Metal Miners Close Down Five of **Butte's Biggest Mines**

General Dissatisfaction and Holocaust the Cause

I. W. W. Organizers Busy

Following the news of the anti-registration troubles in Butte, Montana, came the news of the horrible mine holocaust in which 175 miners were said to have been entombed at the Speculator and Granite Mountain mines of the North Butte Mining Co. And the latest development is that five of the biggest mines in Butte were shitt down by a strike on Monday, June 11th, and that other mines are being shut down right along. The miners are leaving the mines and going to their homes determined to stay there until they have won shorter hours and an increase in pay that is in keeping with the present price of copper—and that is in keeping with the present price of copper—and that is in keeping with the present price of the first of Buttes' difficulties started with the boast of the authorities that the expected opposition to enforced registration

The first of Butte's difficulties started with the boast of the authorities that the expected opposition to enforced registration would cause the emergency hospitals of the city to work overtime. This threat was almost prophetic in view of the troubles that resulted from the attempt of the watch dogs of Plutocracy to compel the miners, against their wills, to sign up for front seats in the European slaughter-fest.

Then came the mine disaster when the miners were conscripted Then came the mine disaster when the miners were conscripted for the grim army of Death, as miners always are, in order that the Copper Barons might have their dividends at all costs. The story of the disaster is a ghastly one. The total dead, according to the coroner, will number 145. Ninety bodies have been recovered up to date, only fifty of whom had been identified. When the fire which swept the shafts was discovered there were 412 men in the mines.

Most of the bodies recovered were charred beyond recognition. The throats by several were torn and mutilated, indicating that the men had struggled for air, dying from suffocation.

Prosecutors Stole Jury List Over Night
