#### THE BOYS IN THE BRIDEWELL

NEWS FROM MARINE TRANS PORT WORKERS INDUSTRIAL UNION No. 700

Scattle, Wash., Sept. 18th On Sept. 5th the hall at 208½ Scond Ave. So, and the District Headquarters of M. T. W. U. No. 700 and Lumberworkers In-dustrial Union No. 500 were raided by Government officials. The thoroughness with which the raid was carried out is shown by the fact that everything pos-sible was confiscated. Nothing overlooked and when th was overlooked and when the raiders retired nothing remained by the walls and ceiling. Accord-ing to the statement of the raid-ers they were looking for evidence of a seditious nature and of ence of a securious nature and of financial backing from the Kai-ser. None were found of course and they knew they yould find none. The real intent of the raid was to break up the organization in those localities where the workers had a strangle hold the workers had a strangle hold on the real traitors of the country, viz the copper and lumber bar-ons. This is easily proven by facts; for instance, the lumber-workers main office at Spokane and their District Office at Se-attle, the Metal Mine Workers office at Butte (which by the way, is an independent organization) and Metal Mine Workers Industrial Uinon No. 800 at Salt Lake City, were cleaned out absolutely. At other points, Min-neapolis and Chicago for instance neapolis and Chicago for instance the raiders made a thorough search and took copies of pampli-lets and newspaper articles. This procedure of cleaning out one office thoroughly and not bothering another proves beyond the shadow of a doubt that the of-ficials in charge of strike zones exceeded their authority and us ed the warrants issued by the government to do all the damage possible to the copper and lumb-er workers' strike.

In the raid on Seattle District

office and hall, the raiders took articles that could in no way be construed as evidence; postage be construed as evalence; postage stamps, paper clips, rubber stamps and ink pads, wrapping paper, unused mimeograph stenc-ils, mimeograph paper recently purchased and as yet unwrapped typewriters, letterhead station-ary, unused envelopes, adding machines and many other articles too numerous to mention. pettiness of the local official in charge of Scattle raids extended even to the refusal of giving a receipt for material seized. It is well known that this official has a blind hatred for anything pertaining to working class or-ganization. All the materials seized, including the many ar-ticles of no value as evidence, are to be sent to Chicago, presumably for examination and it is more than likely that we will never see any of it again

In spite of these petty lareeny persecutions we are still doing business and from reports received it looks like we will do better than before the raid.

The members of the new Government can, and in all probability will, prove themselves just as autocratic as their predecessors, the Romanoffs. If the Russian Revolution has not gained freedom from wage slavery, it should, at least, prove to the working class what can be gained by sudden concerted action.

A few hundred lives have been lost in this struggle, but a revolution can be bloodless, as witness the revolution in Fortugal a few years ago.
