FLOOD HORROR

News dispatches from Sumner, Miss., reveal horrors in the Delta re gion that are beyond the power of language to describe. Pounding w ers are levelling and scattering the material that once served as levees. The flood rises higher every hour. The Tallahatchie and Yazoo rivers, overflowing, have inundated thousands of acres. Many towns are in one of the hardest hit of all.

Starving And In Rags

Thousands of families roam thru the country, without sustaining food, trying to appease their hunger, by de vouring tree bark and roots of weeds. death rate is mounting so rapidly that no record is being kept of the dead. Several families are suffering from diphtheria. It is reported that people are eating dead carcasses of li-stock drowned in the flood waters.

Hundreds of Negro families are without food and many are naked, except for improvised covering for bodies. Many children have gunny sacks as their only clothing. They cut holes in the sack so it will go over their heads and slip over their

Hundreds Swept Away

Water stands six to ten feet deep around hundreds, perhaps thousands of Negro cabins. Rescuers found many families clinging to roof tops, who told harrowing tales of seeing other nearby houses swept away by the flood, drowning whole families. The number of dead will never be known scattered in every direction and there is no agency that can check up on the fatalities

Appeal to War Department

Levee maintenance is under control of the War Department of the United States government and appeals have been made to that department to send forces to try to hold in check the crumbling dykts. A few soldiers have arrived on the scene, who are utterly unable to deal with the exploiters who live in the region.

Everywhere throughout the coun try mass protests must be be staged against the criminal government re-sponsible for this wholesale destruction of human life. Demand that war funds be at once used to supply food clothing, shelter, medical relief and hospitalization to these flood sufferers Connect up this agitation with fight against the capitalist attempts to place the burden of the crisis upon the working class and poor farmers

We learned that it is not because ve are Negroes that we are being picked on by the landlords and the 'law," but because we are poor croppers, just like the white croppers.

The more we fight here the more learn better how to fight and how to make arguments that will unite black and white croppers sa the landlords will have to stop sealing everyhing from us.

Our most important work is wo in the industries. It is there that we build our Party. It is there that we realize the slogan of Lenin: "Every factory a revolutionary

The Party leadership, especially of the Southern districts, must energetically combat such illusions that arise out of an opportunism that follows the line of least resistance.

In the Party recruiting drive we must concentrate upon the factories, and at the same time, really make a start toward building a mass movement among the unemployed and intensify the work among the poor farmers, tenant farmers, croppers, etc. We must build trade unions, organize mili-tant groups in the American Federation of Labor Unions, build Unemployed Councils, organize the International Labor Defense, build up into a real mass movement the League of Struggle for Negro Rights, aid in transforming the International Workers' Order into a real workers' insurance or-ganization, build powerful Croppers' Unions, set up Action Committees on the land - in fact engage much more in every form of activity mobilize the broadest possible masses in the struggle against capitalism.

Capitalist "Law and Order" in Harlan and Scottsboro

Developments in the Kentucky strike region and the Scottsboro case the past week have further exposed the fraud of capitalist democracy. In Kentucky the gun thugs, multiplied in number, have increased their terrordesperate effort to crush the strike that is fast spreading industrial paralysis over the coal fields. Not only do the coal thugs raid union a relief headquarters and arrest officials of the National Miners' Union, relief workers, newspaper writers, but they have arrested Allen Taub, attorney for the International Labor Defense, who went to Kentucky to defend the prisoners and to secure bond for their release. The coal operators do not want even the farce of a trial before their bought and paid for judges of the calibre of Judge Prewitt, Judge Jones and other corporation marionettes. Such trials arouse ever larger numbers of workers to fight against the terror.

In the Scottsboro case the Alabama and Tennesse lynch gang is plotting to deprive these nine innocent Negro boys, convicted on the perjured testi mony of two white prostitutes, who catered to Negro patronage, of any legal defense so they can be more easily railroaded to the electric chair. certain pimp, Miron Pearlman, alias Danny Dundee, a prize-fighting Jew with an Irish name, was arrested for brawling in Huntsville, Alabama. when searched, a letter written by one of the prostitutes, Ruby Bates, to

To try to discredit in advance other similar letters that may be in existence written by Ruby Bates and the bootlegging whore, Victoria Price, the lynch gang of Hu cocted the story that Attorney Chamlee hired Pearlman to go to Huntsville, get Ruby Bates drunk and obtain such a letter.

But even the frame-up against Attorney Chamlee reveals exactly what sort of person this Ruby Bates, one of the witnesses whose perjured testi-

mony was used to railroad innocent boys to the electric chair, really is. Pearlman, a Chattanooga underworld character says, according to the press:

"I went walking with the girl Monday night and arranged to have date with her Tuesday night. The Bates girl and I went to a bootlegging joint, and that is where I dictated the letter which she wrote and signed. She did not object at all to writing the letter. She was drinking at the time, but I was not drunk and in fact had not taken a drink.

After getting the letter, I went to a dance hall, where a remark addressed to me by a man there resulted in a row. I fought three men That is why I was arrested."

It is such a female, a drunken prostitute, with whom any lout can arrange a "date" provided he has the price, that is selected by the Alabama ynch gang as an examplt of "pure Southern womanhood" that needs lynch law for protection against Negro workers! A more debased piece of hypocrisy

These two attacks on attorneys defending victims of capitalist class justice are not localized, isolated, or exceptional instances of "miscarriage of justice" as writers for such papers as the Scripps-Howard Knoxville
"News-Sentinel" would have us believe. They are a continuation of the ynch terror used against the attorneys at the oroginal Scottsboro trial; they continue the lynch attacks made against Bernard Aides, the attorney ntd by the International Labor Defense, to defend Orphan Janes Maryland. These attacks register a definite advance of the capitalist class toward fascism. The legal machinery of capitalist democracy, which is the veiled dictatorship of the capitalist class, is used to advance fascism, which is the open dictatorship of the capitalist class.

These two most recent attempts to crush any working class legal de-fense whatever, are accompanied by an increase in terror against the Negro passes in the South and a continuation and intensification of the terro that has raged for more than a year in the Eastern Kentucky coal fields against white and Negro workers. Agin, these two cases, especially Harlan where there exists the most extreme instance of fascism in the United States, are not something apart from or contradictory to American capitalist policy-which conceals its dictatorship under the cloak of bourgeois democracy, through which and with the aid of which fascist forms increas ingly emerge. Fascism in the United States, as everywhere throughout the capitalist world, is of a two-fold nature—a defense of decaying capitalism which tries to place the burden of its crisis upon the working class, and a fierce offense against the working class which shows increasing determina tion to resist the mass starvation program of capitalism.

In the Eastern Kentucky coal fields the miners, in spite of and against the terror, are spreading the strike. The Central Strike Committee, a and file committee, in defiance of the terror, mobilized five hundred delegates who decided to spread the strike to all the Southern coal fields. The arrests of the union leaders, the relief workers and newspaper writers, will not stop the growing strike movement. It is the growth of the strike that impels the gun-thugs and prosecuting attorneys and courts to increasingly unmask themselves as the tools of the giant corporations that dominate the Kentucky coal fields.

The Kentucky miners, face to face with the terror, do not shrink from the fight. They are carrying on with heroic determination to win. They have shown a capacity for self-sacrifice and suffering that has scarcely been eq-ualled in labor struggles in this coutnry. They endeavor to obtain food from the scant supply in the hunger stricken vicinity of the strike. But they must The working class of the entire that the fight in Kentucky against the terror is a fight that directly concerns every worker, because, unless we can smash this terror, this fascist frightfuless in Kentucky, it will extend to other mine fields and to all other industries in the country.

The fighting Kentucky miners need relief at once. The further spreading of the strike depends upon this, A critical point is at hand. Every work uld actively engage in raising relief for the Kentucky strikers. All this is in line with the plans of the Fish Committee to outlaw the Communist Party and force the workers to accept the crumbs that are thrown them by the charity organizations. These attacks are attempts to make it easier for the bosses to put thru the new wage cuts that they have planned.

The boss class hopes with the outlawing of the Communist Party that they will be able to mobilize the workers for war, an imperialist war directed against the workers of other countries for the sake of profits for the big bankers and bosses of this country.
