Hunger Is Illogical A Land of Plenty.

There is no logical economic reason why in a land of lavish plenty any human being should go hungry. And there is no logical reason why in a land where so many are hungry any man should be unemployed. The presence of so much necessity increases the need for productive-

ness. Yet starvation stalks our streets while a multitude of men are

Many good people are horrified by the revelations of conditions existing in the East Side school districts, where children, faint from hunger, collapse in the class rooms. The thing is an inadvertence. There really is no intention on the part of capitalistic society to starve anybody. The aim is to nourish the workers sufficiently to enable them to do the desired service in a satisfactory manner. But miscalculations semetimes are made. And just to the degree that some men thirst for gold, certain others must hunger for bread. Exorbitant greed has overreached itself and excess has caused the present panic and consequent privation.

Plans for amelioration are being formed. Society, that has robbed these helpless children of their rightful portion of bread, will return to them a paltry crust-and call it "charity."

There is in this no criticism of the scheme to alleviate this suffering. The need is imperative for immediate relief. And charity is the next best thing to justice.

But the point is that this condition, though it now be relieved, will recur. It is a well-known physiological phenomenon that hunger invariably results from prolonged abstinence from food. And these children will in the future be repeatedly robbed of their birthright of

There is nothing unusual in the present situation-nothing to excite extraordinary interest and sympathy. Starvation is the normal andition of this squalid quarter, although it is only occasionally exploited. Just now, of course, the destitution is intensified. But a little starvation more or less does not alter the basis of the problem. Relief is needed much, but a remedy is needed more. We should not be content to indulge in temporary expedients, but should seek to prevent a recurrence of the condition.

The fathers of these children ask only the chance to work. This has been denied them. It was an unwise thing to do. The consequence will be that in time they will ask more than a chance to work. They will ask to receive the full product of their labor. And in a litthe more time they will do more than ask. They will DEMAND. This is the remedy.

Hearst Is Confederate The Race Track Touts.

No more striking illustration of Hearst hypocrisy could be found than is afforded by the Journal's attitude in the anti-race track gambling crusade. Chief champion of this movement in its editorial columns, inveighing most impressively against the evil of track

gambling, it nevertheless is the only newspaper in New York (the Morning Telegraph being an organ or the racing game with no news pretensions) so shameless as to run the swindling advertisements of the "tout syndicate," known as turf information bureaus. Even to the prostitute press of capitalism-or at least that part of it which is frankly plutocratic-there remains a remnant of respectability, some lingering sense of decency, else a wholesome regard for popular opinion. Bue Hearst cares neither for decency nor for public sentiment unless it comes in the guise of dollars, and when he finds prostitution profitable he never fails to hang out the editorial red-light. So it is that the turi touts, unable to purchase space in reputable papers, find in the Journal the prime promoter of their thievish traffic. And it would be interesting to know what advance over its regular rates it gets for inserting these advertisements.

The methods of this syndicate of turf swindlers are so notorious that further expose or explanation should not be necessary. But nothing is truer than the saying that "a sucker is born every minute" -end really it seems that none die. The syndicate advertises under various names, giving a different selection in each advertisement. As by this system all the horses in the running are named, some branch of the syndicate is bound to pick the winner, and so it keeps on landing the dollars of its dupes.

These advertisements of the touts, enticing money from inexpe rienced boys and ignorant men and foolish women, resulting in a harvest of embezzlements and suicides, are infinitely more infamous than the assignation advertisements and massage parlor "personals" of the Herald, against which the Journal virtuously waged a successful warfare. They enable the public to size up Hearst at his true proportions—his dimensions are those of the tout, no more.

Hearst is a reformer for revenue only, and follows always the lure of the lucre.
