One attempt of the jailers has been to leave bottles of whiskey in the bath room, and then have the men go there to take a bath and find the whiskey. At least one bottle was destroyed, and another one was taken back to the tank for an exhibit, and, after it had been seen by all the men in the tank, it also was destroyed. The jailors were hoping that liquor would set the men as wild and irresponsible as it had been making the deputies for the past six months. The only result of the booze attempts has been to get the chief deputy fired, and call attention to the gross misdemeanors of officers of the law who have been violating the state dry law.

## SOME SIDELIGHTS ON THE AUTOMOBILE IN-

There is no industry in this country in which the efficiency system is more highly developed than in the automobile industry. Methods of production which involve the adoption of the most improved labor displacing machinery, the speed-up or Taylor system of eliminating unnecessary movements, of workers and the rapid elimination of skilled workers by men, women ande boys who do one simple thing, is developed to the highest extent.

Together with the development of an efficient and economical mode of production the automobile manufacturers have developed an organization of automobile manufacturers to protect their interests.

In considering the product of the interest of the industry, and in Toledo organization of the automobile workers is practally interests.

It is true that small strikes of workers are continually taking place, most of them by unorganized workers, but only a small fraction of the strikers gain any concessions.

In Detroit it is estimated that there are 250,000 workers engaged in the production of automobiles.

The International Association of Machinists affiliated with the A. F. of L., after years of strenuous effort and the concentration of groups of organizers in the city have only between 800 and 1,000 members in Detroit out of about 75,000 workers who are eligible to membership in that craft unions.

Discontent in the factories is widespread but the harvest of organization in the shape of better conditions will be reached only after a tremendous struggle with the organized employers.

The I.W. W. strikes in Detroit in the past, while gaining many concessions to the workers, did not result in a permanent improvement of conditions.

This was due to several causes, one of which was the lack of knowledge of the members of the necessity of maintaining their organization after the strikes were over and the initial enthusiasm had died dood is what is claimed to be the largest automobile plant in the world under one roof. This is the Overland plant employing about 18,000 from the strikes were over and the initial enthusiasm to the Meral and Machinery Workers Industrial Union of the militant, fighting Industrial Workers of the World.

They have learned therough bitter experience that there is only one way to win in the struggle for better wages, shorter hours and protection against the hellish speed-up yeaster and other abuses and that way is to organize every worker into the One Big Industrial Union.

At our non-hour meetings at the Overland plant the greatest

At our noon-hour meetings at the Overland plant the greatest enthusiasm is manifested. The workers are asking us "When are we going to strike." Our answer is "That is up to you" and we advise them to join the union first as a measure of preparedness so that they can not only decide as a body all matters affecting themselves but build a permanent organization that will hold all they win and then go after more.

The wages at the Overland plant are in some cases as low as 17% cper hour. A small percentage get 30c per hour and more but the average wage is abore the workers are able to maintain an existence on this scale of wages only because they put in a lot of overtime work, a Most of the workers in the Overland plant at the present tisse are working ten, eleven and twelve hours a day. This notwithstanding the fact that the eight hour day is supposed to be established in the plant.

On Christmas the foremen receive a bonus which varies according to the sawing they have been able to make on the cost of production in their department. To earn the largest possible bonus the foremen become slave drivers of the works possible type.

The Electric Auto-Light Co, which is a subsidiary of the Overland, employa about 6,000 workers and the conditions are similar in ever respect.

It is only a matter of time when the discontent which is rife the substantial that the substantial grant grant works. The Metal and Machinery Workers Industrial Union is maintaining an aggressive organizing campaign and the shop delegates are doing splendid work. Too long have the automobile factory workers been crushed, submissive slaves.

Yet those whose labor produces the automobiles are more entitled to ride in them than any pagasite boss.

Any day you can watch the bosses coming out of the automobile factories. Their welf-fed, sleek bedies sink liusuriously back into the well cushioned seats of their auto

into the well cushioned seats of their automobiles as they go to their homes.

Contrast this with the workers pouring out of the factory, their faces begrinned with sweat and dirt, their tired, lagging bodies, from which every ounce of energy has been extracted, their drooping shoulders and faces pale under the grime and sweat and one can realize why the spark of manhood is being fanned into rebellion. At the factory gate with the bosses looking on they applied the speakers of the One Big Union and the bosses grit their teeth and clench their fasts for they see the handwriting on the wall "WE WILL NO LONGER BEG AND PLEAD FOR BETTER CONDITIONS. WE ARE GOING TO DEMAND AND THAT DEMAND WILL BE BACKED BY THE ORGANIZED MIGHT OF THE AROUSED WORKEBS.
