount which is necessary for their proper nourishment. They are also going short of clothing and shoes, both of kind and

quality, and children begin to suffer here at home, all due in a degree and indirectly to this great and unfortunate conflict which is going on upon the other side of the ocean, and I have no heart in it or for it.

I would say to the people of this country or to the gentlemen who want to ship merchandise or other articles of value for profit for the support of these other people, that our people also need them, and it may be that they need them as badly as do the people over there. In England the price of bread is said to be cheaper than it is in this country for the reason that they have cheaper wheat than we have, because they bought it from us when the market was lower. Our first duty lies here; and our people both need and want bread. They are our people, and they are those of our people who will have to fight if we become entangled in your embroilment. Our first duty is to them.

I would say to those who want to go across the dead line, where there are submarines or Zeppelins that drop bombs, "Go, and God go with you; but go at your own risk. I will not fight to save the merchandise of any such American citizens as you are. Go and get killed if you want to, but we, the people, will not fight for you, or the like of you, or for your cargoes of war supplies."

SENATOR LANE

Can we in the years to come satisfy our own consciences that by such a course we, as the responsible representatives of this country, are serving the best interests of the peace-loving people of a free Republic or of humanity?

The President has made the first fatal move. The next step that will plunge our people into a bloody conflict, if taken, must be ours. Congress alone has the power under our Government to declare war. So, if we go to war with Germany, it will be our act and we alone will be responsible for the consequences. The President has been applauded for making this first move toward war. Doubtless thousands of American people, little compre-

"The Morning After"

hending what must follow, would applaud Congress if it should at once declare war against Germany. The public mind has been prepared for such a mad course by the unseemly and unpatriotic propaganda in favor of preparedness for war. The war spirit, the desire for conflict, have been insidiously instilled into the minds of our people by this selfish agitation in favor of preparedness for the shredding of human blood. Preparedness for war has been established in the minds of the people without the physical means of making that condition of mental preparedness effective. The minds of the people were made ready to accept and applaud an act that means war. The act of the President that is expected to lead to this result has been accepted by the public mind thus falsely educated and inspired. Mentally the good, peace loving people of the Nation have by this means been led astray from the paths of peace and made ready to accept the prospect of physical warfare with rejoicing. The act of the President to such a distorted mind is accepted as courageous, even heroic. And, Mr. President, this is looked upon in this time, when most of the world is convulsed with war, as an act of patriotism.

Now, Mr. President, let us stop a moment to look this appalling situation squarely in the face, consider whether we are leading this Nation and why, and ask ourselves whether or not we are justified in the course so far entered upon and in carrying it out to its legitimate and fearful consequences. Now is the time to take counsel with ourselves and our consciences. Very soon it may be too late. War once entered upon, however much we may desire it, we cannot draw back. The Nation once at war must and will receive our earnest, loyal and undivided support. Have we the moral courage to do the things now that will avoid the war? To avoid it now may call for a higher degree of courage and real and unalloyed patriotism than to enter upon it or even pursue it to the end. If ever true and unselfish patriotism and the highest standard of moral courage, courage far more important and often more difficult than mere physical courage, on the part of public officials was called for, it is now. If we fail now the blood of millions of people may be on our hands.

But, sir, let me go a little further and ask whether we would be justified in plunging our Nation into this great war because our rights on the sea are being violated by Germany as a war measure. Of course, the President was right in his position that Germany could not, in a legal sense, be excused for violating our rights because some other Nation was violating Germany's rights, as well as our own, in the same way. I am not discussing the question on the basis of legal or international right. Everybody knows that the rules of international law cannot stand in case of actual war between nations. They never have and they never will. The German government has declared a danger zone about its enemies and given notice that any vessel found in that zone, with certain exceptions, will be sunk. What should be our chance under such conditions? I say to keep our ships and our people out of this danger zone until the war is over or the embargo removed. Oh, but my belligerent but well meaning friends say this would be cowardly and beneath the dignity of a great Nation or one of its citizens. May God protect this Nation from that kind of courage. To avoid the horrors of war this act of prudence on the part of our Government would be a great act of moral courage by a great country that should be a worthy and patriotic example to all the Nations of the world.

I insist that neither a private citizen nor the President nor the Congress of the United States can be justified in driving this Nation into war or endangering its peace by any such false

sense of courage or national prestige or dignity.

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



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The Nation's Honor

By Herbert S. Bigelow.

Is President Wilson right in the submarine controversy? If so, is it an issue which justifies a declaration of war? Both questions will be vehemently affirmed by Pro-Allies sympathizers, and denied by the Pro-Germans.

We shall try to answer the question as a Pro-American. England has established a blockade of German ports. She is using regular battleships. She is conducting the blockade according to the rules of international law. These rules were made with a view to the use of battleships.

Germany seeks to establish a blockade of English ports. Her only available weapon is the submarine. But a submarine blockade is a new thing and it cannot be conducted according to the rules of a battleship blockade.

Question? Has Germany a right to modify the rules so as to permit an effective use of her submarines? Is it reasonable for us to ignore the fact that in submarine warfare the old rules are obsolete? Is it just for us under the circumstances, to hold Germany to the letter of the law?

If an American ship were caught running the English blockade it would be ordered to stop. If it did not obey the order it would be sunk, crew and all. If it did stop it would have to be conducted to port, or if sunk, the crew would first have to be removed to a place of safety. This is international law and England can keep the law because she uses battleships.

To insist that Germany keep the letter of this law is to insist that she refrain from using her only available sea weapon. A submarine cannot come up to and notify an armed merchantman, nor conduct a merchantman to port, nor give refuge to the crew. Germany, therefore, says: "We cannot keep the letter of the law, but we keep the spirit of the law. We cannot warn the merchantman, at the time of the encounter, but we warn them in advance that our submarines have established a blockade of English ports. The world should be satisfied with this warning since it is all we can give." If a merchantman, ignoring the warning deliberately enters the submarine zones, and is sunk, is not its case parallel to that of a merchantman which ignores the order of a battleship and is sunk?

The distinction between the two cases is shadowy. A nation fighting against starvation can hardly be expected to make such fine distinctions. If it became necessary for England in order to save herself from starvation, to use her submarines in this way, would she not do it? If we were in like circumstances would we not do it? Suppose England were to war with us. Suppose she had sunk our navy and blockaded our ports. Suppose as a consequence we were slowly and surely starving to death. Now suppose Germany were our ally, that Germany with her submarines could starve England before England could starve us, and by accepting this help, we could achieve victory and save ourselves from destruction? Would we do it?

The question answers itself.

"But Germany started the war. We ought to have declared war on her when she invaded Belgium. If we can trip her up now with a technicality, we are delighted to do it." This is what many men are saying in their hearts. This attitude is understandable. But it is not a neutral attitude.

We assume that Germany's course is one to which she is driven by the exigencies of war. It is not an act of hostility toward us. It would seem to be our duty to accommodate ourselves to this inconvenience as we accommodate ourselves to all the other inconveniences of the war. Of course war is an international nuisance,

which outrages the rights of all neutrals. If we were to declare war on war; if we were to dismiss all of the ambassadors and close our ports to all belligerents that would be neutral enough. But in this case our neutrality seems to have been choked with technicalities.

The whole trouble began when, in opposition to Mr. Bryan, the President took his first stand on the submarine issue. Having taken this stand the honor of the nation is supposed to be involved.

While we believe that the President, in a most perplexing situation, has tried to do the best thing, we do not believe that the issue is one which justifies a declaration of war.

We hope that Germany will answer, not by sinking our ships, but by stating to the President, frankly, her peace terms, as the President requested.

With these terms the President might well say to the Allies:

"If you refuse to meet and try to agree on terms of peace I shall withdraw my protest and order American ships to respect the submarine blockade."

We cling to the hope that President Wilson had grounds for believing that events would take some such turn. But before these reflections can appear in type, we may be as mad with war as the rest of the world.

Then for those of us who believe that a tragic blunder has been made, there will be nothing to do but suffer the common fate. The nation, when the decision has been made, may have a right to expect of us acquiescence. But the nation is not the sovereign of our soul. We will not hate the German people. Neither will we hate the English people. We do hate the Junkerism of Germany, and the Toryism of England, and we hate most of all the Junkerism and Toryism of America for these are treason to the land of Jefferson and Lincoln. Some day the world will have a new war in which the people of all nations will be one side and the Junkers and Tories and Plutocrats on the other. It will be a bloodless war, and after that we shall have a new international law and it will read: "By this shall men know that ye are my disciples if ye have love one for another."

Paying for the War

"Europe must pay for this war!" is a sentiment as frequently met with as it is unintelligent. Europe will help to pay for the war, of course, but the burden will rest very heavily upon the people of the United States.

The American people are telling themselves that they are prosperous because wages are high and work is steady. As a matter of fact there has not been a time in years when the average American has been compelled to work as hard for the simple necessities of life as during this present winter.

Some Americans are prosperous. The real-estate owners, the bankers, the merchants, and the manufacturers are making money hand over fist. They have something to sell, prices are high, and they reap their reward. Unfortunately, for the country, the property owners and industrial leaders are in the minority. The latest monthly review of the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics reports upon the advance in food prices from November 15, 1915 to November 15, 1916. Of the 27 articles listed all but two—coffee and tea—have advanced in price. The greatest increase is shown by potatoes which have more than doubled. The next most rapid increase is shown by beans

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


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which are three-fourths again as high as they were a year ago. The prices of most meats have risen greatly, and there has been a considerable advance in the price of cereals. The increase in the price of all articles combined is about 25 per cent.

There is no way in which the food bill of the United States may be computed accurately, but roughly the 20 million families in the country probably spend on an average \$8.00 a week for food. The increase of 25 per cent in the cost of food would therefore add \$2.00 a week per family; 40 million dollars a week for all of the families, or 2 billions a year to the food bill of the people of the United States.

There is no way to compute the added cost to the people of this country of rent, fuel, clothing and the like.

The point can be made, however, with the food item alone. The total European war debt to date is about 50 billions, which will carry an interest charge of a little over 2 billions a year. The increase in the food bill of the American people during 1916 if continued for one year amounts to a like amount. In other words, the increase in food costs, paid by the American people this last year is equal to the total interest charge upon the European war debt.

"But," you say, "the war is still going on".

True, and the prices of foods are still going up. The American people are under another disadvantage. The European war debt must be carried by a population of about 400 millions. The increase in food costs of the United States—an amount equal to the interest on the European war debt—must be carried by 100 millions of people.

If it is true that "Europe must pay for this war", what are we paying for here in America?
