The strike started without organization of any sort, and spread almost instantaneously through the iron range before any outside labor organization had participated. The men were unorganized and put of touch with the labor movement. By chance an appeal reached the I W W and organizers for that organization made a tardy seepones. 2. A minimum wage of \$3.00 in the underground mines, and \$3.50 in the same, but in wet places, and \$2.75 on the surface for eight hours of labor.

3. Abolishment of the contract labor system.

4. Pay day twice a month.
