When the boas controls your job he controls you; when you aten to control your job the boss can hardly control himself.

Wouldn't it be better to stay in this country and defend what little you've got than to go all the way to France to defend something you haven't got at all?

Labor-lakera should never try to slip over a contract with the boss regarding wages unless they are in a position to show the big crowd that it is possible to come to an "agreement" with the Hi Cost of Living.

It is on the job that the workers are exploited and gouged, and it is on the job that the Parasites can be expropriated and punished. The boss-class has power in industry just to the extent that the workers haven't. Unless you are organizing on the job to take the reins of power from your oppressors, you are not organizing at all.

By gaining control of the job you are starting out to gain control of the industry; by gaining control of one industry you are starting to gain control of all industries; by gaining control of all industries you will have control of the world—and you can then put a stop to exploitation, war and misery for all time. Get on the job and take out credentials.

All forms of political government, whether limited or absolute monarchy or so-called "democracy," are simply so many different names for one thing: Industrial despotism. They are the national manifestations of world-spide invisible government.
