# HIDEOUS REALITY OF CAPITALISM DEFENSE GETS

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 22
Anyone who has ever seen the explosion of a powder blast in the depths of a mine can readily understand the resemblance of the conditions that have been taking place on the Pacific Coast. from May to November last year. After the powder has been placed and the fuse lighted there is a time when a few mild sparks are seen and then all is dark and quiet until it seems that there will be no blast, when suddenly in one livid, crashing instant every detail of the mine is presented to the view more clearly than by a detail of the mine is presented to the view more clearly than by a change of the conditions along the Pacific Coast, which culminated in the tragedy of Nov. 5.
