The American Society for Thrift has been endeavoring to educate the public—especially school children—by means of "Little Talks on Thrift," to the necessity of eliminating the enormous waste characteristic of American life. Of course the application of thorough going methods to this reform would require a revoluof therough going methods to this retorm would require a evolu-tion in the economic structure of society, so the Thrift Society's work is confined to a consideration of the petty wastes due to the apitalist system. The capitalist system, which provides for the spivate ownership and management (for profit) of the processes for production and distribution of the necessaries and luxuries we all require, worked well for a considerable period of years—in fact was an improvement over the systems that preceded it. Tofact was an improvement over the systems that preceded it. Today this system is antiquated, wholly out-of-date, by reason of
the development in-industry to which it has given rise. The benafficiaries of this system see the wastes due to it, but quite natursily will not advocate anything which may tend to destroy the
system. So they confine their homilies on thrift to effoorts to make
the poor cooperate with them to, save some of this enormous
saste by methods which, of course, can not begin to more than
touch the effects, and will not eliminate the cause of the waste.
