TENN. PRISONS HELL HOLES REPORT SHOWS

NASHVILLE, Tenn .- In a report released March 18th the Tennessee Legislature's Penal Committee is forto admit that conditions in the Brushy Mountain Prison and the main Penitentiary at Nashville are worse than in the Siberian prisons under

the Czar before the revolution.

The report tells of women prisonat the Nashville Pen being handcuffed and hung from pegs on the wall for 10 to 12 hours because they were unable to put out enough work in the hosiery mill to satisfy the slave driving warden. Both men and women prisoners are stripped to the waist and lashed into unconsciousness by the whipping boss for the slightest in fraction of rules the committee

In the Brushy Mountain branch of the main prison the committee reports 976 men crowded into a frame buildber. Over 300 of the prisoners have venerial deseases, contracted in most cases since they entered the prison gated. At the present 138 are down with pneumonia and flu without medical attention and left in their beds to die as the warden claims he has n adequate hospital to house and care

The Brushy Mountain prison is a tain the like of which has never been seen in an American prison. The wiring on this old structure is of the most dangerous character and is liable at any time to cause a fire." 115 Jailed in Orleans Strike; Mass Picketing Starts On Call M.W.I.U.

New Orleans, La.-Harold Hynes, National Secretary of the Marine Workers' Industrial Union, and H. Harvey, National Organizer for the Union, were sentenced to ten days in jail for violation of the Federal Injunction against mass picketing Saturday. The organizers were char-ged with distributing leaflets signed by the union calling on the 5,000 longshoremen to mass picket on the docks and keep out the scabs as the only way to win the strike.

NEW ORLEANS, La.—35 striking lonshoremen are held here charged with violation of the Federal injunc-tion which prohibits strikers from coming near the docks where scabs are working to break the strike. Trial of the 35 strikers is set for Thursday

The charges against the 35 strikers, most of whom are Negroes, came as a result of a mass picketing demonstration of several hundred strikers on the docks last Wednesday. At that time 115 were arrested when the poand with machine guns set up along

WHITE RULERS DENY NEGROES SCHOOLING IN BLACK BELT

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Only one Negro out of every 21 enrolling in the first grades of Alabama public schools reaches the eighth grade, according to figures given out by the United States office of education.

82,192 Negro children were enrolled in the first grades of Alabama schools in the school year of 1927-28. The same year 3,748 Negro children were enrolled in the eighth grade. While there were over 82 thousand first grade ousand first grade pupils the report shows only 29,402 in the second grade. In other words out of those Negro children who are fortunate enough to get any schooling, close those negro children who are fortunate enough to get any schooling, close to two-thirds of those who start school are freed to quit before they reach the second grade. The number in the higher grades grows progressively smaller until the eighth grade with only 3,748 pupils is reached.

7th Worker Dies In Chatta. Flop House

Jordan Douglas, unemployed Negro worker, died Wednesday night in the City flophouse of Chattanooga. Coughing and groaning for two nights on the concrete floor which serves as a bed for three hundred white and Negro workers, no one paid any attention to him. The "charita-ble guardian" probably saying that this just makes one "nigger" less.

Douglas is the seventh unemployed worker to die in this flop house pro-vided by the "sweet, considerate bosses," and City Council of Chatta-nooga. The other six were two white and four Negro. The local yellow sheet, the Chattanooga Times, was even forced to admit that Douglas died of lack of clothes, wearing only a pair of old shoes, trousers, coat and

DALLAS, Texas. — Coder and Hurst, leaders of the Dallas unem-ployed who were beaten and tortured by a gang of klansmen with the cooperation of the local police, are returning to testify before the grand jury supposed to be investigating the

The kind of "investigation" this will be is shown by the attitude of the Mayor who has declared that "any Communist demonstration held on the return of Coder and Hurst will be broken up by the police. There will be no more demonstrations in Dallas." Police are being mobilized and equipped with tear gas bombs and machine guns to smash any attempt of workers to protest the present terror regime. Despite the police terror the workers of Dallas will continue the struggle for work or bread.

Textile Worker Docked For Fake Jobless Relief

GREENVILLE, S. C.—The Wood-side Mill here, which boasts of being the "largest cotton mill under one roof in the world," just pulled a stunt hard to beat.
For 7 weeks they took 25 and 50

cents from each workers pay envelope and with this money claimed they would buy groceries for the unem-ployed. No workers are on the committee handling the maney or buying the groceries and distributing them No one knows how much of the mon-ey "collected" (it amounts to stealing it) from the workers was grafted by the committee of the mill manage

ment.

The workers who are forced to contribute 25 to 50 cents are paid \$4 to \$10 a week. Their own families are without enough to eat but out of their starvation wages they give to the unemployed while the bosses who have the money and should be giving, fuse to part with a red cent. The Hoskin-Chadwick mills employing about 600 workers have worked out a nice scheme to cut the wages of us workers. This time they re putting us on a 13 hour day with 6½ hours for each shift—six days per week. This means that we will work about 40 hours a week for \$4.

The more we workers stand for this stuff the more the bosses will pile it up on us. They don't give a damn about us and it is time we should know this and get busy and put a stop to it. We must all get together and organize and let the boss know that we wont stand this slavery any lenger. We must not be afraid of our jobs. We dont have any jobs to lose.
