It is well to note seriously this eleverness on the part of the reling class. After the agitation has some on for months, the prosecution dominated by the economic masters, is in position to determine whether it is wise to go through with the entire program, and then either brings the case to trial or drops it at the last moment. The workers' problem, then, is two-fold-to fight like hell in e courts as long as it is necessary, and to work equally hard to alld up a powerful union as a means of aggression as well as de-use against our masters.

That respect will be extended to the enemy as well. Add to this the intellectual stimulus of travel and association in new environments, and its ultimate effects upon return soldiers must be little short of revolutionary.

But what of the labor movement? We can see no reason to doubt that, with the close of military struggle, the broken strudes of the European labor organization an international sense.
